#### ~ Just Name it!

Canada has about 350,000 official place names. These include names of populated places, bodies of water, and geographical features such as mountains. Place names have a wide variety of origins including Aboriginal languages, royalty, politicians,

soldiers, community founders, famous people, religion, and other towns and cities.

In 1835, Jacques Cartier noted that an Iroquoian Leader called the area of Quebec City "Kanata" (Canada) and Ontario was named by the Huron, meaning "Handsome Lake". Ottawa, Thunder Bay, Swift Current, and Toronto are also names derived from Aboriginals.

Every province in Canada has examples of towns named after royalty. Some of the most famous towns include Victoria, Regina, Prince George, Kingston, Fredericton, and Charlottetown. The city of Guelph was named by John Galt, after the German ancestral family of George IV.

Ontario has several examples of towns named after politicians and soldiers. Brockville was named after Isaac Brock, hero of the war of 1812, and Amherstburg was named after Jeffery Amherst, the victor at Louisbourg. Kitchener was known as Berlin from 1854 to 1916, when it was renamed after Lord Horatio Herbert Kitchener following his death at sea off the Orkney Islands.

Community founders have been honoured by towns named after them in Ontario. George Hamilton (1785-1835) was a founder of Hamilton; Noah Timmins (Timmins), Peter Robinson (Peterborough), and Lawrence Orange (Orangeville) are other illustrations. Many Ontario towns have been named from Anglo -Celtic origins. Pembroke, Sudbury, Windsor, Woodstock, Listowel, Stratford, and Brampton all are examples of this.

So what about Wilmot Township town names? **Baden** was originally known as Weissenburg, after an old bachelor who lived in the village (it was also known as Cambro). In 1854, Jacob Beck officially named the town Baden after his home town of Baden-Baden, Germany. In 1834, New Hamburg was known as Cassel. Near the end of the 1830s the town name was changed to Hamburg, after the German city, and in 1851 changed again to New Hamburg.

Petersburg derived its name from Peter Wilker a native of Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany who settled in the community in the 1830s. St. Agatha was originally named Wilmot; its origins began in 1824, but the village was later named St. Agatha in 1852. John

**Dundee** in 1830, and built a dam on the Alder Creek.

The village of **Mannheim** was named for the German city on the Rhine River, an area from which many German immigrants to Waterloo County had originated. Its earliest sawmill was established in 1845 on Alder Creek. Shingletown was also known as Schindelsteddle and

Victoriasburg (probably after Queen Victoria), and had a small industry which manufactured shingles. Wilmot Centre, once the seat of township government in Wilmot Township, has the Town Hall shown on the south side of Bleams Road on Tremaine's 1861 map of Waterloo County. Last but not least, Punkydoodle's **Corners** has two different stories of its origins. The first story is that a German tavern keeper sang his version of "Yankee Doodle", which came out sounding like "Punkey Doodle": hence the fanciful name. The second story involves two

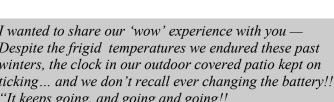

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Ah, spring! With winter finally over, we can get out and start enjoying the great outdoors once again. Make sure you bring your sunglasses along for the journey!

Think of sunglasses as sunscreen for the eyes. The strong rays of the sun damage your skin and cause a burn, and this can also be true for eyes. A "welder's flash" is a quick sunburn on the front of the eye and is *REALLY* painful, but you can also get sunburns on the back of the eye that can be painless yet permanently blinding. UV exposure also worsens cataracts and macular degeneration, making sunglasses a must for outdoor adventures.

Polarized lenses are great for people who love to be by the water – fishermen swear by them! They eliminate most of the glare from the waves but can also block some digital displays, so clocks and gas pump readouts can be hard to see with them on. Lenses can instead be tinted to become sunglasses, which allows for many more choices such as colour, darkness, and gradient patterns. Colour-changing lenses like Transitions® combine regular and sunglasses in one pair of glasses, but don't darken well when driving.

