TAKING WITH Ed Winter?... What Winter? accumulation! What a difference from last year! According to the University of Waterloo Weather Station, in November 2008, we had above average precipitation and colder temperatures – especially towards the end

of the month. Weather reporters are saying that this might be the year that El Nino is holding the cards, determining how severe our winter will be. According to a report issued by the Climate Prediction Center, an agency of the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, El Nino conditions "are present across the equatorial Pacific Ocean."

Along the equator, the western Pacific has some of the world's warmest ocean water, while in the eastern Pacific, cool water wells up, carrying nutrients that support large fish populations. But, every two to seven years, strong westward-blowing trade winds subside, and warm water slowly moves back eastward across the Pacific, like water shifting in a giant bathtub. The warm water and shifting winds interrupt the upwelling of cool, nutrient-rich water. Fish die; climatic changes affect many parts of the world.

So will this be the year of El Nino, or just a warmer start to an average winter? During a recent conversation with locals, John and Maureen Westlake, Maureen mentioned that a sure sign of a hard winter, according to her father, was that a squirrel's tail becomes extra bushy. Now I consider myself somewhat observant but I really can't say I have noticed an increase on the Squirrel Bushy Tail Meter.

With some investigation I did come across some other old fashioned ways to tell if we are in for a tough winter. Here are a few indicators and my observations:

- → Thicker than normal corn husks (who measures?)
- → Woodpeckers sharing a tree (don't all birds share trees?)
- → Early departure of geese and ducks (I don't think they leave anymore)
- → Early arrival of the snowy owl (Not without Harry Potter)
- Heavy and numerous fogs during August (hmm... I remember rain)
- → Pigs gathering sticks (Are they building a home or starting a fire?)
- → Insects marching a bee line rather than meandering (Don't Bees Fly?)
- → Early seclusion of bees within the hive (Lots of bees around in October)
- → Unusual abundance of acorns (That's an oak in a nutshell)
- Muskrats burrowing holes high on the river bank (haven't checked)

Well, the jury is out, but I am going out on a limb and make a fearless prediction for this





BADEN GOES HOLLYWOOD: LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION By Teresa Brown

If you happened to be strolling along Baden's quiet Beck Street in November, you may have noticed an unusual amount of activity ... and perhaps even a few famous faces! During three gorgeous fall days, the street was taken over by STMS Films, a Toronto company that discovered Baden when it was scouting out locations for their film: Small Town Murder Scenes, a movie about a police officer who was raised in a Mennonite community, and who returns home to investigate a murder.

Naturally, the production company required small towns and rural areas for their shooting. After several days in Palmerston, Listowel, and Hanover, they came to Baden -specifically, to the Beck Street Centennial Hall, which had been discovered when location scouts from the company were looking for someplace to use as a "police station." After some negotiations with the Township, the crews moved in, and soon the Beck Street building was transformed inside and out into a film set.

The hall was surrounded by huge trailers (used for accommodation of the cast and crew), towering lights, cables snaking everywhere, and of course many, many people, all working late into the nights to meet the film's stringent deadlines. At one point, there was a fake "police car" parked outside. Inside the hall, more


transformations took place as the basement became the makeup, costume, and refreshment area, while the main floor turned into the "police station" the film needed.

The company hopes to see Small Town Murder Scenes at the Toronto Film Festival in 2010, and possibly at Cannes: thereafter, it will likely be played on television and perhaps in theatres in major cities. The film carries some significant "star power," too: top-billed actors include Jill Hennessey (from Law and Order and Crossing Jordan), Peter

> Stormare (Prison Break and Fargo), and Martha Plimpton. Despite these urban connections, the film crew and cast reported that they enjoyed their time in Baden -- and yes, they did visit E.J.'s and Teddy's Bakery!

There's one final connection to Baden that shows up in the film. When the filmmakers found themselves short one actor to stand in for an eight-year-old Amish boy, they filled the part with Braydon Gingerich, son of Janice and Duanne. Braydon was thrilled to take part: he had to sign a contract, was spoiled with treats, and even got paid! We'll all watch for the film -- and for Braydon's moment in the spotlight -next year; you never know, maybe Baden will become the next "Hollywood North!"

Stars of the Town - Baden

Between 1946 and 1949, Rev. Leroy (Roy) Massecar (1918-1986), travelled throughout towns in southwestern Ontario, filming life and times of those communities. After capturing people from the small towns on film, he returned to show the films at their town halls and community centres, invited the "stars" to attend, and sold copies. The films were donated to the University of Western Ontario J.J. Talman Regional Collection by Marion Massecar in 2005.

