




Baden's Fishing Derby June 3


The Baden Community Association is hoping for blue sky and sunshine to join us for the annual fishing derby, at the Millpond on Foundry Street.

king with ed As I sit for my 6th year on town council, I have made it a mission to keep politics and our paper separate. But this news from a recent council meeting I couldn't resist sharing. ..and sometimes it is my duty to share.



The Auditors at Graham Mathew Professional Corporation gave a report of the audited financial statements for 2016 for Wilmot Township at the April 24th council meeting. Mike Arndt started the presentation by saying that the township submitted the report to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing on April 13, 2017 (exact same date as last year) and was one of the first municipalities to do so. This timely submission of the FIR will ensure that the township will continue to receive Ontario Municipal Partnership Funding from the Ministry of Finance. He gave a glowing review of the township's financial state of affairs, the township's finance departments, and the other five departments' ability to control costs and revenue.

Here are just a few of the points that were highlighted by the auditing company:

- Wilmot Township has one of the lowest tax increases year over year in Waterloo Region.
- The township has no debt. They have a state of the art recreation centre, and are increasing their trail system each vear.
- They have increased their reserves and reserve funds from 2.5 million in 2011 to 7.2 million in 2016.
- They have dropped their tax arrears per capita from 5.54% in 2011 to 2.80% in 2016.
- They have increased their equity income from Kitchener Power Corporation from 702,000 in 2011 to 802,000 in 2016.
- The township has increased its cash balance from \$9,003,582 in 2015 to \$10,804,063 in 2016.

This is all very good news for anyone living in Wilmot Township. I am sure you are wondering, "How do they do

it?" One of the best tools that is used is the Asset Management Plan and the 10 year capital forecast where all departments slot in their requirements over the next ten years. An example of this would be road reconstruction. Traffic counts are done on many of the heavily travelled roads throughout the township. Next, the condition of the road is factored in and then dates are allocated to the project. Service vehicles are also slotted in to the appropriate year. An average life span of a truck for the township is ten years and then it is replaced. The ten year forecast is a floating document and some projects have to be moved ahead or back as

circumstances arise. An example of that is the purchase of large generators for the local fire stations and the Wilmot Rec Centre. They were not on the list at all but after some ice storms and power outages, it was deemed important for the residents to have warming stations to use. Hopefully they don't have to be used, but they are there if needed.

The township is also helped by a competitive bidding process for jobs. Their new online bidding system (bids.wilmot.ca) has proved to be a valuable tool. Wilmot also tries to take advantage of senior government funding programs. An example of this is the recent 1.2 million dollar grant from the province under the OCIF funding program to repair the Holland Mills Bridge.

The township is very good at forward thinking. The newly proposed industrial lands between Nafziger Road and Hamilton Road will provide employment opportunities for residents living in Wilmot Township in the near future. They are also working with the Waterloo Region School Board for the joint creation of an artificial turf field which can be used by the township and school.

The township is the tax collector, but only receives 24% of the monies collected. Another 23% goes to the school board and 53% to the Region of Waterloo. I am very proud of the staff at the township, where everyone has the same focus and desire for the residents of Wilmot Township to have a great quality of life and a sound footing. Sitting in my position, I will say it helps that the Mayor and councillors work well together, and they all bring something different to the horseshoe to make things happen. Until next month...Ed


It is a busy time for the Baden Community Association! On Sunday April 23^{rd,} the BCA held their annual Earth Day



Spring has Sprung, Get the Bounce Back into your Pets ~ By Dr. Rebecca Ricker

Spring brings visions of sunshine and flowers, but it also brings some particularly seasonal health issues for your pet. Some of the things we more commonly see in the spring are:

