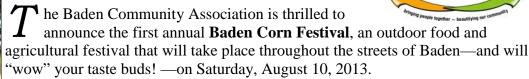

# Talking with Ed

## ~ Random Thoughts

Run on Demolitions – November and December saw demolitions in Baden—and both demos were historical in nature. First, the Centennial Hall which was built in 1967 came down the last two weeks of November. The building at the corner of Mill and Beck Streets once

housed the township of Wilmot offices and a hall in the basement that was used by many local groups including TCP, Baden Optimists, scouts, and seniors groups and held many functions serving Baden. It was also home of Waterloo Regional Library Headquarters during the eighties.

Jacob Beck built a Wilmot Township Hall in 1858 in Baden, Ontario, to house the Fifth Division Court of the County of Waterloo. The timber frame structure with clapboard siding and twelve windows was one of the most important public buildings in a growing community. Here, an elected council met once a month to deal with issues of local government. As well, the circuit judge presided over court regularly to settle small claims, contract disputes, and property rights issues. The building was moved to Black Creek Pioneer Village in 1967 and restored in 1970. The Beck Street Centennial Hall had replaced that building. The Centennial Hall property will remain as a vacant lot serving as extra parking for the downtown core and the Wilmot Seniors Workshop.

The second set of buildings that was demolished was the Herner Wood property. The original building was built in the early 50s and there were many out-buildings added over the years. The Herners provided building materials, household products, and custom work to Baden and beyond. The extent of the actual property is surprising.

There have been four meetings held in New Hamburg, Baden, St. Agatha, and New Dundee, with most having poor attendance! The Mayor has decided to create the township's first ever telephone town hall meeting, which will be held on January 29<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. He is inviting all residents to call in at 519-634-8519 extension 430. This is your opportunity to shape our township and have your say, all from the comforts of your home. Come on Wilmot, we know you have an opinion! Dial in and let your voice be heard!

Where's the White Stuff? —We've seen above-average temperatures again this past fall with our first good dumping of snow happening on Boxing Day (we had a slight dose of winter the last week of November). It must be rough for many industries that count on a substantial snowfall for their livelihood. Ski hills, snowmobile dealers, and snowplow operators all suffer with these below average snowfalls. Last year had to be a record! As many may rejoice at this turning winter trend, there are folks who do enjoy the outdoors during this colder season.

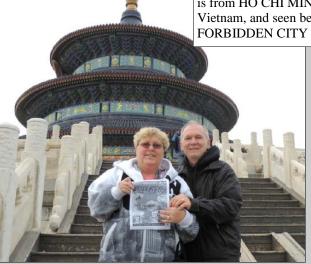

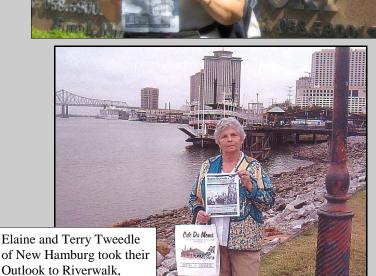

# Announcing the Baden Corn Festival: Ontario's Newest Summer Food Festival!

Oh, and here's the best part: the day will end in a corn roast supper featuring local food, followed by a street dance with Celtic rock band Fiddlestix rocking Baden into the

night. It's a day that will promote local food producers and restaurants, highlight Baden as a tourist destination, and will be a significant fundraiser for community projects.

Sound exciting? It will be, and not just for Baden and Wilmot residents: the BCA is already planning an ambitious advertising campaign inviting visitors of all ages from across South-western Ontario. And hold onto your hats: the planning committee expects to welcome thousands of people to our town.

But why a Corn Festival? BCA member and event organizer Kenton Frey explains: "Baden has seen unparalleled growth in recent years. More and more people are looking for ways to enjoy life right here at home. Businesses are growing, and Wilmot is making its mark in the Region as a tourist destination—the time is perfect for a large-scale festival in Baden."

"As for why the BCA chose 'corn," he adds, "there are three reasons: we wanted the festival to take place in August, and local corn is reliably available then. Secondly, there are no other large-scale festivals featuring corn within south-western Ontario. And finally, corn is one of Wilmot's major crops—besides, who doesn't love a corn roast?"

But the Corn Festival isn't only about corn, of course. The committee has already started contacting local farms and restaurants to get involved. "Wherever possible, we want to feature local food throughout the day," Frey points out. "Focussing on our Township's strong food economy—and working to promote those food producers and restaurants—is the whole point."