The University has converted the films to DVD format and our town's DVD is now available at the Baden Branch of the Waterloo Regional Library. The DVD, owned by our library, features the towns of St. Jacobs and Baden and was filmed in July 1947.

We borrowed the DVD and found it most interesting. The video is obviously in black and white with no audio; however, it gives a real feel for our town in those days. Scenes such as a passenger train rolling into Baden Station, Noah Steinmann tidving his shelves, Egli's Meat Market as a gas station and the Baden hills without trees, give a vision of life and times in the late 40s.

This video is a must see for the long-time Badenites as they will surely enjoy this stroll down memory lane. Drop by the library and pick it up and see a bit of history; for those who are unfamiliar with our town, it will be enlightening.

The Twelve Days of Christmas - A Christmas Carol?

There is one Christmas Carol that has always been baffling - what in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge who won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas? Well, we found out.

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practise their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics.

It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

- -The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
- -Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.
- -Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.
- -The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John.
- -The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.
- -The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
- -Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit--Prophesy, Serving, Teaching,

Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.

- -The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
- -Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit-
- -Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- -The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.
- -The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- -The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

So there is your history lesson for this season. This knowledge was shared from an email - we found it enlightening how that song became a Christmas Carol.



In Quest of the Largest / Oldest Maple Tree in Wilmot Township

We received an e-mail from a Foxboro reader, Gary Waldeck, inquiring about a particularly large tree. Just south of the Foxwood Golf Course property and adjacent to the power transmission corridor is a grove of large maple trees. One maple in particular (seen to the right) is immense with a circumference of 12 feet 5 inches. It can even be located on Google Earth at Latitude 43 degrees 24 minutes 57.8 seconds North, Longitude 80 degrees 41 minutes 45.1 seconds West. Are there any of our readers who know of a larger maple in all of Wilmot Township?

We contacted Mike Henry, who is an associate ecologist and Webmaster with Ancient Forest Exploration and Research.

Mike has visited more of Ontario's old-growth forests than most people alive today, and has written reports, trail guides, and magazine articles on the topic. He designed and constructed the Blueberry Lake Ecology Trails in Temagami, Ontario. While he is a passionate advocate for forests, he has also selectively logged trees from a woodlot in southern Quebec. Michael Henry is the lead author of Ontario's Old-Growth Forests, co-authored with Peter Quinby (available Dec 2009).

He was given a limited amount of information but still made this assessment: "It's a large tree for sure, but given the low branching it is very open grown (it grew up in a clearing) and so is likely a short but wide tree. As such, it's very hard to guess its age, but I would say it's probably not among the oldest trees. A great climbing tree however!"

Many of us remember our favourite teachers: some were the first smiling faces we met in kindergarten, while others were inspiring coaches or principals. Few teachers, however, are recognized for such significant and lasting impact on their students that they merit a national award -- one given by Canada's Head of State, the Governor General. Brent Pavey is one such teacher: the head of Waterloo Collegiate Institute's History Department, and longtime resident of Baden, was one recipient of the 2009 Governor General's Award for Excellence in Teaching Canadian History.

Brent was nominated by two students, Lucky Manku and Megan Stacey, who over several weeks enlisted the help of other teachers to create a comprehensive nomination package. "They basically broke into my classroom to get copies of my lesson plans," explained Pavey. "How they found anything, I really don't know, as most teachers keep their plans up here," he laughed, tapping his forehead. Nonetheless, the girls collected the lessons, along with samples of student work, testimonies, and more, to create the nomination that won Brent this honour.

And an incredible honour it is: the award was established in 1996 by Canada's National History Society and the Right Honourable Roméo LeBlanc, Canada's 25th Governor General, in order to commend "history teachers in the classrooms of our nation who have inspired and challenged students to explore Canada's past" (from www.historysociety.ca). Only six such awards are given annually throughout Canada (this year, there were seven recipients as one award was shared); Brent was one of only two teachers in Ontario to win.

The honour was significant, indeed: along with national recognition, Brent, accompanied by his wife, Marie and sons Jonathan and Michael, travelled to Ottawa for several unforgettable days. "We arrived on a Wednesday, and on Thursday visited the House of Commons. There, after Question Period, the Speaker recognized the award recipients," explained Brent. That evening there was a gala dinner, where Brent received the Canadian National History Society's portion

of the award: \$2,500, along with \$1,000 for Brent's school.

