### ~ 90 Degrees North

Talking with Ed industry in the Nor I asked my buddy Tim, "What is the biggest industry in the North Pole?"

"I don't know... reindeer breeding, I suppose, or maybe toy

construction. Maybe 75 per cent of the residents wear red suits and are under the height of three feet," he responded, chuckling.

As children, we learned through television and books what the North Pole would look like. A red striped pole, Santa's workshops, a mailroom, Mr. and Mrs. Claus' house and, of course, a corral for all his reindeer. Lots of snow and all the beauty of winter.

Oddly enough, the North Pole is located in the Arctic Ocean, with constantly shifting ice, unlike the South Pole, which is located on a landmass. The sea depth at the North Pole has been measured at 4,261 metres (13,980 ft). The nearest land is said to be Kaffeklubben Island, off the northern coast of Greenland

about 440 miles (700 km) away, though some perhaps impermanent gravel banks lie slightly further north. The North and South Poles have a latitude of 90 degrees, whereas Baden's Latitude is 43.400. (For interest's sake, Baden's longitude is 80.667.)

The first person to reach the North Pole was Robert Edwin Peary. He arrived on his third attempt, in April 1908. A British Explorer, Wally Herbert, disputed the claim, but in the end Peary was credited with reaching the site first. Peary died in 1920.

At the North Pole, the sun is permanently above the horizon during the summer months and permanently below the horizon during the winter months. Sunrise is just before the vernal equinox (around March 19). The Sun then takes three months to

reach its highest point of about 23<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>° elevation at the summer solstice (around June 21), after which time it begins to sink, reaching sunset just after the Autumnal Equinox (around September 24).

The North Pole is significantly warmer than the South Pole because it lies at sea level in the middle of an ocean (which acts as a reservoir of heat), rather than at the higher altitude of a continental land mass. Winter (January) temperatures at the North Pole can range from about -43 °C (-45 °F) to -26 °C (-15 °F), perhaps averaging around -34 °C (-30 °F). Summer temperatures (June, July, and August) average around the freezing point (0 °C, 32 °F).

Today the North Pole has become an increasingly hot subject as to who owns the resource rich area, as sea ice opens up due to global warming, making travel more feasible. Russian explorers have planted their country's flag on the seabed 4,200m (14,000 ft) below the North Pole to further Moscow's claims to the Arctic. The rust-proof titanium metal flag was brought by explorers travelling in two mini-submarines, in what is believed to be the first expedition of its kind. Canada, which also claims territory in the Arctic, has criticized the mission.





O' Christmas tree, O' Christmas tree, How lovely are thy branches....



'Tis the season of the indoor tree. With all its wonder, it's hard to believe that it could pose a

hazard to our furry friends. But the type of tree you have may pose different problems to our pets.

Fir trees are considered to be mildly toxic, with the oils being an irritant to the mouth and stomach. This can cause excessive drooling or vomiting. The needles are not easily digested either, possibly causing GI irritation, vomiting, gastrointestinal obstruction or puncturing of the gastrointestinal wall. We advise keeping the base of the tree fenced off and regularly cleaning fallen needles off the floor.

Artificial Christmas trees can also be dangerous. The danger comes from the potential release of toxins from the artificial material as well as obstruction caused by nondigestible fibers.

The water used to keep our beautiful tree living during the holidays may also pose an issue. The use of special additives in the tree water may contain preservatives, fertilizers, and pesticides to keep the tree fresh. But, ingestion of this tree water can lead to stomach upsets and poisoning. If your home has a real tree this year, the best and simplest solution is to keep the tree water dish covered.

The decorations and lights on the tree can also pose an issue. Most tree ornaments look like toys and are very attractive to both cats and dogs. This may tempt them to climb your tree. Make sure your tree is securely anchored so that they can't knock it over. Also, the tree ornaments are often fragile and can easily be broken into small pieces that, when ingested, can cause gastrointestinal blockage, severe vomiting, and dehydration. Keep your pets distracted with their own safe toys and supervise them when they are around the tree to keep them safe.

# Christmas Forecast

Turkeys will thaw in the morning, then warm in the oven to an afternoon high



near 300°F. The kitchen will turn hot and humid, and if you bother the cook, be ready for a severe squall or cold shoulder.

During the late afternoon and evening, the cold front of a knife will slice through the turkey, causing an accumulation of one to two inches on plates. Mashed potatoes will



drift across one side while cranberry sauce creates slippery spots on the other. Please pass the gravy.

Weight watch and indigestion warnings have been issued for the entire area, especially around the beltway. During the evening, the turkey will diminish and taper off to leftovers, dropping to a low of 34°F in the refrigerator.

