Baden ~ Our Town

In case you haven't noticed, the ramps are finished and ready to use! After several years of organizing, fundraising, demolition, and re-construction, the bridge and ramps are ready to use for residents who enjoy strolling through town.

This project began when the Baden Community Association approached the township about cleaning up the townshipowned piece of land beside the creek just north of the fire hall on Foundry Street. At the back of the property was a bridge installed in 1990 by the Baden Pond Committee. It had become decrepit and needed to be repaired. So, the BCA began by lifting it off its moorings by crane and dropping it down at the back of the Baden Fire Hall. The old railings were removed, the beams were sandblasted and painted, and then the beams were relocated to the original spot across the Mill Creek.

Last year, after an extensive fundraising campaign, the BCA built the bridge with the expertise and generosity of Ken Young Construction. It was determined that to make the ramps wheelchair accessible, the BCA would need another \$12,000, as there was a large drop from the bridge to ground on the southern side. Ken Young was once again called on to build the 56-foot ramp and the project is now complete!

The township will be laying a trail from the ramps to Brewery Street later this summer/fall, which will provide a picturesque walk along the Mill Creek to Brewery Street. The BCA is still accepting donations to help cover the costs of the ramps, which could be made at the township office, and a tax receipt will be issued.

It has been a long venture, but the BCA is confident that many citizens will enjoy the beautification project for years to come. This is the first of many trails in and around Baden. Get out there and enjoy the walk and beauty that Baden has to offer!

After the Corn Fest we are taking a break until the Santa Claus Parade, but we will still meet on the last

The Summer Stinker

Great things come with all seasons, but one not so great in the summer is that cute furry little stinker—the skunk. They

are aplenty right now and are in the area, so be ready. Your dog is sure to be curious about one, and may end up with a face full of stink. If your pooch gets sprayed, there are ways you can rid her of the scent without having to buy



up every can of tomato juice in the area. You can make a simple solution at home, so have the ingredients available, but **do NOT store this mixture or make it ahead of time, as the mixture could explode if left in a bottle.**

Mix together: 1 quart of 3-percent hydrogen peroxide (available at any pharmacy) with 1/4 cup baking soda, and 1 teaspoon liquid dishwashing soap



Be prepared!! Have your gloves handy, and your recipe with ingredients nearby.

Keep your dog outside while you prepare your solution. Then grab your gloves and check her eyes; if they're irritated or red, immediately flush them with cool water.

Clean and rinse: Rub the mixture through the fur, but don't leave it on too long (peroxide can bleach fur). Rinse out thoroughly.

Shampoo: Next, wash your dog with pet shampoo and rinse thoroughly. By now, doggie should be de-skunked and smelling sweet. Thoroughly towel-dry and be sure to place her in a warm, sunny room for the next couple of hours so that she doesn't get chilled.

Owner cleanup

If your dog rubbed some of the stink onto you, you can rid your clothes of the smell by using regular laundry detergent mixed with a half-cup of baking soda.

Sir John A Macdonald ... At Home—In Baden

Can you imagine anything more Canadian? In an idyllic, small Ontario town, you can stroll to a park between the local Tim Hortons and a grand Victorian-era castle, and spend some time with Sir John A Macdonald. It's happening in our town of Baden, 10 kilometres west of Kitchener.

On June 30 at 6:30 pm, the Township of Wilmot and The Statue Project held a ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate the installation of a sculpture of Sir John A Macdonald beside Castle Kilbride, a Heritage Canada National Historic Site.

The work, entitled "A Canadian Conversation," was created by Canadian sculptor Ruth Abernethy. Ruth's iconic work includes sculptures of John McCrae in Guelph, Glenn Gould at the CBC in Toronto, and Oscar Peterson at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa.

"A Canadian Conversation" was commissioned by The Prime Ministers Statue and Educational Resource Project as part of an initiative to celebrate Canada's Sesquicentennial in 2017. It is the first in a series of life-sized bronze sculptures of our Prime Ministers that will all be located on the nine acre Township of Wilmot property in the centre of Baden.

