~ Let's Not Go Backwards

One of my old supervisors at Zehrs had a saying, "If you don't move forward then you are going backwards?" Profound words in a way, but very true. All you have to do is look at our Earth, which has been in a constant state of transition, or even extinction. One day while scrolling through Facebook I saw a post

about Doggerland. That piqued my interest, what is a Doggerland? I dug in and found this:

Doggerland is a submerged lost land that connected Britain to Continental Europe, specifically Belgium, the Netherlands and Scandinavia. The area was wiped out by a massive tsunami 8,000 years ago plus rising waters from glacial melt 6,500 years ago submerged the land. In 1931 a trawler dredged up a lump of peat containing a spear head. Since then, there has been a large amount of exploration to prove that the area was at one time above water, with the results displayed at an exhibition in Holland. The exhibition *Doggerland: Lost World in the North Sea* displayed 200 objects found in the area ranging from a deer bone with an arrowhead imbedded in it, mammoth molars and a fragment of a skull of a young Neanderthal.

Doggerland isn't the only land mass that has disappeared on our planet. I have found ten other land masses that have disappeared, the most familiar one for me was Beringa which disappeared in 9,000 BC. Like Doggerland, but many times bigger, Beringa was an enormous land bridge comprising of an estimated 1.5 million square miles which linked Alaska to Russia. Other land masses that disappeared include; Zealandia, once a part of the Super Continent Gondwana which is now 94% submerged and would have been considered a continent on its own, and Sundaland which consisted of an area that would have connected Bali, Borneo, Java, and Sumatra. Other lost lands include Maui Nui islands (near Hawaii), Kerguelen Plateau (south of Australia and was three times the size of California), Ferdinandea (a small lost island in the Strait of Sicily), and Viking-Berkan Banks (a small lost island in the North Sea).

According to NASA over 410 million people could be at risk from rising sea levels by 2100 as a result of the climate crisis. Observed sea level data shows that global sea levels have already risen by more than 10cm over the last decade. With the ice sheet at "a tipping point of irreversible melting", scientists currently expect an unavoidable sea level rise of 1-2 metres. I immediately thought that Florida would have been an area that would have been affected by rising sea levels. NASA reported that Florida would be impacted along with the rest of the US eastern sea board. Most coastal areas in the world would have issues but in particular the countries of India, China, Bangladesh, and Holland – they would see major land loss.

South Korea and the islands of the Maldives in the Indian Ocean are experimenting with floating homes, while China, India, and other nations are finding ways to absorb and reuse storm water. More drastic action is taking place in Fiji, where government officials are making plans to relocate whole villages because of rising sea levels – 42 communities are recommended for relocation in the next five to 10 years, while six have already been moved to safer ground, *The Guardian* reports.

We are certainly blessed living in the Wilmot area that we do. We have some flooding issues that we have to contend with, but we are typically free from of hurricanes, typhoons, wildfires, earthquakes, landslides, rising sea levels and for the most part tornados. As mentioned, our world is constantly changing and here is hoping for our leaders to come up with ideas on how to slow down the climate warming, something that scientists have warned us about for many years. Are we paying attention? Until next month...Ed


Get Your Tickets for the Kids Party!

BRIDE Baden News Notes


After the cold spell we are warmed up again to write a few notes about our thriving village of Baden.

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
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75 Years Ago

- There are 77 spindles on the main staircase of Castle Kilbride.
- **3** generations of the Livingston family have lived at Kilbride from **1877-1988**.
- Castle Kilbride became a museum in 1994.
- It takes 20 totes of various sizes to store the Christmas decorations (not including the Herner Victorian Village). 6 of these totes are for the parlour tree alone.
- There are **4** beautifully carved marble fireplaces in Castle Kilbride.
- James Livingston was 39 years old in 1877 when Castle Kilbride was built.
- The museum features 4 of the original 6 bedrooms. The maids' quarters bedrooms were taken out in 1994 to make way for interior bathrooms.
- There are 3 Homer Watson paintings hanging on the walls. 1 was original to the Livingston family.
 And 2 were donated by local residents.
- The Castle has 1 privy with matching architecture to the Castle itself.