Looking ahead to the next two days, high pressure to eat sandwiches will be established. Flurries of leftovers can be expected both days with a 50 per cent chance of scattered soup late in the day. We expect a warming trend where soup develops.

By early next week, eating pressure will be below normal.








### "<u>Rudy the Baden Rooster</u>"

Once upon a time, many years ago, there was a stray rooster who hung out around Snyder's Road West in Baden causing concerns for the new residents in the subdivision behind Castle Kilbride.

The rooster showed up at the bird feeder in Jim and Marlene Miller's backyard one cold winter day. The people who lived in the new subdivision were very upset to hear this rowdy crow at 4:30-5:00 o'clock every morning for at least two years. Over time, he became known to the neighbourhood and was named Rudy. After the bylaw officer threatened to shoot poor Rudy, Jim talked to me about finding a new home for this rooster. I promised Jim and Marlene that I would find a good home for him and even couple him up with a little pretty hen. After much hesitation Jim said okay, if we could even catch him. After a couple of months we had no luck, then another friend of Jim's who had banties came over with a little hen in a cage and BINGO, he entered. The adoption took place in September, 2009

Well, poor old Rudy recently passed away, I suspect due to old age. He had been blind and deaf for the last six months, and had to be confined to a large cage so he would not wander off.



I usually see Waxwings only when someone else points them out to me. Perhaps these birders have better high-pitch hearing than I do so they hear what they are looking for. Perhaps they have better sight and can distinguish them from Starlings which are about the same size and shape. Waxwings, like Starlings, tend to have a similar pattern of hanging out together in a flock, often in the upper branches of trees in urban areas, or in other open areas like fencerows along fields. northern Eurasia and north-western North America, but there are now a few documented breeding sites in the far north. A careful check of a flock of Waxwings may turn up both species.

While Waxwings will eat insects, the vast majority of their diet is made up of berries and the fruit of shrubs and trees. They also have been known to eat flower petals as well as sap. Since they tend not to eat bare

seeds, bird feeders hold little interest for them. Instead, look for them in cedar, mountain ash, mulberry, dogwood, serviceberry, juniper, hawthorn, and apple trees. Being mainly a "fruitivore," they have an advantage when it comes to hosting eggs of the parasitic Cowbird. While the chicks hatch, they do not develop properly on the high fruit diet; however, the high fruit diet can be a problem when Waxwings eat overripe berries that have started the fermentation process. Impaired flying is dangerous and walking on the ground could prove to be fatal if there are predators around. Fortunately, this problem does not seem to be very common.

Since Waxwings are so wide spread you would think we would see these birds more often than we do. Perhaps we just need to look in the right places. Perhaps we need to take a closer look and not dismiss that flock of birds in the far off tree as another bunch of Starlings. Dust off the old binoculars; there may be more out there than meets the naked eye.







#### PROTECTING YOUR BACK DURING THE WINTER SEASON

The winter season is upon us and extra precaution must be taken as snow removal and icy walking surfaces can contribute to an increased risk of back injuries. Included below are some useful tips that can be followed to help keep your back healthy and injury free this winter season.

- Warm up: Prepare your body for physical activity by stimulating the joints and muscles, and increasing blood circulation. Climbing stairs, marching on the spot, or going for a quick walk around the block can serve as excellent warm-up activities in five to ten minutes. Follow this with some gentle stretches and exercises for the back.
- Push, don't lift: Push the snow to one side and avoid lifting. If you must lift, keep the shovel close to your body and avoid twisting and turning by positioning yourself to lift and throw straight at the snow pile. Be sure to lift slowly and smoothly and do not jerk with your lifts.
- Hinge the hips, bend the knees, keep the back straight and brace: Use your hips, knees, legs and arm muscles to do the pushing and lifting while keeping your back straight. Maintaining the natural and neutral curves of your back is important, as this is its strongest and most secure position. Contracting and bracing your abdominal

- Use the right shovel: Use a lightweight, non-stick, push-style shovel. Separate your hands as much as possible on the shovel handle for better leverage against the weight of the snow.
- **Dress for the job:** Wear warm clothing to protect yourself against the elements. Shoes and boots with solid treads and soles can help minimize the risk of awkward twisting, slips and falls.
- **Don't let the snow pile up:** Removing small amounts of snow on a frequent basis is less strenuous in the long run.
- Watch the ice: Caution should be exercised around icy walkways and slippery surfaces. Intermittent thaws and subsequent freezing can give way to ice build-up under foot increasing the risk of back twisting, slips and falls. Coarse sand or ice salt can help give your walkways and driveways more traction.
- **Take a break:** Know your physical limits. If you feel tired or short of breath, stop and take a rest. Make a habit to rest for a moment every 10 or 15 minutes during shoveling. This is especially important if the snow is wet and heavy. Stop shoveling immediately if you feel chest or back pain.