Planning began last August, and many hours have already gone into establishing networks with other service groups, planning entertainment line-ups, and fundraising and sponsorship strategies. "We're extremely fortunate to have a motivated and experienced group of people working to plan the Festival," says Frey. "I'm blown away by the talent, dedication, and work our team devotes to this."



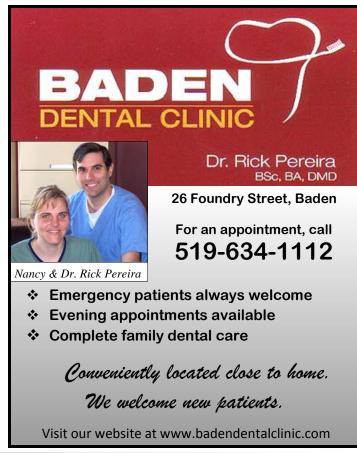
Speaking of teamwork, there are lots of ways to join in the excitement: the Corn Festival Committee welcomes the talents and time of everyone. Whether you want to play guitar on stage, design the

Festival's ads, or just lug picnic tables into place for the street dance, the BCA wants to hear from you. "We've done a huge amount of the groundwork," says Frey, "but the more volunteers that we have, the better."

As time goes on we will be calling on or dropping by local businesses to see how together we can make this event a wonderful success.

A big thank you goes out to the Firebird players for taking the time to promote literacy in a fun way!





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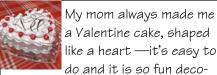
# LookOut Kids' Korner

#### Canadian Cancer Society Looking For Volunteers

Every person has experienced, or knows someone who has experienced, cancer. That is a fact--so raising money for the Canadian Cancer Society is of the utmost importance. April is the campaign month for the cancer society where volunteers knock on doors in their



neighbourhoods asking for your donation to conquer this terrible disease and help people that are afflicted with it. Do it in remembrance of someone you've lost or someone who is struggling.

Baden resident, Carolyn Coakley has been a volunteer canvasser for the Canadian Cancer society for 12 years now. For the past five years she has been a team captain for Baden, filling the shoes of longtime captain Grace Baird who moved to New Hamburg. In her role as a captain, she is to pick up the supplies in Kitchener, recruit volunteers, and distribute the kits to the volunteers. She helps to coordinate the routes, and through the month she checks on the status of their efforts and offers support.

Currently there are six volunteers for the town of Baden (4,653 residents) and the Cancer Society is putting out a call for help. The canvassing takes roughly four hours per volunteer and each person can choose to solicit his or her own neighbourhood where people know your face, but it's a great way to meet new people too. Volunteers have the entire month of April to canvass, so they can pace out their walks and hope for a nice spring day to hit the streets. It is an easy task but is of such value—please consider giving your time and/or your donation.

When Carolyn first got involved with the society she felt that she didn't have a lot of extra money to contribute to the cause, so she felt that her time might be just as beneficial. Most of the current volunteers are long time canvassers, but they need more volunteers to canvass for this worthwhile cause. As the saying goes, "Many hands make the load light." Cancer can be beaten! Please help!

When the cancer canvasser comes to your door -- please give generously.



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#### Will there ever be a cure for cancer?"

"So many people have asked this question – those who are living with cancer, those whose families have been touched by the disease, those who fear that cancer might be in their future.

The good news is that we're closer than ever to fully understanding, treating, controlling and preventing the many diseases called "cancer." Today, over 60% of Canadians diagnosed with cancer will survive at least 5 years after their diagnosis. In the 1940s, survival was about 25%.

Incidence rates for most cancer sites are stabilizing or declining. With the exception of lung cancer in women, death rates for most major cancers have declined during the past decade in Canada.

In addition to breakthroughs in new treatment approaches, research has also helped to tremendously refine the three "traditional" approaches to cancer treatment — chemotherapy, radiation and surgery. While these approaches have been used for decades to treat cancer, there is a level of personalization and sophistication available today that can only be credited to research.

For example, surgery is now more accurate and often less invasive. Chemotherapy drugs are constantly being fine-tuned. We are also improving ways to deliver radiation therapy so that the treatment is more effective and healthy cells are not affected.