The colour that you choose for your lenses is mostly cosmetic. Some look better with the frame colour while some people are light-sensitive and go for dark gray. Certain

tints are better for sports where they enhance the contours of the terrain or make seeing a target easier. A clear coating can instead be put onto lenses to make them "sunglasses" in terms of UV protection but do not make them dark at all. Mirrors on the front of lenses are an option but they're just for fun, not function.

If you have a higher prescription, then here's some good news – your expensive lenses likely have UV protection built in!

Sunglasses are still nice to combat brightness, but they're not as essential as for those with low or no prescription.

Frame choice is important, too. Ones that wrap around your face or are oversized to prevent sun from getting to your eyes are best. Other than that, it's just a matter of what looks the most fabulous on you!

With glasses, you often get what you pay for. Good lens materials and coatings will cause less visual distortion and strain; however, even cheap sunglasses can protect your eyes if they are marked with "100% UVA & UVB protection" or very close to it.

Hopefully the springtime sun is shining right now, so make sure you protect your eyes to enjoy that sight for a long time to come!

#### **Fun Facts**

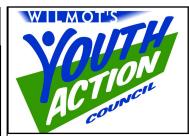

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#### Livingston Presbyterian Church Designated a Heritage Site

n Monday March 30, 2015, the Heritage Wilmot Advisory Committee, officially requested council to designate the Livingston Presbyterian Church located at 44 Beck Street as a heritage site. The church played a huge part in the history of Baden. The reasons for designation are based on several categories including historical and architectural values under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.

Members of the church formed about 1890, and the church was built in 1894/1895 by the initiative and generosity of local businessman James Livingston (owner of Castle Kilbride and Dominion Linseed). Over 50 congregational members made pledges worth over \$1,400 and James Livingston paid for the rest of the building, which totalled \$2,100 (James Livingston had donated the land). Baden churches at the time were predominately German services, and

this church offered services in English.

Over the years the Livingstons donated many pieces

J.P. Livingston, son of James, spearheaded an addition in 1935. Aside from that addition, the church has remained virtually unaltered.

includes all four exterior facades of the church. There are also the stained glass windows, the exterior doors with the original hardware, the tower, and the weathervane.

There are other notable features about the church. The church pews are gothic style, curved and made of Black ash. They

were originally purchased from the Globe Furniture Company in 1895 for \$275. On April 27, 1930, a baptismal font was donated in memory of James and Louise Livingston and Fredrick and Barbara Holwell, by their granddaughter, Laura Louise Livingston. James Livingston was a charter member of Wilmot Lodge number 318, constituted at Baden, in July 1874. He rose to the highest rank of the 33<sup>rd</sup> degree of the Scottish rite in 1887, the highest rank of the Masonic Lodge. The Lodge initially used a room in the Baden Hotel, but in 1951 moved to a room at the rear of the Presbyterian Church – it still holds its regular meetings there today.

The costs can be anywhere from \$15,000 to \$40,000 or more to have a solar panel system installed on your home and there are fantastic incentive programs available in Ontario.



When considering whether to purchase a home with solar panels here are some questions to ask:

#### Are the solar panels owned or leased?

If the solar panels are leased, the buyer would not only have to qualify to purchase the house, but **also** qualify to buy out the existing solar contract and take over the lease, perhaps for the next 15-17 years. Or a new buyer may ask the home owner to pay out the remaining contract for fear that the solar equipment will become dated or obsolete.

If the panels are owned, are the new home owners willing to take on the scheduled maintenance or cleaning that solar panels may require?

Cleaning keeps the panels working efficiently. There are professional solar panel cleaning companies that you can hire to care for them, but this must be considered as part of estimating any home maintenance costs.

# Does the seller remove solar panels from the roof to take with them to their next home? What type of damage might that cause to the roof?

Solar panels should be removed by a professional. Just as having to replace your shingles, there would be an extra cost to have the panels removed and reinstalled. If not done properly, removal of solar panels could lead to problems with leaks in the future.

#### Do solar panels affect a home's resale value?

If you find a buyer that is specifically looking for solar panels, you may re-coup most, if not all, of your investment. For less educated buyers, there is a lot to think about. Maybe a similar home for sale just down the street that doesn't have solar panels might be a more attractive choice. Which would you choose?