#### Nith Valley Snosurfers Monthly Newsletter

As this snowmobile season approaches along with the hope for snow this year, it's that time I inform riders of changes in our local OFSC trail system. My letter also intends to help promote a safe family sport.

First, an introduction to Wilmot's/OFSC first section of Multiuse trail in our Township:

In order to ride and use the local OFSC trails, you must first hold a valid driver's licence, either a G2 or M2. A special licence is available for children 12 years and older, called an MSVOL (Motorized Vehicle License ). This temporary licence will cover a child until they graduate to a G2 or M2. The next training program is January 7, 2017 and is held at Blue Sky Marine.

Remember that a snowmobile must be registered under the Ministry Of Transportation. It must display a valid license plate sticker and must carry current insurance. Any snowmobile using the OFSC trail system must also display a current season trail pass. The operator needs to understand the OFSC/MTO rules and regulations to use and enjoy the vast trail system. Snowmobiles cannot operate with a suspended licence.

New to our local trail system this year is the 1.5 km of trail known as Multi-use Trail. This portion can be found on the Schmidt Woods Trail behind Wilmot Recreation Complex. This is the first of many shared trails that will flow through our Township. Some of these trails have existed as winter snowmobile trails for 20 plus years. One advantage for this new

portion of trail is that it will be maintained and groomed to a hard packed surface through the winter. The speed limit on this section is posted at 20km.

Multi-use trails are not new to Ontario or to the OFSC trail system. You need only drive to Listowel to find one of the nicest Multi-use trails. This trail meanders from the west side of town to the east side. It is shared by snowmobilers and hikers throughout the season. This is one of my favourite trails, partly because riders and walkers usually exchange a friendly wave.

A Multi-use trail is no different from walking on a country road or a roadway without sidewalks. Both walkers and motorists must respect each other's territory.





#### Combining finances: what to consider when "yours" and "mine" become "ours"

It's a new world, especially when it comes to managing money and finances. Two breadwinners are now the norm. People rarely stay with the same employer for more than a few years, let alone a lifetime, and defined benefit pension plans are disappearing faster than last year's iPhone.

As more couples opt for cohabitation rather than marriage, new questions arise about finances, responsibilities and power balances. Here, Kathy Kruivitsky, CPA, CA, CIM, of WDS Investment Management Ltd. in Ottawa, and Christopher Alexander, CPA, CA, of CJA Professional Services Limited in Oakville, share tips for couples who are considering sharing a life, a home, and maybe some other assets, too.

Know thyself...and thy partner. When entering any kind of asset-mixing, income-blending or money-mingling arrangement, the overriding consideration must be openness and transparency. Know your partner's credit history and money-management mentality before you jump in. "Today, people have more responsibility for their own financial security," says Kruivitsky. "Don't give that power to someone else or lose control of your assets. Even if you do everything right and your relationship is solid, everyday life can sideswipe you with death, disability, job losses and so on."

Think coordinating, rather than combining. The goal should be organization and balance. "Ownership and control are two separate things," Kruivitsky explains. "In the financial trust world, you don't have to 'own' to 'control', and that control shouldn't all rest on one side of the plate."

**Marriage has its benefits.** The Canada Revenue Agency has its own rules and definitions about what constitutes a spouse and a couple. "Marriage and common-law are not the same thing," says Kruivitsky. "Do not assume anything without getting legal advice. Spouse is a legal definition under the Income Tax Act, not a choice you get to make. You must 'tick the box', and spouses, including same-sex couples, must file their taxes this way. Your legal tax status and income-testing levels determine eligibility for most Canadian tax credits and benefits." The Guaranteed Income Supplement for seniors, Canada Child Tax Benefit, Canada Learning Bond and more may all be affected by your relationship status and combined earnings.

**Do or have done to you.** Be at the table when your financial issues are being discussed and decisions made. Pleading ignorance or lack of interest just won't cut it, and will only land you in hot water if — when — things unravel. Don't leave all the responsibility for paying bills or renewing insurance with one person. Share the load.

in anyway dicey, keep your money separate. "Draw up an agreement — even if it's only one page — stating who will be responsible for paying what," says Alexander. Decide whether the bills will be split equally or proportionally, so the one who earns more pays more. Or, set up a joint account for paying shared expenses and each contribute an agreed-upon amount every payday.

Keep your own credit cards. "A good credit history is critical," says Kruivitsky. "Having your own credit cards in your own name and managing them responsibly is one of the best ways to establish and keep a good credit score."