At the same time, there has been a veritable explosion of knowledge about the proteins, genes and cells involved in cancer over the past two decades. This exploding knowledge base is giving us the ability to pose and answer questions we could not even have conceived of 10 to 20 years ago, and is propelling us towards our ultimate goal of creating a world where no one needs to fear cancer.

Some experts doubt that we'll ever find a single, universal cure for cancer, which isn't really a single disease but actually is 200 or more different diseases. Yet researchers have uncovered a staggering amount of information about cancer over the past two decades.

This revolution in our understanding of cancer has set the stage for a new era in cancer therapy and prevention, due in part to the many studies and clinical trials funded by the Canadian Cancer Society.

#### **Areas of progress**

Thanks to research, we are closer than ever before to fully understanding cancer. A broad range of research funded by the Canadian Cancer Society has contributed to our current knowledge of the disease. And as our knowledge increases, we will see even greater progress.

#### MCC Around the World Thanks You

The end of the year is a good time to look back at last year's results and set new goals for the coming year.

As we look back at last year we see that we raised over 1.4 million in store revenue. ### INTERESTING PEOPLE ~ MEET CHESTER MALLOCH

Baden's had many citizens who have contributed to the community over the years, leaving a lasting impression on everyone who knew them. Chester Malloch was one such person. We, at the Baden Outlook, had the privilege of knowing him as a neighbour and a friend. We had a recent visit with his son Steve and daughter Patty and they helped us share his story.

hester Malloch was born in Saint Stephens, New Brunswick in 1921 to a Canadian father (Chester) and an English mother (Florence Ridgway). Early in his life he moved to Borhamwood, a suburb in North London.

His father was an electrician, travelling around the globe working on many projects. Steve and Patty, Chester and Maude's children, recalled interesting stories that Chester told during that time, such as sleeping in tents in India with a mongoose on his chest to keep the snakes away. Back in London he spent one year studying Archeology, specializing in Egyptology, at a local university. He was an intelligent man, and he learned and understood five languages.

Chester had a feeling that war was imminent, so in 1939 he enlisted in the British Army. His main duty was as a dispatch rider in North Europe, delivering messages on his motorcycle to the front lines. The British Army was pushed all the way back to Dunkirk where his motorcycle was lit on fire and the entire group was loaded on boats and sent back to England. Throughout the war he had many interests; he became a heavy-weight boxer and loved to play rugby. His highest rank in the army was that of a Sergeant Major.

Back in England he joined the Special Air Services (SAS) and was sent to the North African conflict. In the SAS he became a commando and learned many fighting techniques such as karate. After many battles he contracted malaria, was very ill, and lost 60 pounds. He took several months off from the action to regain his strength, but while he recovered he went to visit many local pyramids and tombs. He returned to the desert action to help General Montgomery push General Rommel out of Africa. When the European war was over he immediately signed up for the Pacific war, but by the time he got back to England that war was also over.

In 1945 at age 51, Chester's father died of cancer while serving as part of the Home Guard. Chester decided it was time for a change so he came back home to Canada. He went to British Columbia, where he worked as a lumberjack. Around 1949 he

moved back to this area where he was employed with a paving crew. It was then that he met his love, Maude, who was training to become a nurse at the Stratford hospital. Maude was from Varna, Ontario.

After a year of dating they were married in 1950, and Maude and Chester moved into the Walker home in Haysville where Maude became a fulltime caregiver. In 1954 they purchased their home at 190 Snyder's Road East from Harry Brown, which was their home for the rest of

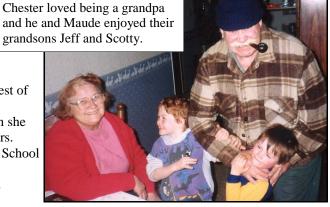
their lives.

Maude worked as a nurse at the K-W Hospital until 1964 when she continued to focus on providing homecare for many locals including Mrs.

Schneller. As a volunteer she helped students read at the Baden Public School

from 1970 until her death in 2006.

Chester had a number of jobs; he was a security guard at Budd





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Automotive and also worked at Burns Meats, and Ellis and Howard. His last job, the one he was most noted for, was as custodian at the Baden Public School. He was loved and is remembered by thousands of students. He was always involved with the teachers and students and gave his big heart wherever he went. He went along on a school trip to see King Tut's tomb where he read hieroglyphics for the children. He worked at the school for 15 years from 1971 to 1986. There was a huge retirement ceremony for Chester as there was no custodian that could ever fill his shoes!

