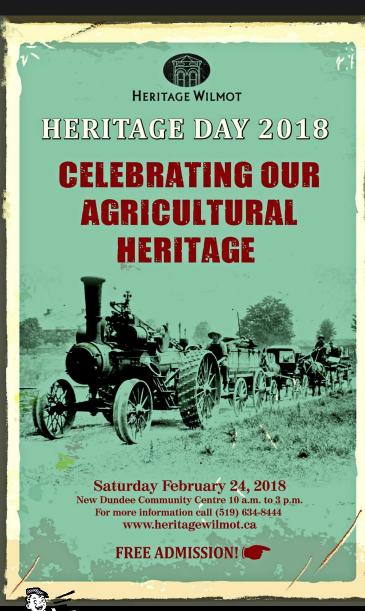

g with Ed Pat and I just spent a wonderful week with Ron and Gwen Cook, Pat's brother and sister-in-law, at Samba Vallarta in Nuevo Vallarta, Mexico. We enjoy this area, as it is so easy to skip out and do side-trips to local spots. We did an outing to Puerto Vallarta and walked the malecon (boardwalk), and also made a trip 15 minutes north to

Keeping Your Pets Warm and Safe

Baby, it's cold outside! How true that is this winter....Brrrr! With the extreme temperatures we've had this season, you need to be aware of the threats that the cold can pose to your pets.

When the temperature drops below freezing, pets should not be left outside for extended periods. Cats, short-coated dogs, and puppies are particularly vulnerable in cold temperatures. Keep cats indoors and protect your dogs from frostbite or hypothermia by taking them outside only for short periods during cold weather. Consider slipping your short-coated dog or puppy into a comfortable dog sweater or coat as an extra layer of warmth. Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth. As well, when bathing your dog during winter months, ensure they are completely dry before taking them outside.

Arthritic and elderly pets may have more difficulty walking on snow and ice and may be more prone to slipping and falling. Long-haired or thick-coated dogs tend to be more cold-tolerant, but are still at risk in cold weather. Short-legged pets may become cold

faster because their bellies and bodies are more likely to come into contact with snow -covered ground.



Check your dog's paws frequently for signs of coldweather injury or damage, such as cracked paw pads or bleeding. During a walk, a sudden lameness may be due to an injury or may be due to ice accumulation between their toes. You may be able to reduce the chance of ice ball accumulation by clipping the hair between your dog's toes.

During walks, your dog's feet, legs and belly may pick up de-icers, antifreeze, or other chemicals that could be toxic. When you get back inside, wipe down (or wash) your pet's feet, legs and belly to remove these chemicals and reduce the risk that your dog will ingest these toxins when they lick their feet or fur. Consider using pet-safe de-icers on your property to protect your pets and the others in your neighborhood.

If your pet is whining, shivering, seems anxious, slows down or stops moving, seems weak, or starts looking for warm places to burrow, get them back inside quickly because they are showing signs of hypothermia. Frostbite is harder to detect, and may not be fully recognized until a few days after the damage is done. If you suspect your pet has hypothermia or frostbite, consult your veterinarian immediately.

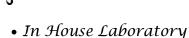
Keeping this in mind, everyone can get outside and enjoy the snow safely. Have fun! ... Or just take a nap, spring will be here soon.

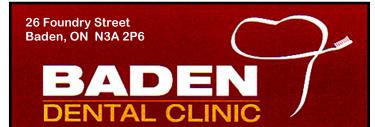
Baden ~ Our Town

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Ask Armand ~

Judy from Baden asks – I've lived in Baden all my life and there has always been a town library. When did it first arrive in town?

Armand says – Interesting question Judy, with lots of history! Actually the library was once called the Mechanics' Institutes, which were the forerunners of public libraries and adult education.

The origin of mechanics' institutes is attributed to Dr George Birkbeck, who in 1799 gave a series of free lectures for the working men of Glasgow. At the time, 'mechanic' meant artisan, tradesman, or working man. The definition became more specific over time, especially during the Industrial Revolution when workers became increasingly associated with machinery. Mechanics' Institutes were established throughout Britain and its colonies including Canada, New Zealand, America and Australia.

The green building to the east of the Baden Emporium was originally the site of Fred Sehl's Tin Shop, which was in operation from 1883 until 1972. The upper level of this building also housed the Baden Mechanics' Institute that was initiated by James Livingston and established in 1889.