Know the options when it comes to property. When you're buying property with a partner or spouse, there are different kinds of arrangements. "A joint tenancy is one in which both parties have equal interest," says Alexander. "The biggest benefit is that if one of the parties passes away, possession passes to the other. The drawback is that both are responsible for the mortgage, together and separately. The alternative is a tenancy-in-common where each party owns a percentage of the property. But if one dies, their share of the property goes to their estate, not the co-owner."

**Don't overlook the security of insurance.** Life throws us curve balls. "Especially when one person is financially dependent on the other, like a relationship in which one is home raising the kids while the other is working," says Alexander. "Most people think their house is their most valuable asset; in fact, it's their future earning power. Just as you protect your house with insurance, you should protect your future earning power with disability and life insurance. If you become injured and can't work, or if you pass away, your dependent family could be in big trouble without proper insurance in place."

**Cover off other assets and investments.** Certain investments must be owned separately, like RPPs, RRSPs and TFSAs. "Upon death, RRSPs can roll over tax-free to a spouse, providing the spouse is the listed beneficiary," says Alexander. Spouses may consolidate their TFSA accounts on death by naming a successor holder.

**Reduce your tax liability.** While you can't file joint tax returns in Canada, there are good tax software packages that help you optimize your returns to your best mutual advantage. "Splitting eligible pensions, medical expenses and charitable donations can help put money back in your pocket," says Alexander. Going together to have your tax returns prepared by a qualified professional is another good way to make sure you stay informed and in control of your money ... and your life.





- 1. In a wide mouth 1-quart jar, layer the barley, peas, rice and lentils. Then layer around the edges the onion, parsley, salt, lemon pepper, bouillon and the alphabet pasta.
- 2. Fill the rest of the jar with the twist macaroni. Seal.
- 3. Attach the recipe to the jar. Fills a one quart jar.

#### Brownies In a Jar

Ingredients to go in the jar:

- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 95 g plain flour
- 35 g cocoa
- 75 g plain flour
- 135 g brown sugar
- 150 g sugar
- 100 g chocolate chips
- 100g white chocolate chips
- 50 g walnuts or pecans (optional)



To be added when baking... 150g melted butter and 3 beaten eggs

Method: Layer the dry ingredients in a one litre jar, following the order above from the top. Press each layer down before adding the next. The amounts given should exactly fill a one litre jar. (After adding the cocoa wipe the powder off inside the jar so the other ingredients can still be seen).

\* Give to your friend and remember to include a tag with the following instructions:

Combine the contents of the jar with 150g melted butter and 3 beaten eggs. Mix well, and pour into a lined 9 x 9 inch tin. Bake 350 F for 25-35 minutes.

#### Bringing People and Gardening Together Since 1968 By Marlene Knezevich, Director, WHS



An addiction to gardening is not all bad when you consider all the other choices in life. --Author Unknown

The Holly or Ilex family is associated with Christmas. Mostly we use it in bouquets, garlands, and sometimes as a fresh small plant. *I. aquifolium* is the species typically associated with Christmas and it is of European origin. It is evergreen and bears red berries, when you have both a female and male plant. The berries are slightly toxic for people when eaten, causing diarrhea and vomiting. The birds love the berries and are a vector for dispersing seeds, which has become an issue in the west coast forests. Holly is grown commercially there and now holly has become a noxious weed in the wild. Oregon and Washington states have declared it a noxious/invasive plant. It is crowding out the native species in their forests and in British Columbia.





Christians consider holly symbolic of Jesus Christ in two ways. The red berries represent the blood that Jesus shed on the cross on the day he was crucified. A holly's pointed leaves symbolize the crown of thorns placed on Jesus' head before he died on the cross.

Hollies need moist but well-drained, humusy soil of moderate fertility in full sun (especially for variegated plants) or partial shade. A protected area is best in our zone 5. It is best to plant or move hollies in early spring. Prune in late winter or early spring if necessary. I always pruned mine in December when creating arrangements. The greenery looks great with other berry branches, and when used in outdoor arrangements, it will stay fresh-looking all winter.

Ilex verticillata (zone 3-9), or winterberry, is our native holly which has a very different look from the European version. At the local nurseries, winterberry branches are available too for Christmas decor. Our native is not an evergreen but has yellow fall foliage and branches loaded with red berries. There is a cultivar with yellow berries. Winterberry is easy to grow in moist soils and you need a male and female plant to get berries. One male plant will be enough to pollinate 6-10 female plants, which bear the berries. Flowers appear on new growth. Prune to shape in early spring just before new growth appears.