Chester will also be remembered for his many years in Baden Scouting. He was District Scout Master for the area and occasionally filled in for leaders in New Hamburg when needed. Chester had his own special way of teaching the kids honour, respect, faith, honesty, and integrity while giving them a lot of freedom to demonstrate trust—making them feel more like adults than children. Chester initiated a program called the First Class Journey – where two adolescent boys would take a two-day cross-country trip across Wilmot Township using only a compass to find their way. It was a major achievement and was awarded as such.

Over time Chester was also known at Baden's ballpark, being named both Volunteer of the Year and Fan of the Year. He was at most games each night and would umpire in a pinch, although it was not his favourite part of the game. He acted as convener for tournaments and loved to watch the games, while again demonstrating his principles in teaching youth about life skills.

In 1986 Chester was named "Citizen of the Year" by the Baden Chamber of Commerce. The chamber classed

him as a father, teacher, baby sitter, confession priest, counsellor, umpire, coach, bat boy, commissioner of baseball and an encourager of talents. He was an amazing man—warm and humorous —and Chester will be remembered dearly. Chester died in 2002.

Thanks to siblings Patty and Steve for the nice visit, and for telling their story of their dad with much affection.

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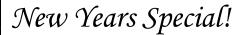
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#### The Canadian Blood Services: A Great Way to Give

For many people, the holidays were a great time to give to others, whether that meant presents to family and friends, or donating to charity. But there's another way to give, and it's a way that might someday save a life: by donating blood.

Canadian Blood Services is the organization that runs blood donor clinics, the first step in providing blood to people who need it. The CBS operates more than 20,000 donor clinics every year; it's an invaluable program that provides the blood and blood components used in transfusions.

The CBS has a terrific website at www.blood.ca, where you

can learn about the many services the CBS offers Canadians, which include much more than blood. As the website explains, "Canadian Blood Services also oversees the OneMatch Stem Cell and Marrow Network and provides national leadership for organ and tissue donation and transplantation."

The blood collected by the CBS can be used in many ways to save lives. Red blood cells, for instance, can be used to help accident victims and surgical

patients; leukemia and cancer patients benefit from platelets; even patients suffering from burns, shock, and blood disorders like hemophilia need donated blood.

Josh Martin of Waterloo is a big fan of the Canadian Blood Services—and with very good reason. In 2008, Josh was diagnosed with chronic mylogenous leukemia. When his doctor told him he had a 40 to 50 percent chance of survival, Josh did an interesting thing: he flipped a coin.

"Heads I live. Tails I die," he thought to himself. The coin landed heads side up. Josh recalls that "though thrilled to have Lady Luck on my side, I would soon discover that I was going to need a lot more than a coin flip to get me through."

Josh's treatment included weekly chemotherapy at Princess Margaret Hospital in Toronto, and during that time he needed many blood transfusions to help support his healthy blood cells while the cancerous ones were destroyed. But

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that wasn't the end of Josh's need for the Canadian Blood Services.

"In October 2008 I spent six weeks in the hospital undergoing and recovering from a bone marrow transplant ... it takes time for the new stem cells to find their way and engraft to my body, which meant for many days I wasn't producing blood on my own. To get me through this risky time, I would receive blood and platelet transfusions daily to keep me alive."

Thankfully, Josh's treatment was successful: today he is completely cancer-free. He credits many people for his recovery, including his doctors, nurses, pharmacists, lab technicians, and friends and

family. But there's one essential group he never forgets to thank: "No matter how good my doctors were or how fancy the drugs I was taking were, none of that would have mattered without blood donors. They were an essential part of my recovery."

It's stories like Josh's that remind us of how important it is to donate blood. Donating blood is easy, quick, and you'll help save a life—as the Canadian Blood Services reminds us, "it's in you to give."

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### **Baden Birding**

#### Location, Location, Location

have known for a long time that a change in habitat conditions dictates which species of plants and animals may be present in an environment. We don't fish for salmon in the Baden pond, nor do we expect moose to freely roam Wilmot Township. The contrast, however, in local ecosystems was made much clearer for me during my recent participation in two "local" bird counts; one centred in Branchton near Cambridge on December 16th, and the other centred in Linwood on December 30th.

Clearly, the two weeks between the counts had its effect on late migrant birds, but the major differences between the two areas were the amount of forest cover available and the level of human population. The Cambridge count has more of both factors.