The Mechanics' Institute closed its doors around the turn of the century. The books remained on the shelves gathering dust until 1957 when the Baden Public Library was reopened under the sponsorship of the Baden Community Group. The books were transferred to the old township hall on Beck Street to the part of the building that held the jury room, when the court was held in that hall (the building is now at Black Creek Pioneer Village).

In 1958 it became a member of the Waterloo County Library Co-operative and received 100 books exchanged four times a year. In 1966 it became necessary to relocate again to Foundry Street as Centennial Hall was being built. In 1983 the library moved again to its current location on Snyder's Road East.



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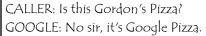

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Baden Birding ~ The "Common Raven"

Nevermore! At least, that is what people in south western Ontario thought about the possibility of sighting of the Common Raven around the Waterloo County area when I was growing up. Habitat destruction (the cutting of forests), the poisoning of unwanted wildlife such as coyotes, wolves, raccoons and rats which the scavenger Ravens feasted on, indiscriminate shooting of birds for various reasons such as protecting free run chickens, target practice, and fun – all of this reduced the

However, the slow recolonization of these magnificent birds is finally taking place. The 1987 Atlas of the Breeding Birds of Ontario showed a slow, but steady southerly progression of nesting Ravens through central Ontario and the Bruce Peninsula, with the most southerly confirmed nesting site near Kolapore, south of Thornbury. In the last ten years, sightings of Ravens in Waterloo, Wellington, and Perth have become much more common. Often young, unmated birds will be seen near landfill sites where these scavengers can pick up a free meal. The landfill, however, is not an easy site in which to operate. Crows, a sworn enemy of the Raven, tend to congregate here as do gulls of various species and Turkey Vultures. Competition is rough. This is not a good place for a mated pair to raise a family!

population of Ravens to the point of extirpation

in Ontario south of Lake Huron's north shore.

A quiet place in a high rise somewhere in the country would be better! Something like a very tall tree, a ledge on a cliff, power line towers and posts, or perhaps the upper steps on the side of a silo would be better. Courtship starts in early February, followed by nest building in March and early April. The nest is put together using fresh sticks up to a metre long and 2.5 cm thick. Only one brood is attempted each year as the 3-7 eggs



require an incubation period of 20-25 days. The young are hatched almost featherless and require a nesting period of one to two months before they are ready to take to the air and start to learn life skills from their parents.

Ravens seem to be very adept learners and communicators. They easily pass on information to other Ravens, and have been known to solve very complex, multi-stage problems. They

have also been documented to be able to tell individual people from each other in a crowd! Some researchers actually think that Ravens work with hunting wolves to find and identify likely prey, and therefore the Ravens get to share in the feast after a kill. Research on Isle Royale in Lake Superior has also attributed the size of an ideal wolf pack (4) to the need to feed both species involved in the hunt.

So, how do you tell a crow from a Raven? (I assume you will be keeping a watch out for them from now on.) Mature Ravens are about one and one half times the size of a crow. They are all black: legs, feathers, and eyes. They will often be seen beside the road eating road kill. Sometimes they will fly straight down the centre line of a road while looking for road kill. A crow's tail is rounded while a Raven's is wedge shaped. When a crow flies, it appears to be "swimming" through the air and it sometimes soars for short distances with its wings slightly raised, while a Raven flies with a less exaggerated flapping, and often soars for long periods of time. Crows "caw" while Ravens "croak" and imitate many sounds around them - some would make you believe that there is a fire truck in the area.

If you find a Raven, spend some time watching it; you will be amazed and ready to search online to find out more about this really interesting species which has been repatriated to our area.