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Baden Birding



Christmas is coming and one of the highlights for me is the annual Christmas **Bird Count** (CBC). This is the longest running Citizen Science Project in North American history. It wasn't always a count though. Before 1900 it was a hunt! Participants were encouraged to shoot as

many birds (and other things) as they could in this oneday hunt done on Christmas day.

In 1900, Frank Chapman (a conservationist) and some other like-minded friends in New York State came up with an alternative hunt: a bird census! Twenty-five (25) counts were held on December 25, 1900 and twentyseven (27) observers tallied 90 species. Thus, the CBC began.

This year, counts will be conducted between December 14, 2024 and January 5, 2025. This 124th rendition will take place in more than 2000 count circles in the western hemisphere. I will participate in my 27th.

Count circles, each 24 kilometers in diameter, are usually centred on an urban site or some well-known

geographical feature. Near the Baden area, there are counts in Kitchener, Cambridge, Linwood, and Stratford. Compilers for each count circle will divide their circles into smaller areas which are then assigned to teams of counters. These teams are out before sunrise on count day to count all birds



they can see or hear. They will spend the entire day on foot, in cars, or near feeders. At the end of the day, counters meet at a rendez-vous site to compile all the data accumulated during the day. The rendezvous can be done in person or via the internet after a warming, social meal. Sounds like fun, eh?!



What if someone spots a bird before or after the count day? Data from three 3 days before or 3 days after will be inserted as appropriate data. This is known as Count Week data.

The data collected is stored in a data bank at Cornell University in New York state. It can then be drawn on by

ornithologists (bird scientists) to help with conservation research and establishing programs to assist bird communities.

Compilers are always looking for volunteers to take part. If you are interested in helping, contact these people, let them know you have an interest and a little skill. They will then assign you to a team within their count area. Here is a list of local compilers:

You will note that there is presently no CBC for Baden. Could one not be started? I wonder what lurks on the Baden Hills? Along the Nith River? In the bush between Baden and Foxboro Green? If there is an interest, contact Yousif Attia, the CBC Count Coordinator at Birds Canada (CBC@birdscanada.org). He will gladly help you set up the first ever Baden CBC.

Enjoy the Christmas season counting birds.

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Navigating the Holidays is All About Managing Expectations

One of the most stressful times of the year is upon us. The holiday season that seems to hold such promise can just as easily betray us. As we anticipate time with family and friends, time away from work and school, and the permission we give ourselves to indulge a bit, the anticipation of the holidays and the accompanying expectations can come with a lot of stress.

The holidays are *supposed* to be the most wonderful time of the year. Songs have exclaimed this and, as a matter of course, we've been telling ourselves this since childhood. The holidays can also be painfully disappointing: because they are supposed to be the best of times, they can also be the worst.

The main culprit is our expectations for the season (and those promoted by those who stand to benefit). These expectations are infused with feelings: fear family conflict may not remain contained; panic a meal-time disaster might repeat itself; pressure to surpass last year's gift-giving (the remnants of which may still be lingering on monthly credit card statements); and the residual anger that lingers from the lack of appreciation

and gratitude for our thoughtfulness and efforts. It doesn't help when, instead of a fresh



snowfall, days are dull, damp and gray. The tree is almost needleless come Christmas Eve and travel warnings threaten to thwart everything.

Much of the anxiety we experience can be lain directly at the feet of overspending, overthinking, and underdelivering in comparison with the Pinterest-like perfection we see online. And unique to this emotion, anxiety is the "gift that keeps on giving" -- to ourselves and to those around us.

Unlike our ability to take a break from work and other routines, it's harder to take a holiday from the holidays. The pressure we assume or impose on ourselves can be unbearable. As much as we may profess to place more importance on presence of others than presents to others, there is evidence the latter often wins out over the former. But there is hope for those sick and tired of being sick and tired at this time of year.

It starts with setting reasonable expectations and clarifying them with those closest to you. Give priority to your own emotional well-being by giving yourself permission to live within reasonable boundaries. Set healthy limits with respect to your time and finances and keep the pressure under wraps by only making those commitments you can gladly and gratefully keep. Protect yourself from the unreasonable or untenable expectations of others. Try living into the idea that it really is "the thought" rather than the pursuit of perfection that counts. And have a planned response should your expectations not be met, accepting what is and for which you can be sincerely grateful.