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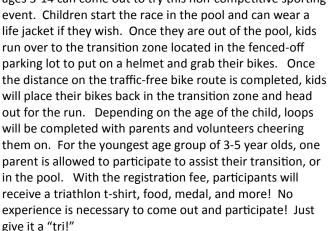

#### Baden Birding ~ The Northern Shrike

In December of 2014, I was driving along a gravel road just west of where we live near New Hamburg, when I saw a robin-sized bird with grey, black, and white markings perched on a hydro wire. Its colouration, size, shape and location (known as the 5 S System: Size, Shape, Sight, Site, Sound) helped me recognize it as a Northern Shrike (NOSH). Its cousin, the Loggerhead Shrike, which is similarly coloured but slightly smaller, is much too rare to make it a likely candidate. Although I have seen Northern

Shrikes in other locales, this was the first one I had ever seen in this area. The bird is usually seen in open country such as the open fields that surrounded us that day. We live in Waterloo County, but the bird was just across the border in Perth.

The NOSH is a little larger than an American Robin, with a mostly grey body and black wings with white bars. It has a distinctive black mask across its eyes like a raccoon. What also makes the NOSH different than other songbirds are its feeding habits. It lives on small rodents such as Voles or Shrews, small birds, and large insects which it dispatches by biting just behind the head, severing the



neck with its strong curved beak. I saw a NOSH do this to a sparrow once while on an outing at The Fairlake Game Farm at Wrigley Corners. Their feet are like those of any songbird, so they carry their prey in their beak to a suitable location. Because their feet are like those of any songbird and not strong like birds of prey, NOSH often secure their prey on the long sharp thorns of Hawthorn trees that are found in open country. Then they can proceed to tear the prey apart with their strong hooked beak or allow it to hang for several

days before returning to consume it. For this reason, it is also known colloquially as "The Butcher Bird".

Shrikes are winter residents in this area, returning to the Tundra for the breeding season. They frequently nest in Hawthorn trees. They migrate to Southern Canada and the Northern U.S. during winter so they may show up at your feeder if you live in the country or on the edge of a town, or village, because they are, as previously stated, birds of the open country. But you can also be sure they are not after your peanuts or sunflower seeds. I hope you welcome them because they are, after all, an important part of the natural food web.

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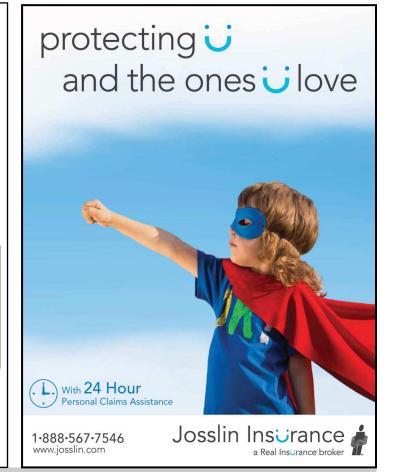
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#### Familiar Faces Seen at the New Pita Pit in New Hamburg

#### Improving the Health of our Community

~ Depression and Teens, Part 2

behaviours can impact their mood.

One of the most difficult challenges for a parent is watching your child struggle and feeling that you are not able to help or support him or her. When teens are struggling with depression, they may often push away those people that love them most. This, in turn, makes it difficult to provide the support that is needed.

Here are some steps to help your teen through a depressive episode:

- If your teen is not allowing you to help support him or her, reach out to others that your teen may feel connected to.
   This could be a friend's parent, coach, teacher, neighbour, or family friend. Quite often, they may respond more positively when they feel supported and valued by those that have been positive role models in their lives.
- 2. Make an appointment with your family doctor this can be an important first step, as he/she can provide some direction or 'next steps'. This would also allow for a discussion on medication, and whether or not it would be helpful for your teen. Medication is not usually a first step, but can be very effective when combined with other forms of treatment.
- Seek out professional help a teen may take comfort in being able to talk to a professional knowing that what is shared remains confidential. As a parent, it can be helpful to know that your teen is communicating with someone even though it isn't you. This also creates a level of safety, because if teens share that they may be a risk to themselves or others, professionals are required to take the necessary steps to ensure that the teen is safe, regardless of the confidentiality. Many professionals will use strategies from the Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) Model. These strategies include challenging negative thoughts, and learning how to look at situations from a more realistic perception. It will also challenge them behaviourally. In other words, what is the individual doing on a day to day basis that may be contributing to the depressive episode (isolating themselves, sleeping throughout the day, unhealthy eating patterns, and lack of productivity)? Strategies also include behavioural activation – looking at the things we can DO to shift the depression. If we encourage teens to measure their depression on a scale from 1-10, they may notice changes in their mood in

response to things that they choose to do throughout the day. For example, if they wake up and their mood is a 4 out of 10, if they spend time with a friend or doing an activity that they enjoy, they may notice that the mood shifts to a five or six out of 10. This is how

- 4. Encourage them to participate in activities that they may enjoy, or have enjoyed in the past. Sports or physical activities are great choices as they release endorphins, or the "feel good chemicals" in our bodies. Exercise can be an effective component of treatment for mild to moderate depression.
- 5. Resources: there are a number of great apps that teens can download on their phones to help track their moods, or offer support when they are struggling. Other apps include breathing strategies for those coping with anxiety, and motivational apps as well. They can also utilize the kids help phone, as they are a great resource. There are a number of great workbooks to help teens learn more about depression, and how to impact their mood positively.
- 6. Create a safety plan: if your teen has struggled with suicidal thoughts, safety is of utmost importance. A safety plan outlines the steps of what they can do and who they can tell if the thoughts become strong. Safety plans can be developed in conjunction with a mental health worker or crisis worker.
- 7. Remind your teen of how much you love him or her, and that you want to help.

Helping your teen through a depressive episode can be one of the most challenging things to do as a parent. For teens struggling with depression, it is important for them to know that they are not alone, and there are others that want to help. As a parent, you may also want to seek support for yourself, so that you can feel confident and supported in the steps that you are taking to help your teen.

#### Seniors and Downsizing - Zones & Mobility Changes

We were working with a dear senior lady who was experiencing mobility changes in her life. She was having a harder time getting around and tired more easily. We decided to set up her bedroom and closet into zones. We set up a "dressing zone" in



her closet. Instead of zig-zagging around her bedroom to get everything she needed, we set it up so that everything she needed to get dressed was within arm's length. We moved a plastic storage tower with drawers into her closet. This contained her undergarments and socks. We also put a little stool for her to sit down. She could get dressed in one spot instead of moving from her closet, to her dresser, to the closet again.

Start looking around your house and establish some other areas that you could set up zones, where articles are easily accessible. Maybe "stuff" doesn't need to be stored in really high cupboards or in deep lower cupboards. Start moving articles to places that are easy to get, to prevent falling and strain. The goal for setting up zones is to have everything you need to accomplish a task within arm's length, to make it easy to put away but also to build in efficiency and in this case, help energy level. Start looking at your space with "new eyes" and look to see what can be changed to help those with mobility challenges.

#### PREVENTION AND MANAGEMENT OF NECK PAIN

Most adults can expect to experience some neck pain in their lifetime. The *cause* of neck pain is often multi-factorial, meaning that there is usually no single cause. Once an episode of neck pain happens, some individuals will find it is a persistent or recurrent condition. However, there are management strategies that can be employed to minimize the negative impact of neck pain.



Below are some tips on prevention and management:

- Protect your neck while you sleep by choosing a pillow that will help support the head, neck, and shoulders. This will keep them in alignment and minimize stress and strain.
- Be smart when working at a workstation/desk.

The workstation/desk should be at elbow height. Use of an adjustable chair can help meet this need. Computer monitors should be at eye level for easy viewing. Do not cradle the phone between your head and shoulder. Use of a headset or



the speakerphone feature will keep your hands free and allow you to multi-task in a safe manner. Be sure to take regular breaks every 20 to 40 minutes that allow you to stand, walk around, and stretch your neck and upper back.