In addition to the sculptures, a host of open-source educational materials will be available online for visitors, families, and educators. The site is being designed to encourage dialogue and discussion about the politics, policies, and events that occurred during each Prime Minister's term of office.

Township of Wilmot administrator Barb McLeod commented, "We are very pleased to be the host site in Waterloo Region for the Prime Ministers Statue Project and look forward with great anticipation to the remainder of the statues that will be placed on our grounds. There was a wonderful crowd that joined us at the ribbon cutting ceremony as we welcomed Sir John A and celebrated this artistic and patriotic endeavor."

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

Baden Birding

The loud rattling call of the Belted Kingfisher, given while patrolling its water front territory, is likely your first indication of its presence.

This stout-bodied, front-heavy bird has a big head, a thick heavy bill, and sports a blue "mohawk" crest.

With its white breast, slate blue back and necklace, it is a dapper looking bird and a common inhabitant of the area. Unlike most bird species, the female Belted Kingfisher is more brightly coloured than its mate. Females have a chestnut coloured belly band that is missing on the males.

The Belted Kingfisher has a whole variety of interesting adaptations that allows it to live an atypical lifestyle.

Belted Kingfishers frequent overhanging branches providing a clear view of the water below where they watch for small fish and crayfish. When prey is spotted, the kingfisher plunges head first into the water capturing the quarry in its beak. They sometimes hunt by hovering, waiting for the opportune time to dive headlong into the water.

The Belted Kingfisher's eyes have been adapted to make hunting in such a manner possible. Kingfishers have excellent vision, including the ability to see colours. Since water refracts light, underwater objects appear in a different location than they actually are thus making it difficult to aim accurately. Fortunately, the Belted Kingfisher's eyes are able to compensate for refraction, allowing the kingfisher to precisely target prey. Their eyes are also specially adapted to compensate for reflection from the water's surface, and are also able to accurately judge underwater depth. Their eyes have protective translucent eyelids (nictitating membranes) which cover the eyes when diving.

Their nostrils are also covered by small internal flaps which prevent water from entering. Prey species do not notice the white breasted kingfisher as they look skyward. Likewise, their darker upper bodies hide the kingfisher from the eyes of soaring hawks.

The kingfisher returns to a favourite perch after catching prey which is then immobilized by repeatedly striking it against a tree branch or by stabbing it with its beak. The stunned prey is then flipped in the air and swallowed head first. This allows for easier, trouble free swallowing. Like an owl, kingfishers regurgitate undigested bones, scales and crayfish exoskeletons in pellets.

Their nesting habit is also somewhat out of the norm, because they nest in burrows along steep sandy banks, preferably in their feeding territory but sometimes quite a distance away in quarries. Both parents participate in digging the tunnel, but the male does about two-thirds of the digging. Using its strong heavy beak, the Kingfisher digs a nest hole about 10 cm in diameter and usually over a metre in length. Once some sand is loosened. their small feet are put to use. Like many birds, they have 3 forward facing toes, each with a sharp claw. The two inner toes of the Belted Kingfisher are fused except for the claw-tipped end, making them excellent little shovels for kicking out the loosened soil. The tunnel slopes upward, possibly to prevent the pooling of rain water in the nest cavity which is approximately 25 cm in diameter and 15 cm high and located at the terminus of the tunnel. Tunnel digging takes at least 3 days, and could take significantly more depending upon the material in the bank.

The female lays 5-8 eggs, which are incubated by both adults and hatch in approximately 24 days. Both parents feed the hatchlings regurgitated food and laterto whole fish. By the time the young are 27 days old, they are coaxed from the burrow by parents who have recently resisted feeding them. Soon afterward, they take flight and begin basic foraging, while continuing to be fed by caring parents. By the time they are 8 weeks old they will be independent of their parents.