GLOBAL OUTLOOK - Islands



What country has the most islands? Canada, comes to mind immediately; however, our great country is fourth in the number of islands category. Sweden takes top honours having 267,570 islands followed by Norway with 239,057, Finland 178,947 and Canada with 52,455.

Millions of years ago Sweden was located around the equator. Many geologists believe it was once a coral reef, but the land drifted north due to continental drift. The carbonate sheets and sponges created the building blocks of many islands. The lands continue to rise which has a reserve effect in regards to sea levels rising. Approximately 1,000 of the islands are permanently inhabited (0.04%) - Stockholm has 14 connected islands in their city alone.

Greenland, which is three times the size of Texas, is the largest island in the world measuring 836,330 square miles. Canada has three islands in the top ten which are #5 Baffin Island (195,928 square miles), #8 Victoria Island (83,896), and #10 Ellesmere Island (75,767). The other


top ten islands consist of New Guinea (317,150 square miles), Borneo (288,869), Madagascar (226,756), Sumatra (171,069), Honshu (Japan 87,992) and Great Britain (80,823).

The ten most populated islands in the world include Java (148 million people), Honshu (103 million), Great Britain (66 million), Luzon (Philippines 64 million), Sumatra (60 million), Madagascar (28 million), Mindanao (Philippines 26 million), Taiwan (24 million), Salsette (India 23 million), and Borneo (23 million).


Australia is the smallest continent on Earth, and although it is an island, it is considered a continent with an area of three million square miles. There was a debate on why Greenland wouldn't be considered a continent but most geographers consider islands and continents two different


things. There is a strict scientific definition of a continent regarding the matter of size of the land mass. Australia is four times the size of Greenland therefore is considered a continent.




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WILMOT HERITAGE FIRE BRIGADES



TLC PET FOOD IS ON THE MOVE

This year TLC Pet Food celebrated 30 years of being in business—a remarkable milestone! Another milestone the company will be experience is their move into their

brand-new building on Bleams Road early next year. TLC Pet Food has an amazing history and the Baden Outlook sat down with Erik Kuttis, the President of TLC Pet Food, to find out more.

Erik grew up in St. Agatha and attended Waterloo-Oxford High School while his wife Sandra grew up in Nithburg and was schooled in Stratford. At

one point they were both employed at Kennedy's restaurant, Sandra in the kitchen and Erik as a server. They both became great friends with Mike and Linda Kennedy, who were both involved with their eventual wedding.

Erik attended the University of Guelph where he met an individual who had an interest in dog food. In June of 1994 the two developed a formula, opened a facility in Mississauga and after two years they parted ways. Erik and Sandra became sole owners of TLC Pet Food. In September of 1996 they moved operations to 18 Neville Street in New Hamburg - they spent 12 years at that location.


Their approach to the business was an interesting one; stand behind their quality and service, always have a phone person available that you can talk to, become the first "online only" pet food distributor in Canada, and the first pet food company in Canada to offer recyclable packaging. There must have been some risk not having their products available in stores, but it has certainly worked well for them. Once their products are ordered online, they are packaged and shipped directly to customers. They offer only four products; dog food, cat food, puppy food, and dog biscuits. TLC have their own "pet mobiles" who deliver free to households in Waterloo Region and will also deliver bulk orders free (up to 300 kilometres) to pet breeders and pet professionals. The rest of the orders are delivered by Federal Express in Canada and United States.

In December 2010, the business moved operations to

their current location at 3514 Bleams Road which backs onto the New Hamburg Thrift Store property. Business continued to grow and they opened a

shipping, sales, and customer service center, in Buffalo, New York for their United States customers, followed by a shipping only centre in Burnaby, British Columbia. To handle a remarkable 160,000 active customers, they have a staff of 40 at all three locations. The pair feel it is important to hire locally. All but two employees at the New Hamburg operation are from

Waterloo region with most of them from Wilmot Township - all of their products and packaging are from Canada. There are many celebrities from Canada and USA that are customers of TLC Pet Food and their pet food was used on the Super Bowl Challenge on the Jimmy Fallon show.