- Lameness Our pets see more of the outdoors in the nicer weather. Dogs often get more frequent and longer walks and potentially some dog park visits. Remember that our pets are just as excited as us to get out and run in the warm weather. But also remember they haven't been as active over the winter. They don't have indoor gyms to help them maintain their athletic physique. Taking them on more frequent controlled walks will allow them to regain their athleticism without injury. In a very short time they will be able to get back to running and playing at full speed with less chance for injury.
- Abscesses Cats that go outdoors are also excited to reestablish their territories. This often leads to cat fights and, unfortunately, to nasty abscesses that often need medical attention. Keeping them inside is always recommended, but if that's not possible, then keeping them under a watchful eye and on a leash with a harness is a way to prevent them from these unfortunate encounters.
- GI Upset Our pets also eat more junk in the spring. They have access to anything that presents itself as the snow melts. And there is A LOT of unidentifiable stuff! This can



lead to a nasty gastroenteritis which can present as lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea, or all three!

- Intestinal Parasites Although always a threat, intestinal parasites are more prevalent in warmer weather. The poopscicles that were left behind in the winter thaw in the spring, and as they melt they release any intestinal worm eggs they contained into the environment. Once in the soil, these parasites can be easily picked up by another pet in the spring. It is always a good idea to get your pet's stool checked with a fecal exam during your annual examination at your veterinarian.
- External Parasites Other parasites, like fleas, ticks, and mosquitos, become more prevalent in the warmer temperatures. These parasites can carry serious diseases like heartworm and Lyme disease, as well as being very irritating to your pet. Prevention should be discussed with your veterinarian and a specific plan can be made to fit the specific needs of your pet.
- Allergies Some of our pets have allergies. For many of these pets, the spring is the beginning of a very difficult time, full of itching, scratching and licking. Contact your veterinarian as soon as your pet begins the spring itch. Earlier intervention not only gives early relief, but also can lessen the severity of the itching season. Together, you can devise a plan to help your pet find relief!

Picking your Pooch..

It's easy to fall in love with a wiggly, fuzzy puppy and you're sure you'll enjoy your new pet. Then you get it home and the training begins, they begin to grow and perhaps even cramp your lifestyle. Now what?



It's so important to plan ahead before jumping in to being a dog owner. You must consider many things like where you live, whether in an apartment or a country property, considering the size of your dog or the amount of barking or area to play. One must consider your lifestyle matching the energy level of a dog so that it gets the proper exercise it needs. Also to realize the cost of owning a pet, food, toys, grooming and vet expenses. Once you have connected with your dog the natural need to care for it arises, but sometimes not, and the pet is turned away for adoption or worse. It's hard on a dog, to be sent away after bonding with you and adjusting to a new life.

Harold from Kitchener asks - I have a wooden box which is 12 inches wide and 19 inches tall and

long, with a hinged top. On the ends of the box the markings read, "4 DOZ - 1/2-LB-TINS ENGLISH MUSTARD". There is also a large label reading "ENGLISH MUSTARD" on the front and a large paper label on the inside of the lid. This covers the whole lid and is very decorative, with animals, medals, etc. On the outside of the lid, written in heavy black ink is "Geo G. Peppler Co. Baden". I am most curious and would appreciate any information available on this person.

Armand Says—George G. Peppler was born in Wilmot Township on March 1, 1863. In the 1871 and 1881 Canada Census he is shown as living in Woolwich Township. The Region of Waterloo posted that on May 9, 1883, the tender of George Peppler & Co. to paint the West Montrose bridge with oil paint for \$74.25 was accepted. I am assuming that in George's early career he was a painter. George G. Peppler later moved to Tavistock where his wife Agnes Bedford gave birth to one child, Edna Winnifred Peppler. George and his brother ran a General Store in Tavistock until he died on October 10, 1930 in Woodstock. Through my investigations I found nothing about his life in Baden. Great question, Harold, and I am sorry I cannot find more Baden related information about that box, but maybe one of our readers can.

Further to last month's column - the Dominion Linseed Companies Foundry was originally built by Jacob Beck.



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Baden Birding ~ The Great Blue Heron

he Great Blue Heron is a bird that draws the attention of both children and adults because of its near two metre wing span. It is most often seen in flight powered by its slow graceful wing beats.