The next time you are near a river be sure to listen for the rattle of a Belted Kingfisher boisterously patrolling its territory. If lucky, you may spot this spiffy fisher.



cup all-purpose flour

 tsp salt
 cup buttermilk
 cup vegetable oil
 large egg
 tsp vanilla extract
 1/2 cups blueberries or raspberries

1. Preheat oven to 400 • F. Grease twelve 2 1/2" by 1 1/4" muffin-pan cups. In large bowl, combine flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt. In small bowl, with fork, beat buttermilk, oil, egg and vanilla until blended. Add buttermilk mixture to flour mixture; stir just until flour is moistened (batter will be lumpy). Fold in berries.

2. Spoon into prepared muffin-pan cups. Bake until toothpick inserted in center of muffin comes out clean, 20 to 25 minutes. Immediately remove muffins from pan. Serve warm, or cool on wire rack to serve later. Makes 12 muffins.

DEFINING COMMON MUSCLE AND JOINT INJURIES

Physical injury to your muscles and joints can occur with workplace, household, sporting, and recreational activities. Common mechanisms of injury include slip and fall or collisionimpact type accidents, overstretching a body part, twisting awkwardly, or



performing repetitive movements. This can cause pain, stiffness, and swelling in a joint and/or muscle, leading to injuries such as *sprains*, *strains*, and *contusions*.

A *sprain* refers to the stretching or tearing of a ligament. Ligaments are tough bands of fibrous tissue that connect one bone to another. They help stabilize joints, preventing excessive movement. One or more ligaments can be injured at the same time. Common locations for *sprains* are the ankle, wrist, and knee joints.

A *strain* refers to the stretching or tearing of a muscle or tendon. Muscles are responsible for producing force and causing motion, whereas tendons are the tough fibrous extensions of muscle that attach to bone. A *strain* injury can occur when the muscle-tendon complex suddenly or powerfully contracts, or when it is overstretched. This is called an acute *strain*. Overuse of certain muscles over time can lead to a chronic repetitive *strain*. *Strains* are commonly referred to as "pulled muscles" or "tendinitis." The shoulders, forearms, low back, and leg



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338 Waterloo Street, New Hamburg 519.662.4441 <u>www.nhwc.ca</u> regions are common locations for *strains* to occur.

Contusions are commonly called "bruises," and occur when small blood vessels in the skin, muscles, or bones are subjected to trauma.



Sprain, strain, and contusion injuries can exist on their own or in combination with each other. Initial conservative management and first aid of these injuries should follow the P.R.I.C.E. principle (Protection, Rest, Ice, Compression, Elevation). This can significantly reduce swelling, tissue damage, inflammation, muscle spasms, pain, and recovery time. With a mild injury you should experience progressive improvement within 2 to 3 days. You should gradually begin using the injured area after this time. Mild injuries usually heal completely without any residual consequence in 1 to 4 weeks. Moderate injuries usually require 4 to 12 weeks to heal and may require basic rehabilitative treatment and exercises. Severe injuries will take longer to heal. Healing times may also vary depending on a persons age, physical condition and general health.

You should seek immediate medical care under the following circumstances: a popping sound heard during the injury accompanied by a feeling of joint instability or inability to weight bear; obvious evidence or suspicion of a broken bone, fracture, or joint dislocation; or injuries at risk for infection. For less serious injuries that do not subside, you should contact a licensed health professional who deals in the diagnosis and treatment of muscle and joint pain. They can determine the cause of your pain and prescribe appropriate therapy, exercises, and rehabilitation strategies specifically for your circumstance. 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

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



Armand says – Good question Gary- and yes, I sure do!

Petersburg had its named derived from Peter Wilker, a native of Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany who settled in this community in the 1830s. Petersburg served as a depot for the Grand Trunk Railway and was the main shipping centre for St. Agatha, Bamburg, Mannheim, and New Dundee. That station closed in 1967 and later it was moved to Doon Pioneer Village. In 1840 the population was approximately 150 and rose to 200 in 1867. John Ernst Sr. served as the first postmaster in1842 and also owned the Blue Moon Hotel.