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The company plans to move into the new facility in January or February of 2025 and they are excited about their relocation. It is almost four times the size of the current facility with many new features including five loading docks (two for tractor trailers and three for the pet mobiles) compared to one at their location. They will have two floors of office space, with an elevator, and a lot more storage for their inventory. The pair thought that it was important to have an attractive looking building with superior landscaping as they value their neighbours' reflections. During the building process they strived to use local companies and they are thankful for their remarkable efforts.

Something else that is important to Erik and Sandra is supporting local volunteer initiatives and it is very evident. Erik shared some of the donations that he has made in the past including; \$100,000 to the electronic sign at the sports field (Alumni Field) at Waterloo Oxford high school, \$25,000 to a new van for the Wilmot Family Resource, a major sponsor of the Community Players of New Hamburg, \$30,000 to this year's Farwell 4 Hire campaign, and countless other local volunteer initiatives. Baden knows first hand about their generosity as they were a major sponsor of the Baden Corn Festival and Baden Community Association. The company was a recipient of the 2012 Arts Award for Waterloo Region in the Corporate Arts Category. Wilmot is fortunate to have this successful independent company give back to this community in the way that they do. Wishing them all the best as they move to the new building and continue to grow!

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December... the month with an abundance of holidays and no matter your beliefs, customs, or religion, one thing in common is food and the memories it can create and evoke. Most traditions involve food, the creating of, the aroma of, and the sharing of with family and friends. With so many holiday treats to choose from I realized that the one my family most looked forward to was Skor bars, so this year I share it with you. And, of course, as you get to know me, you will quickly realize my love of soup, so turkey dinner soup seemed appropriate. Good to use up those leftovers right down to the bones! Enjoy the comfort of good food, fun friends, and loving family. Happy holidays!

Skor bars

3/4 cup butter, softened 3/4 cup packed brown sugar

1 1/2 cups flour

1 can sweetened condensed milk

2 tbsp butter

1 pkg chocolate chips

1 pkg Skor toffee bits

Cream together first 3 ingredients, press into 13 x 9 pan lined with parchment paper (ingredients look crumbly but will press together) and bake at 350 for 20 minutes or until golden. While shortcake is cooling slightly, heat sweet milk and 2 tbsp butter in heavy bottomed saucepan, stirring constantly, 5-10 minutes or until thickened. Pour over base and bake 12-15 minutes until bubbly and golden. Sprinkle chocolate chips evenly and return to oven for 2-3 minutes. Spread the chocolate, then sprinkle with Skor chips, press them lightly into the chocolate. Best to let sit overnight before cutting; no need to store in refrigerator. Remove entire piece to cutting board with parchment for easier cutting into desired sized pieces.

Turkey soup

2 tbsp each butter and oil

1 cup diced onion

1 cup diced celery

Melt oils in stock pot and sauté until softened, about 5 minutes

Add

6-8 cups turkey stock *

3-4 cups leftover turkey

1-2 cups leftover vegetable

1-2 cups diced cooked potatoes



Bring to a boil, reduce heat and let simmer a good 30 minutes. Add 2 tbsp cornstarch to 1/2 cup stock or water and mix well. Bring soup to a boil again and add cornstarch to thicken. A little cream can be added if you choose. If there's leftover stuffing it makes wonderful "croutons" when warmed up in the oven.

*Turkey stock

Throw all turkey bones and skin, everything you don't eat into a stock pot and cover with water. Add 1 onion cut up, 3 celeries with greens if you have, 2-3 carrots, 6-8 fresh thyme sprigs or 2 tbsp dried, good handful fresh parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Bring to boil, reduce heat, and let simmer 3 hours. Remove all solids and strain into jars.

Did you know 'food comas' are not real! Although turkey contains tryptophan that helps relax the body, it's not in high enough quantities to lull you to sleep. That tired sensation you are probably feeling is from overeating and your body needs to rest to digest!

Good luck on your 'food coma' this year!