The next day was the ceremony at Rideau Hall. Of course, as a history teacher, Brent had visited the popular destination many times, but this particular visit will always be a much more poignant memory. "It was all very humbling," Brent said. "I've been in the Ceremony Room about ten times, and in the days leading up to the ceremony, I thought 'oh, no problem." Brent found, however, that the impact of receiving such an honour made this experience much different. "The recipients were all waiting, and when the Governor General walked in, it was --gulp!"

Her Excellency wasn't the only significant personage met by Brent and his family. Dick Pound, Don Newman, and Andrew Cohen (journalism and international affairs professor at Carleton University) were only some of the personalities encountered by the Paveys. And Michaelle Jean herself? "There was a protocol meeting before the ceremony, so that we knew what to do and what not to do," explained Brent. "There are many rules, which is a bit daunting. But when you meet her, it's obvious that she's very warm, very nice." It was Her Excellency, of course, who presented Brent with the award itself: a gold medal.

While the medal will be something he always cherishes, Brent hopes to use the award money to assist financially strapped students take part in field trips, or perhaps to establish a commencement award for a student "who turns it around, who shows real change towards the positive." It's a generous gift, but perhaps a much more important one is what Brent offers *all* of his students: his enormous talent for guiding young minds to achieve, and his quiet confidence that -- with excellence to guide the way -- every young mind can do so.

Author's Note: For several years, I had the wonderful pleasure to teach alongside Brent in WCI's history department. His extraordinary wealth of knowledge, his ability to nurture learning, and above all his personal and professional integrity impressed many. Most telling of all was his impact on students, many of whom have gone on to very impressive academic achievements -- and who continue to remember the teacher who inspired them to become learned and thoughtful voices in Canadian history and politics. Congratulations, Brent! -- Teresa Brown

Gardening with Verda - Natural Air Purifiers

Four years ago, in January, I was sitting in a house in Calgary surrounded by a profusion of green, healthy houseplants while the landscape outside was stark white and frigid. I had been invited to the home of a woman who had a thriving business, landscaping the indoor spaces of professional and municipal offices.

Alberta has a prolonged period of short daylight hours and very low natural light, yet in her home I did not see evidence of grow lights or other artificial means of extending light hours. Having lived most of her life in Siberia, she recognized the therapeutic value of growing plants indoors during the winter months. Her motto was "The right plant in the right place and the right space."

Later in the week, while in Edmonton, I met with the chief Horticulturist at the Muttart Conservatory. His first comment to me was how much they envy our Southern Ontario climate. We discussed the challenges of growing plants indoors under prolonged periods of low light. He explained that all plants in the conservatory, including the most tropical such as banana and palm trees, must adapt to the prolonged low light conditions. The cost of providing extended lighting by artificial means, was prohibitive. He, too, recognized the therapeutic value of indoor plants and stated that the volume of visitors to the Conservatory increases dramatically during their long winter season.

Not only do plants provide a cheerful and pleasant atmosphere to a room, but many are also known to act as air purifiers. NASA has done extensive research on a wide variety

of houseplants to determine their effectiveness in removing pollutants from the air. They found that plants may provide a natural way of helping to combat the "Sick Building Syndrome."

Leaves of plants have pores, just as human skin does. These pores allow the plant to "breathe" and absorb the vapours in the atmosphere around them. Roots of the plants as well as the soil in which they grow are also important in the process of removing toxic vapours. During the winter months when our homes are tightly sealed against the cold outdoor weather, indoor air quality should be a concern.

An indoor garden requires a firm commitment to watering and feeding but it can also be a front line of defense against dust and allergens. In exchange, you can enjoy the greenery and added colour to your interior design.

NASA's research found that tropical plants which survive in low light are most effective in removing gases. They do, however, recommend that a combination of plants should be used. Some plants are more effective in eliminating specific types of pollutants than others. The following is a list of recommended plants.







Meet Jacob's Well Ministry

Many locals drive by the *Jacob's Well* building at the foot of the Baden Hill everyday and wonder what is it? The Baden Outlook had a visit with Howard Ellis, founding member of the group, to get information on this local institution.

Howard Ellis, who was district supervisor at Carnation Foods of Canada for nine years, was concerned about the growing number of wayward kids on King Street in Kitchener. So, in 1973, Howard and Carl Hiltz (a teacher from Conestoga College) decided to rent a small room every Friday night at the St. John Evangelist Anglican Church. The evening, which ran from 8 to 10:30 pm, consisted of music for the first hour, followed by teaching the bible. The program grew from that small room to the sanctuary and finally the gymnasium; the numbers swelled to over 600 many nights. The meetings in Kitchener ended after 13 years but it was a start of something new for Howard and his wife Margaret and their four boys.