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

Wilmot Township Arboretum

Located on Waterloo Street across from Laschinger Boulevard, the Arboretum was developed in 1956 as the Waterloo County Arboretum to demonstrate soil conservation techniques and was the first of its type in Ontario. This project was sponsored by the Waterloo County Soil and Crop Improvement Association, W. J. Schneller (a local farmer), and R.A. Forsythe (a prominent soil conservationist). The Region of Waterloo was deeded the arboretum in 1973, and then to the Township of Wilmot in 1993. There were seventy species of native and exotic trees, but some have since died. There are 2 information boards with a map and listing of all the trees. The Arboretum is a great place to see a tree of



interest, size, colour, and shape near maturity. When selecting a tree, consider your soil type and location. **Photo: flower of the native Carolinian tulip** (*Liriodendron tulipifera*) or yellow poplar tree.

Some of the trees of the Arboretum: Kentucky Coffeetree (*Gymnocladus dioicus*), American Sycamores or Plane-trees (*Platanus*), Blue-Beech (*Carpinus caroliniana*), Yellow Birch (*Betula alleghaniensis*), Butternut (*Juglans cinerea*), Ohio Buckeye (*Aesculus glabra*), Shagbark Hickory (*Carya ovata*), Pin Oak (*Quercus palustris*), Bur Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*), Shingle Oak (*Quercus imbricaria*), White Spruce (*Picea glauca*), Red Spruce (*Picea rubens*), Serbian Spruce (*Picea omorika*), Juneberry (*Amelanchier*), and Swiss stone pine (Pinus cembra). Shoulda, Coulda or Might-Get-To List

- ✓ Continue to water this year's new plantings. Trees and shrubs are watered for two years. Once established you can discontinue watering. This has been a tough year with the drought!!!
- ✓ Plant fall vegetable seeds such as lettuce and spinach.
- ✓ Order spring-flowering bulbs to fill the spots you marked in the spring that need colour.
- Trim, divide and move irises, oriental poppies and peonies.
- ✓ Construct such projects as trellises, pergola, arbours, etc.
- Fill shallow birdbaths frequently. Deep birdbaths can harbor mosquito larvae; empty the stale water and refill.
- ✓ Spray shrubs and perennials for powdery mildew control.
- ✓ It's a great time from now into the fall to plant any perennials and especially fall-flowering perennials.
- Prune summer bloomers. Shrubs that bloom in summer may be pruned in August. A light pruning to remove spent blooms and reshape the shrub is best.

All the Free Fun of the Fair At the 2016 Wilmot Terry Fox Run

The Wilmot Terry Fox Run is aiming to build on last year's record-breaking success by moving to a new venue.

The cancer fundraiser is leaving its previous location in Scott Park, and moving to Norm Hill Park in New Hamburg. The non-competitive event for people of all ages and abilities will start and finish at the Jacob Street gates of the Fall Fair. Participants can choose between the new 4.1km or 8.4km routes.

The annual event takes place on the second Sunday after Labour Day, which this year is September 18. That coincides with the last day of the New Hamburg Fall Fair, which is organized by the Wilmot Agricultural Society. The venue change follows a suggestion by Wilmot Agricultural Society board member, Spencer Hammond. Hammond pitched the idea to the board, who agreed to the proposal.

The Wilmot Agricultural Society is offering all Wilmot Terry Fox Run participants free entry to the Fall Fair on Sunday, following the completion of their route. "It's kind of a second thank you," said Hammond.

The Wilmot Agricultural Society is also donating space for the Wilmot Terry Fox Run's first ever silent auction, which will be held in the New Hamburg Community Centre on Saturday, September 17, the day before the run. At the time of writing, about 30 auction items have been offered by businesses and individuals from across the township. All proceeds from the auction will be donated to the Terry Fox Foundation.

Breakfast for Terry



Gordijk, are planning additional events, which they'll be announcing in the coming weeks. This is their fourth year coordinating the local event.

The official fundraising total for the 2015 run was \$14,305, a big improvement on the previous year's \$2,625. The year -over-year percentage increase was the highest in Ontario.

All Terry Fox Runs are organized by volunteers, and 84 cents of every dollar raised for the Terry Fox Foundation is used for cancer research.