Large marsh areas near Wrigley Corners may still provide habitat for 44 late migrating Sandhill Cranes seen during the Cambridge count, while large open alfalfa fields between Heidelberg and the Conestoga dam are a haven for 11 Lapland Longspur, 6277 Snow Bunting, 1365 Horned Larks, 12 Hoary Redpolls, and 2965 Common Redpolls—numbers never (or rarely) seen on the Cambridge count. Both sightings were truly awe-inspiring.

The large open areas of the Linwood area also provide perfect hunting conditions for the Raptors (carnivorous birds). The December count turned up 8 Turkey Vultures, 3 Bald Eagles, 8 Northern Harriers, 6 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 3 Cooper's Hawks, 1 Red-shouldered Hawk (near the Hawksville bridge where it has wintered for the last 10 years!), 127 Red-Tailed Hawks, 113 Rough-legged Hawks, 10 American Kestrels, and 1 Merlin (near the Glen Allan

bridge). More northern raptors may be joining these birds as winter sets in more firmly.

Most of the effort on the Cambridge count was expended on foot, walking through small forested areas. The Linwood count was the opposite as the majority of our time was spent in the car as we slowly drove while the spotter watched the fields and fence lines.

Other hot spots to visit often centre on the Conestoga River below the dam as it meanders its way through Glen Allan on its way to Wallenstein.

Final count totals for the two counts were surprisingly high with both days setting new records for the number of species seen: Cambridge recorded 85 species, while Linwood recorded 55 species on the count day plus a further 10 species seen during count week.

This, of course means that you could comfortably repeat our findings. Pick a nice sunny day and drive the back roads of Wellesley Township, and the adjoining areas of Peel and the Eastern part of North Perth. Keep a pair of binoculars handy once you are safely stopped. Try counting the number of Snow Buntings as the flock wheels over the fields. Once they land, see if you can pick out the bright red caps of the Redpolls mixing in with the larger "snow birds." A hearty warm lunch at one of the excellent restaurants in the area would also be a fitting reward for your day's effort!

One last note: After I wrote the article on woodpeckers, a Red-bellied Woodpecker started to visit our feeder, a first for us as far as we know. I asked for your sightings, but as yet have had no replies. Please email your news to badenoutlook@hotmail.com

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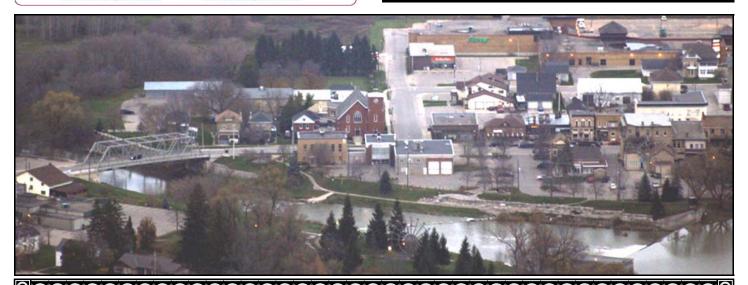

### "Zones" in your office

Think about setting up your office using a "kindergarten classroom" model. Think back to your kindergarten classroom. Everything you needed was all together and nicely labelled. You didn't have to go over to the "block centre" to get something for the "house centre."

There are more than 100,000 whiplash cases in Canada each year. The unique forces generated during these collisions can stress biological tissues and

result in pain and decreased functioning for those affected. This along with a physical examination consisting of inspection, article provides a review of whiplash specifically focusing on the mechanics of injury, the associated symptoms, and general guidelines for the evaluation of any accompanying injuries.

Although rear-end collisions are the most commonly reported mechanism of whiplash injury, an injury may also occur following side and head-on collisions. The forces generated from these types of impacts thrust the head (and to a lesser extent the entire body) back and forth, much like a snapping whip. Injury results because the body is unable to compensate adequately for the speed of head and torso movement from the acceleration forces generated at the time of impact. This will put stretch, compressive and shear stresses on biological tissues such as muscles, ligaments, joints and nerves. As a result, this can generate pain symptoms, and affect range of motion, strength, coordination, and balance. The onset of whiplash symptoms may immediately follow a MVC or may gradually develop over the first 24-72 hours. A later onset of symptoms does not necessarily indicate a more serious injury.