Meanwhile, Howard and his wife Margaret, who live in New Hamburg, held life-rebuilding meetings, one night a week in their home for the same 12 years. The pair was in search of a permanent home to build on their home counselling meetings, so when the four-acre property, which housed the Green Hills Hotel, became available in 1985, they took the plunge and bought it. Howard left his job at Carnation Foods a year later to devote full time to the ministry. They shared the building with a Christian School until both groups had outgrown their space, so the school was closed.

Jacob's Well believes that a solid foundation is key to a person's well being. Sometimes people have a rough childhood, depression or incidents in their life that destroy that foundation, giving individuals a poor opinion of themselves. Howard's group tries to rebuild that foundation through putting a person's trust in God and putting into practice the teachings of the New Testament.

Seminars are held every third week and run Monday to Friday. Students stay in one of the seven rooms at the facility; work manuals, meals and teaching are provided. An average day consists of: a wake up call at 7:30 a.m., breakfast, two hours of videos starting at 9 a.m., followed by a question period. Some of the videos are taught by a doctor from New Zealand regarding the struggle people have due to rejection and the lack of parental love as a child. After lunch more videos are viewed and once again topics are discussed. Howard teaches about a third of the time in class. Following supper, clients go to their rooms for several hours of homework to reflect on and pray

through what they have learned that day.

People come from all over the world, but mainly North America. Recent students travelled from Kansas, Montana, Florida, and from all over Canada. There have been many testimonials and the ministry has seen many wonderful things happen in people's lives.





Why am I supposed to eat more vegetables?

Vegetables are fundamental to a healthy diet, but does anyone know WHY they are healthy? Here's a brief look into the superior healing qualities of vegetable foods:

- Complex carbohydrate: vegetables contain carbohydrates (that many people will call 'sugars') that metabolize easily and don't spike blood sugar levels, and in fact balance them! Even though carrots contain many 'sugars', they will regulate a sugar high that normally comes from sugar. This makes vegetables a quality source of carbohydrate energy that serves the body best, and helps regulate weight.
- Fibre: all vegetables contain fibre which also help normalize blood sugar levels, and help keep your digestive tract clean to prevent digestive stagnation and bloating. It also helps produce healthy stools and regularity. The fibre from vegetables is much softer and gentler on the digestion than most fibre supplements such as wheat bran, which can be abrasive. The best quality stools come from starchy, well cooked vegetables, like potatoes!
- Minerals: minerals are important to all metabolic processes, but especially important to help with stress and keeping the body's constitution and immunity strong. Minerals are the 'foundation' nutrient, that is dependent on all other nutrients! They are responsible for keeping us calm and beautiful since they strengthen the hair, nails, skin, teeth, etc. Vegetables grown in healthy, strong soils are typically more mineral abundant.
- Chlorophyll: green vegetables contain chlorophyll which helps neutralize toxins in the body, but also

repair and regenerate tissues. Chlorophyll is known as 'green blood' as it is nearly identical to red blood cells and deeply supports the liver and blood producing systems in the body.



- Vitamins and enzymes: vegetables contain a variety of vitamins, particularly vitamins A and C, but green vegetables contain substantial vitamin D, which is why they are considered 'stored sunshine'! When eaten raw, they contain enzymes that help breakdown toxins in the body, including excess weight, growths (such as cancer), and unwanted substances in the body such as residues of old drugs.
- Protein: all foods from the earth contain protein, as they have the capability to grow! Some vegetables have low amounts of protein, but others contain substantial amounts of protein. Examples are young vegetables that have lots of growing to do yet, such as brussel sprouts, fresh peas, green beans, which contain sufficient amounts of protein to satisfy the recommended daily intake for protein in a day, if eaten to meet caloric needs.
- Healing properties: each vegetable has special healing properties, much like various herbs containing unique healing properties. Examples are: garlic, onion and leek are anti-biotic and decongestants; potatoes and asparagus help build the adrenal glands; bitter greens help reduce blood pressure and clear arterial blockages; cucumbers and zucchini are diuretics; celery is a pain killer; and everyone knows that carrots can improve your eye sight!


Since everyone is unique, we may find ourselves gravitating to the vegetables that make us feel best! Since vegetables offer a host of healing potential, eat the vegetables that resonate most with you! If you have an affinity to broccoli, eat it, because there may be something in it that is just for you! Science is only on the brink of discovering the vast and incredible nutrients that plants contain, but our body knows best - as always, listen to it, and eat sensibly!