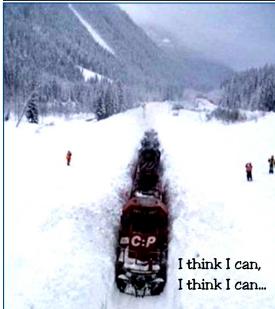

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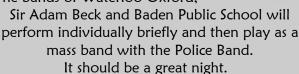

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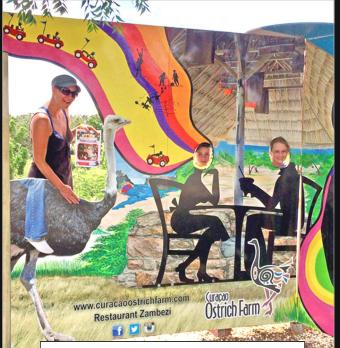

Taking Care of Mommy's Body

I hope everyone is happy and healthy! I'm exhilarated to have the pleasure of sharing that my wife and I have welcomed a third little person into our family. Colette was born on January 17th, 2018 at 7lbs 7oz. Mom and baby are doing great and my two boys are adjusting well. As having a newborn is top of my mind I'd like to share some information from the Ontario Chiropractic Association regarding life with newborns. Lifting

- Stand with your feet at least shoulder-width apart.

Bring your baby as close to your chest as possible, and then lift using both arms.

Carrying

- When carrying your little one, pivot with your feet instead of twisting your back.
- This will ensure that you're turning with your hips, which will reduce your risk of back pain.
- Lower your child into the crib or onto the floor by bending at the knees, with a neutral back.

Holding

- Hold your child in an upright position, directly against your chest.
- Carrying a child on one hip creates postural imbalances that can lead to low back pain over time.

Feeding

- Always sit in a chair with back support and avoid leaning forward to reach your newborn's mouth.
- Instead, use pillows or blankets to support and position your baby closer to you.

Exercise

- Exercise can help increase muscle support for your aching back.

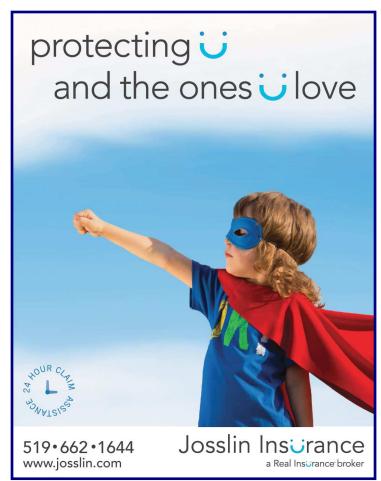


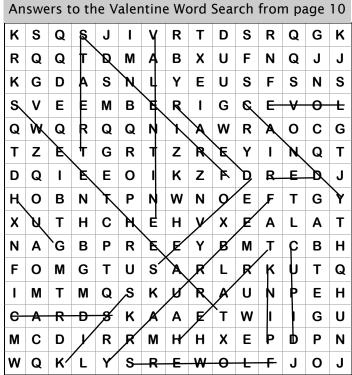

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I hope your new year is starting out to be a healthy one. At this time of year, we often feel we need to make a New Year's resolution to improve our health; then for some reason as the months go by, the motivation drops off. I have found that there could be many reasons this happens, such as making too many changes at once, or choosing a type of exercise that doesn't really fit YOU or your lifestyle, which can leave you feeling overwhelmed and stressed. These changes should be bringing health and peace, not stress. It's best to begin gradually so that the changes you make will become a true everyday habit. So, as I always say, make the changes one step at a time! The benefits will motivate you in and of themselves.

If you want to make a New Year's resolution, read the below list of ideas and begin with one that speaks to you the most. There is no specific order, except that I would say to increase water if you don't already get 10-12 cups a day. Increase by 1 cup every few days. Mark the start date and work towards a 3-4 week completed date. Keeping a mood/food journal will help you SEE the results.

Hydrate: Work up to 10-12 cups (8 oz ea.) each day; herbal tea is inclusive. This may decrease headaches, constipation, sore muscles, and dry skin, among other things.

Sleep: Get 7-9 hours of sleep each night. This supports your immune system, hormone balancing, productiveness, decreases stress, and anti-aging. Try to get to sleep by 10 or 11 PM for best results.

Manage stress: Do you have generalized fear or anxiety? This stress increases cortisol levels that can disrupt hormones, making it difficult to maintain a healthy weight. It also inhibits digestion and can cause ulcers.

Consume whole, live, natural foods: Choose seasonal products with a variety of colour for improved nutrient and gut health. Cooked vegetables should be slightly crunchy so they are not over cooked, losing their nutrients. A good rule to follow, because we like some easy meals, is 80% whole foods and 20% fast foods, while still choosing the best of fast foods. **Eat fresh food, mostly plants and lots of water.**

Consume grass fed beef: It actually contains omega 3 fat, no cholesterol. Also, free-range/organic fed poultry, wild caught fish (not farmed), organic pork are better choices for you. Humanely raised is another option, but what have they been fed? Too much meat in the diet, however, can cause the body to become too acidic which is the environment for disease to flourish.