- Avoiding cigarette smoke can be helpful. The reduced blood circulation found in smokers deprives spinal discs of vital nutrients which can lead to premature degeneration. Smoking may also provoke disc herniation with coughing, and cause general damage to the musculoskeletal system through direct chemical irritation and chronic inflammation. Exposure to secondhand smoke during childhood may also increase the risk of developing neck problems later in life.
- **Drinking water** brings vital nutrients to neck muscles and decreases the risk of cramps and strains. Water also helps to protect neck joints by providing lubrication and cushioning.

• Eliminate poor posture which can strain the muscles and joints in the neck. While sitting, make sure that your weight is evenly distributed on your seat, your shoulders are not rounding forward, and you are not slouching. Your head should be resting on y

slouching. Your head should be resting on your torso and not poking forward.

- Engaging in regular physical activity and exercise will help keep your neck strong. This can include general cardiovascular conditioning, along with postural, stretching and strengthening exercises for the neck and upper back.
- Get professional help for your neck pain. The following treatments have been identified as being helpful for most cases of neck pain: education, exercise, mobilization, manipulation, acupuncture, and soft tissue therapy. The scientific literature does not identify any "best" treatment that is effective for everyone. Trying a variety of therapies or combination of therapies may be required to find relief and help manage neck pain.

If you are having difficulty managing neck pain symptoms, contact a qualified health professional who can prescribe appropriate therapy, rehabilitation and self-management strategies specifically for your circumstance. For more information, visit www.nhwc.ca.

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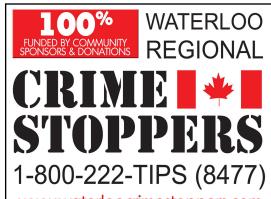

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#### Be Well ~ Meet Christine Gingerich

When I was asked to join the *Baden Outlook* team I eagerly accepted the role of helping to coach my community on a variety of health topics. As a 23 year old young woman I could finally start to live! Twenty-five years later I continue to learn, modify, and evolve my lifestyle as I seek to also help others achieve optimal health.

So as we begin the *Baden Outlook, Be Well* journey together, I encourage you to join me on this quest for optimal health. The reality is we all get one shot at life. Don't you want to make it really count?! I recommend beginning with one or two simple lifestyle changes and committing to those changes for one to two months. I've spent more than 30 years on this journey and I can affirm: It's definitely worth it!

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#### INTERFAITH COMMUNITY COUNSELLING IS TALKING ABOUT MENTAL HEALTH



Mental health affects all of us regardless of age, race, religion, gender, or lifestyle. One in 5 Canadians will experience a mental illness some time in their life. The other 4 will have a family member, friend, or colleague who will experience a mental illness. As a result of the stigma surrounding mental health issues, only 30% of those who experience mental illness will seek out the treatment they need. These statistics don't even begin to account for all of those who simply struggle with life's challenges at various times and can benefit from some support. Bell's Let's Talk campaign encourages us to talk about mental illness to reduce the stigma. Interfaith Community Counselling (ICC) recently held their Annual General Meeting and they are talking about it.

Direct counselling hours provided locally by ICC has increased from 1500 hours in 2010, to 3457 hours in 2014. To serve an ever increasing number of individuals in their journey towards emotional wellness, ICC has kicked off the Expanding Hope Campaign, as reported in the last Baden Outlook.



ICC also chose their Annual General Meeting to launch a new logo; interpreted by some as a blossoming flower signifying growth and by others as a butterfly ready to take flight.....either way, one that emphasizes new life and renewed hope.

88% of ICC clients have their payments subsidized. This is funded partly through grants received by ICC that must be matched by the agency. The annual ICC Silent Auction, which takes place at the Wilmot Recreation Centre this year, is the major fundraiser which provides the funds to match these grants.