Getting a close look at one of these majestic birds is worth the effort. This blue-grey bodied bird is especially attractive during breeding season when a bright yellow beak contrasts sharply with the white head and black cap line. When viewed at close range, long fluffy, feathery plumes are visible on the back, neck, and back of head.

Seeing one of these long legged birds land successfully in a tree may come as a real surprise. Even more of a surprise may be that they nest high in trees, usually in a colony with other Great Blue Herons.

A small active heronry (only four visible nests), can be seen at the south west corner of the Hwy 7 and Queen St/Notre Dame Drive interchange. The large stick nests are more easily seen in winter and early spring before leaves have emerged.

Unfortunately herons may abandon their nest site if disturbed by humans even in a superficial way during nest building, egg laying, and incubation stages. Older chicks, if alarmed, may fall from the nest and face certain death. Consequently, it is ethically wise to keep all human activity well away from an active heronry during the sensitive nesting period. Fortunately heronries are often in wet areas relatively free of human activity.

After the male charms a female at a heronry, they form a monogamous relationship lasting for one season. New partners are chosen the following year.

Great Blue Herons share parenting responsibilities quite equally. During nest building, the male collects sticks and presents them to his mate who intertwines them while building a saucer-like nest. The nest, approximately 60 cm across, may be used multiple years by different birds and grows in size each year. Colonial nesting helps herons avoid predation. Having many eyes and ears is advantageous and a high density of nests with a finite number of predators limits losses.

The female lays 2-6 eggs, each about two days apart. Incubation begins after the first egg is laid. Each egg takes approximately 4 weeks to



hatch. Both parents share incubation duties, the male often working the daytime hours while the female covers the night shift. This rotation is continued after the young hatch. The first to hatch is usually about two days old by the time the next sibling arrives so it has significant advantages over later arrivals.

Adults may travel several kilometres from the heronry to their own favourite hunting grounds. A heron often stands stock-still for lengthy periods of time in shallow water watching for prey. If nothing approaches, a second technique employs a slow motion wade while keeping a keen eye for prey. When prey is within striking distance the heron suddenly uncoils its body and neck while plunging its head into the water, catching the prey sideways between its upper and lower bill. Specially adapted vertebrae allow the heron's neck to curl into an S shape and then to be thrust forward with blistering speed. Caught fish are swallowed head first in a big gulp.

The diet of the Great Blue Heron consists mainly of fish but includes almost anything it can catch, including mice, frogs, snakes, cravfish, young birds and aquatic invertebrates. After a successful fishing expedition the adult returns to the nest where it regurgitates food for the hatchlings.

The young are helpless and almost naked when they hatch and require constant parental protection from predators and elements. By the time the chicks are two weeks old they are standing and spreading their wings. At six weeks of age they are walking the nest edge and abutting tree branches and at eight weeks flying awkwardly. At ten weeks they become independent and leave their parents. The colony then begins to disband.

If the breeding season has been successful, the colony will be resurrected by these distinguished wetland waders the following spring.

The planting season is here!!! The garden centres are abuzz with gardeners searching for new varieties as well as tried and true varieties. There are so many choices that it can be overwhelming. Knowledgeable nursery staff can help. Are you looking for plants for your hot/dry, shade/dry, shade/wet or other challenges in your garden? Know your soil type, and for containers and garden, know if sun, partial shade or full shade is needed. To keep your water bills down, look for drought tolerant varieties.