Fermented Foods: These foods, such as naturally fermented sauerkraut (no vinegar used), kefir, miso, kombucha, and tempeh, nourish the good bacteria in the gut to support your immune system to fight disease and pathogens.

Exercise: Your body was made to move, so move it to increase insulin sensitivity of the muscles, circulation to the brain, and to relieve stress. Start gradually so you aren't so sore that you don't ever want to do it again. Walking is a great way to start or if you already walk, add some strength training 2 x a week after a 5-minute warm-up.

Regular cleansing: Cleanse with seasonal greens and vegetables in the spring and fall every year. You want to move estrogen out so it doesn't build up and cause cancer, regulate the content of the blood such as sugars, fats, proteins, and hormones which are messengers from other parts of the body, and balance mood.

Menu Planning: This can be done once a week or once a month, whatever fits into your schedule. You can even plan a day to cook some meals and freeze them for those days you have no time to cook. The benefits to meal planning are wonderful!

What the Dickens?

In the January issue we featured these 2 items that were brought to our attention and asked whether our readers might know what they were. Well, thanks so much to Steve Kadlecik of Baden who sent in the following response:



The first item is what I believe to be part of a leather cutting device which

was used a lot in the harness making industry. What is shown looks like the knife portion and the measuring part is missing.

The harness maker would set the width of strap required on the gauge and push the knife through the length of the hide following a previously made straight edge on the leather. The guide would follow much like



a fence on a table saw. This would produce a parallel cut the length of the hide.

The second items are probably Luthier's clamps.

A Luthier is a person who builds or repairs stringed instruments. Many of these clamps would be used around the profile of the instrument at once as the top and bottom are glued to the sides. You will notice there is not much length to the clamp as most guitars etc. are not much wider than four inches or so.

Winter has been offering interesting variations this year, with major temperature swings. No matter! Some of you have already received your seed orders and some of you may be thinking of starting to look at catalogues. When buying seeds, some of the terminology can be confusing.

Seedy Language:



F1/Hybrid: a cross between two first-generation varieties. When you save seed, the resulting plantings will be an unpredictable mix.

GMO: Genetically modified or genetically engineered (GE) has genetic material from the same or different species (plant or animal) spliced together. Example: blue rose from Australia is result of delphinium spliced with the rose. In Canada, the **only** GMOs grown are corn, canola, soybeans, sugar beets, and the Arctic Apple.

Heirloom: or heritage variety is open-pollinated and sometimes defined as a variety older than 50 years. Seed of Diversity is an organization that searches out, preserves, perpetuates, studies, and encourages the cultivation of heirloom and endangered varieties of food crops. www.seeds.ca

OP: Open-pollinated. Plants self-pollinate or pollinate with the same variety of plant. Best for those who save seeds and follow procedures to get the same plants again.



Some Weedy Stuff!!

The common blue violet (Viola sororia) is most abundant in eastern Canada and United States. It has familiar small flowers that range in color from deep purple to creamy white, and heart-shaped leaves that form a graceful spiral when they first emerge. The genus has been invoked as a symbol of love and modesty. Still, as beloved as violets are, they are considered weeds by many people, especially

those seeking perfect lawns. Like most 'weeds', they are very resilient and have multiple strategies for reproducing. They thrive in partial shade and enjoy lots of moisture, and they can be stubborn to eradicate. Their dense, fibrous root system allows them to bounce back after mowing, and they can reproduce vegetatively via underground stems, or rhizomes. In my previous home garden, I had a naturalized corner in my garden and did not find them invasive. They were planted with native ginger and others, and seemed to keep each other in check. They are lovely in rock gardens and can be used as a ground cover.

Emmanuel Lutheran Church Ladies Aid Celebrate 70 Years of Service

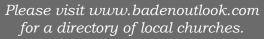

- 3. From Malnutrition to Strength in Burkina Faso A gift of health supports community health initiatives, mental health outreaches, and care for people living with HIV. Around the world, MCC promotes water, sanitation, and hygiene projects that give people ways to take active roles in protecting their own health and preventing disease.