Neck pain is frequently associated with whiplash injuries. However, the whiplash mechanism may also cause injury and symptoms that include: whole body muscle pain/ache, jaw pain, referred arm pain, shoulder or other joint pain, mid back pain, low back pain, headaches, dizziness, and tinnitus. The term **WAD** (Whiplash Associated **D**isorder) encompasses all of these potential symptoms and is commonly used to grade the degree of

injury present. Of the four Grades of **WAD**, Grades 1 and 2 represent the majority of whiplash cases.

Evaluation of whiplash injuries should include a proper medical history,

along with a physical examination consisting of inspection, palpation for tenderness, range of motion, strength, neurological, orthopaedic and functional testing. Signs of serious injury, such as fracture, are usually evident in early assessments and may require further diagnostic testing such as x-ray, CT scan, or MRI. Chiropractors are healthcare professionals skilled in the diagnosis and treatment of whiplash injuries and are commonly involved in the management of **WAD**.

When an individual sustains a whiplash injury, injured tissues can become stiff and weak when they are not used, which can further exacerbate pain symptoms. Therefore, a return to daily activities after whiplash injury is extremely important for successful healing as extended rest may prolong recovery. Healing and a return to daily activities may be facilitated with active treatment and rehabilitative exercise prescription. 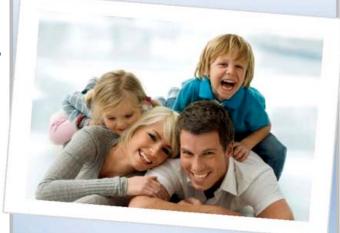

#### Are You In The Zinc Zone?

Staying healthy this winter and minimizing your risk for cold or flu is paramount. There are many effective strategies for reducing your risk of sickness during the winter months. I usually find people increasing vitamin C and vitamin D intake, but rarely do I hear people ask about their zinc status. Zinc is an important mineral in our body that is needed for improving immunity, enhancing cell growth and division, improving sleep and mood. It is necessary for the mechanism of action that allows us to taste and smell our food. Optimal zinc status also enhances skin health and insulin regulation.

It is estimated that 12% of the population is zinc-deficient. How do we become zinc-deficient? Current non-organic farming practices leave the soil deficient in many essential nutrients. Consuming foods that are processed and prepackaged rather than organic whole foods can lead to zinc deficiency. Consuming too many grains can also contribute to zinc deficiency as grains contain phytic acid, a compound that binds to zinc, which contributes to a depletion of our status.

How can you determine your zinc status? There are several ways in which you can ascertain your zinc status. A blood test could be done, oral taste test, or hair mineral analysis. Make an appointment with your family doctor or natural health care provider to request any of these tests.

To improve your zinc levels, I recommend consuming foods such as:

- · Green Peas
- Beans (soaking beans in water for several hours will improve bio-availability of the zinc)
- Mushrooms
- · Spinach
- Sea Vegetables
- Nuts and Seeds (soaking nuts and seeds is also recommended)
- Oysters
- · Organic Grass-fed Beef and Dairy
- · Unsweetened Chocolate (cacao)



If your zinc levels are extremely low, you may consider supplementation with a high-quality supplement from a reputable company that practises Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) including

third party testing to ensure the supplement does not contain any lead or other heavy metals. Zinc supplements are relatively inexpensive and a very effective way to protect yourself and your family this winter from getting colds or the flu.

To help boost your immune system this winter, try this wonderful Zinc filled Stir-Fry recipe.

#### Balsamic & Beef Stir-Fry: 4 Servings

One pound package organic grass-fed ground beef

- 3 Tbsp Balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tbsp wheat-free tamari
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried basil

Mix all above ingredients together in a bowl and let marinate for 30 minutes.

1 Tbsp Grape Seed Oil
1 medium red onion, diced
2 cups mushrooms, quartered
½ cup green peas
1 large carrot, diced
1 cup artichoke hearts
1 cup cherry tomatoes
1 cup chopped parsley
½ cup chopped basil

- In stainless steel skillet or cast iron pan, brown meat mixture thoroughly until no red is remaining. Remove from pan, place in bowl and set aside.
- Add 1 Tbsp Grape seed oil and onion to pan, sauté for a few minutes, next add mushrooms, peas and carrots. Stir fry until vegetables are just tender.
- Add the artichoke hearts, cherry tomatoes, fresh parsley, basil and cooked ground beef mixture. Stir fry for about 2 minutes for the flavours to combine. Serve over brown rice or brown rice pasta.