This month's native tree: Common hackberry, Celtis occidentalis (Zone 3-9), a member of the Elm family, has become a popular alternative to elm trees for the last few decades because it is immune to Dutch elm disease. Up to 15 m tall, the hardy hackberry can grow in most soil types, varying pH and from wet to dry soils. It is a very adaptable tree. It develops a broad crown with arching branches with characteristic corky ridges and warts on trunk and

branches in a vase-like shape. It tolerates strong winds, pollution, heat, drought, and salt. Hackberry is well suited to urban environments. It is tolerant of some shade. The sweet fruits of common hackberry are eaten by small mammals and many birds and the leaves are food for many kinds of caterpillars. A great tree for our wildlife! www.ontario.ca/page/northern-hackberry

Beware of garden guerrillas! Ground covers sound so lovely. They are low maintenance gardening options that provide an alternative to mulching and more. But the side effects!! Sometimes they cover much more ground that you planned - overrunning your yard, the neighbours' and possibly native areas!! Lily of the valley, goutweed, periwinkle, false lamium, garlic chives, snow-in-summer, crown vetch, gooseneck loosestrife, obedient plant (except 'miss manners') and more. Watch for descriptions: quick spreader, vigourous, fills in rapidly. Use ground cover, which is great in the right place, as in a very contained area surrounded by an impenetrable barrier. Avoid growing near any natural areas as they will invade and squeeze out all native plants. At the nursery, ask a knowledgeable staff member the growing traits of your selections.



For bird lovers, some sources suggest using yarn scraps, twine or other material as outside nesting material for songbirds. While the intentions are good, please do NOT do this. Nature provides lots of material and most material you would put out is synthetic and does not degrade. Birds can get tangled in it and it can prove fatal.

Spring Bulbs are just passing their glorious state. Remember to record where you would like more colour next year so you know where and what to plant this fall.



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

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Digestive Health: Amazing Sourdough

Have you been encouraged to stop eating carbohydrates? Do you think it will help you lose weight or worse, have you been convinced that carbohydrates, especially grains, are bad for you? It is a shame that such misinformation circulates and so many people are confused about this important food group, but it just shows that we need to apply some common sense before we remove food groups from our diet.

But what if you have a digestion issue with grains and specifically bread? Does that mean for sure you should avoid them? No. Before you remove anything, try sourdough bread. What is sourdough? A traditional method of fermenting grains to make bread. It has many benefits and is much more digestible.

Fermenting grains creates prebiotic substances from the starches in the flour to aid gut health so sourdough is a great food for feeding the good bacteria. The fermentation process also makes nutrients more available, as it does with all fermented foods. However, the process of sourdough also adds B-vitamins that were not there before the fermentation occurred.

This makes sense since sourdough is a combination of good bacteria and yeast, 100 times more good bacteria than yeast, as it happens. Also, wild yeast strains are definitely

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

present, since this is what makes the bread rise to give it an amazing, light texture. And yeast is a great source of B-vitamins.

The acid nature, or the "sour" of sourdough, aids in pre-digestion of the protein molecules in the grain, especially



The gluten must be completely degraded in order for a celiac to tolerate it, and this would make it quite sour tasting. Some experiments involved using fully-degraded sourdough mixed with fresh gluten-free grains (added after fermentation to lessen the sour taste) which makes these breads suitable for celiacs.

If you want to try sourdough, look for bakers in your area who are making traditional sourdough bread. This is a delicious adventure for you take. A quick google search of "sourdough" and the name of the city or town where you live could make it easier to find someone local. Try Louie's Sourdough bread at the St.Jacob's Market. Just the best!

And if you cannot find a source in your area, you can order it online and have it shipped to you.

When you do find a source, cut yourself a slice, and drizzle it with some virgin olive oil or cultured butter. Enjoy!

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Achilles Heel will Hopefully Heal!

In Greek Mythology Achilles' heel was his weakness, which eventually led to his demise. It is now commonly known as pain in the same area as his famous weakness, the Achilles Tendon! Achilles tendinopathy is often debilitating and can prevent many people from participating in activities. Commonly, individuals will experience pain walking up stairs, jumping, or running. Achilles tendon pain is more common in younger athletic individuals, whereas insertional Achilles tendon pain (where the tendon meets the heel bone) and enthesopathy (bone growth) is more common in older sedentary individuals.