ICC needs you to help them continue to provide this subsidized counselling for those who need it, by coming out to support the Silent Auction. Bring the kids to enjoy the Kid's Corner; bring the neighbours to take a test drive of some great Ford products (donations to ICC for every test drive); munch on some home style breakfast; buy a book or two at the used book sale, enjoy the entertainment, take home some delicious baked goods; and bid on some great treasures in the auction. ICC is also looking for individuals interested in being a Volunteer for the day of the Silent Auction.

It's time to talk about it, to reduce the stigma, and to be part of instilling hope in our community. See!! The same incidents but different viewpoints. If we ponder with this viewpoint that what could have happened more, we would truly become thankful to the Almighty.

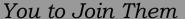
Moral: In our daily lives we must see that it's not happiness that makes us grateful but gratefulness that makes us happy. There is always, always, always something to be thankful for.

### Ask Armand ~

Brent from New Hamburg asks – I drive by the building, which is now J. C. Miller Antiques, (8 Foundry Street) at the corner of Snyder's Road and Foundry Street, regularly. Could you share some history of it?

Armand says – Yes Brent, that building played an important role in Baden and the area. The building was built in 1876 by John Lorentz (he also built the house at the corner of Beck Street and Foundry street). He operated a general hardware store and tinsmith shop at that location. Since then it had a variety of operators including Allan Bechtel, Bert Kriesel, Lloyd Appell, S.C. Kuhn, and Kenneth Gingerich all operating it as a hardware store. Upon

the death of Mr. Kriesel in 1949, J. P Livingston and his son-in law Harris Veitch purchased the building. Harris Veitch started an antique business called Attics and Antiques until it was sold to Jim Miller (J.C. Miller Antiques) in the early eighties. Jim Miller



started his antique business in 1977 and Jim and Marlene's sons Ethan and Justin now operate the business.

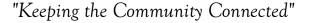

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It's a global event, so do your part to reduce, reuse, recycle, replenish and restore!! There's much you can do to make a difference and every day could be an Earth Day!

- Use public transportation to reduce air pollution and save on fuel costs.
- Take your old computer, DVD player, or other electronics to an electronics recycling center. Reusing and recycling materials like copper, gold, and others saves natural resources and reduces mining and processing.
- Leaky faucets can waste thousands of gallons of water each year, like money down the drain. Repair or replace old or damaged fixtures.

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#### COFFEE FILTERS: Not just for making coffee...

- Clean windows and mirrors, they are lint free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
- Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave.
- To protect your fine china, separate your good dishes by putting a coffee filter between each dish.
- If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
- Protect a cast-iron skillet by placing a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
- Apply shoe polish with a balled up lint-free coffee filter.
- Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
- Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
- Hold tacos with coffee filters convenient wrappers for messy foods.
- Stop the soil from leaking out of the drainage holes in a plant pot by lining with a coffee filter.
- Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter to prevent a popsicle from dripping.
- Use strips of coffee filters instead of expensive strips to wax eyebrows?
- To absorb grease put a few filters on a plate and put your fried bacon, french fries, chicken fingers, etc. on them.



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#### 2015 Tax Tips

#### **Split Pension Income to Save Taxes**

You may be able to minimize your overall family taxes by splitting up to 50 per cent of your pension income with your spouse or partner. This strategy is most effective if the one to whom the funds are being transferred has low or no other sources of income.

"Spouses or partners can elect to split eligible pension income, such as that received from registered retirement income funds and annuities, by transferring a designated amount to the other person," explains Jeff Buckstein, CPA, CGA of Kanata. "If in doubt, check with your CPA to determine if you are eligible to split pension income, as well as to obtain a detailed list of sources of pension income that are and are not eligible to be split in this fashion. For example, old age security payments and amounts received under the Canada Pension Plan are not eligible."

To affect the split, you both must make a joint election on Form T1032, Joint Election to Split Pension Income every year. "The federal government also provides a 15-per-cent federal tax credit on up to \$2,000 of eligible pension income," Buckstein says.

In Ontario, this amount is indexed from a base of \$1,000. In 2014, it is \$1,337 for a maximum credit of \$68. Taxpayers may also transfer any unused pension income credit belonging to their spouse or common-law partner to their own return.