There have been a few theories on why people get pain from this condition. The condition is now known as Achilles tendinopathy, as opposed to the traditional, or outdated, Achilles tendinitis. Studies do not show that inflammation is the only culprit involved with this condition, despite it being a theory of the cause of the pain. The major pain theories can be put into three main categories: 1) collagen tearing / disruption; 2) an inflammatory process; 3) responses at the cellular level in the tendon. These tendon issues have more recently been viewed as a continuum, where the tendon can shift from one stage of categorization, to another, and back again. The continuum model describes the stages of a tendinopathy as: healthy / normal tendon \iff reactive tendon \iff tendon disrepair \iff degenerative tendon \implies rupture / tear. The reactive tendon usually follows an overload or direct

trauma, and is characterized as a noninflammatory adaptive reactionary thickening / stiffening in an attempt to reduce strain. If rest or reduced overload follows, the tendon should return to a normal level of health. Tendon disrepair is characterized as an attempt of tendon healing which may



present with new pathways and increased blood flow. This

stage appears with chronically overloaded tendons, which may also appear to have thickened. Degenerative tendons have physical changes to them as well as to their cells. Some can even have areas of cell death, disorganized



tendon fibers, and cells that break down. What can make this condition extra difficult to treat is variable stages of disease may coexist in different areas on a single tendon.

Examples of pain reduction strategies include proper warm up prior to activity, strengthening exercises, muscle release to the tight muscles, and acupuncture. Orthotics may also be helpful to help correct any foot or mechanical issues that could contribute to the pain. As always, resolving the issue and individualized patient goals should be at the forefront of treatments.



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



"Get It Together" ~ In the Bathroom

Between regular bathroom cleanings, keep things looking good with the 'Daily Swish and Swipe'. Be sure that you have a good supply of hand towels for your bathroom. Each day at some point when you are in the bathroom, use the damp hand towel to give the sink, taps and other surfaces a quick wipe, then toss the towel into the laundry.

Bathrooms are often fairly small and with limited storage. Look this area over as you haven't before for every available inch of usable space. Look high, look low... Pull everything out and clean drawers and cabinets. Don't just open up doors and drawers and say, "Ok, I want all this stuff". Physically touch each item! If you don't use it, lose it!

Have you accumulated bubble bath and lotions that you don't like or use (or have received as gifts)? Give them to friends, the food bank, or women's shelters.

In order to make best use of your space and get towels readily dried, consider colour coding your towels. If each member of the family has a designated colour, it makes it easy for them to re-use their towels as they will know whose is whose. This also saves on the amount of wash that needs doing. Take it one step further and think about storing each person's towel on the back of their bedroom door. If your bathroom drying space is limited this might work well for your family!

When it comes to quantities of towels and storing them effectively, ask yourself "how many towels do I need?" We often have too many



towels and are trying to fit them all into a very limited storage space. Anything that is worn and tattered can be bagged and marked as 'rags' and taken to the Thrift Shop. Think about how often you do the wash and how many people are in the family. Keep only a reasonable amount of towels that can be stored in a way that makes clean ones easy to put away and keeps the storage space pleasing to the eye. Guest towels and seasonal towels (i.e. Christmas and beach towels) can be stored elsewhere and not in the prime real estate of your vanity or linen closet.

Organizing is all about making the best use of space and your valuable time!

- * MAKE-UP sort what you use daily and store it in a spot for quick retrieval. Things that you use only for special occasions need to be stored separately. No sense wasting time rooting by what is seldom used to get at what you use daily.
- * UNDER THE SINK take full advantage of the space. Maybe you could install an extra shelf (there are great adjustable ones available that you can assemble yourself and work around the pipes). Maybe you could mount a caddy on the inside of door to store your hair tools.
- * **CLEANING PRODUCTS** what about mounting a tension rod under the sink to hang cleaners on OR create a small caddy that has your necessary supplies in it?




To Canada with love from Wilmot -






The farmer friend read the Will patiently, and after giving due thought he brought one of his own horses over and added it to the 17. That increased the total to 18 horses.
