Talking with ed

~ Historically Speaking

If someone asked me 20 years ago if I was interested in history, I would have said, "No, not really." My position on that has changed though, mainly due to the research I've done over the years for the Outlook. I've been living in Baden for nearly 37 years and finally can feel my roots settling in, since I spent only 17 years in my home town of MacTier, and a few years in K-W. Maybe as people get older they start to look at history a little more in depth. I do find it more and more interesting.

I was quite fortunate that a distant cousin, Dave Lemkay, from Pembroke, Ontario took the initiative in the early 1970s to research my maternal grandfather's family. The history included two generations of grandparents on his side of the family. What a great start for anyone in our family researching their history. From there he printed a book; we ordered three of them, one for us and two for our children. It seems like a treasure to me now.

Cousin Dave, who ran a printing company in Pembroke, started researching the family tree and sent out letters to family members asking for photos and names of everyone connected to the Lemkay family. Everyone dug in and sent him a remarkable amount of information and photos.

My Dad's family is much more of a mystery. Looking back, I wish I would have asked my father a lot more questions. What was your father or grandfather like? Where did they come from? What did they do for a living? In many ways I feel that I have let my children down by not recording our family history, but that is what happens when you're young and don't ponder the value of history.

The other night I was on Facebook when an ad for Ancestry.com came up encouraging me to find out if I was related to Albert Einstein. I thought, "what the heck," and the first thing that I was asked was my grandfather's name and where he was from. I loaded the info and my grandparents' marriage certificate appeared, including both my great grandparents' and grandparents' names. It was exciting to find out that Hugh and Mary Daisy Fisher were from Ottawa; though John and Virginia LaLonde had no address stated on the certificate, I had a starting point to research my dad's side of the family.

Pat's side is in a similar situation. Her father was Stewart Cook from Nithburg, but there is a limited amount of information on his parents and grandparents. Her mother Jean Cook (Seyler), on the other hand, has more information to work with. A distant relative of the Seylers, Carol Horn, a historian from Michigan, has done extensive research and found she is related to the Seyler Family, and Jean has also given us information to work with in researching the family tree.

I would encourage everyone to make notes as they talk to their parents and grandparents. Don't be afraid to ask questions and write it down. If you don't do it for yourself, then do it for your children.

I have had the opportunity to interview many interesting people over the years. Some have passed on and many of their stories go with them. An example was my interview with Norman Haufshield, who was the township's road foreman many years ago. Six months after our interview he passed away. That is when I first really understood the value of history and why I find it important to document as much as I can through the Outlook.

In November, after the fire, I had promised to write an article about the history of the Egli's Meats / Seasons Grande property. Luckily our friend Larry, who works in the deed research field, agreed to help us out. He gave us the history of lot 14 North of Snyder's Road (NSR) and it was quite extensive! It dates back to May 7, 1831 when Joseph Goldshmidt purchased land from the Crown. One of the problems I ran into while researching was the fact that Goldschmidt purchased the land, but over time it was severed many times. That was quite complex to sort out. If you too are interested in history, you will enjoy the article on page 12-13 and you will find what I discovered about the property. One of the neat things about the history was the fact that our property was part of that parcel of land at one point.



The snow A urinary tract infection is not the only reason for your dog to is an opportunity for all sorts of family fun: building snowmen, tobogganing, and skiing. Even our furry friends get excited about running through the white stuff. The snow presents another opportunity that most people would not think of: urinary tract infection detection. Now, most dogs with a

urinary tract infection (UTI) will show the more common signs long before seeing blood in the snow. But every winter we see patients that have not displayed any obvious signs and present for "peeing blood in the snow."

Anyone who has had a urinary tract infection themselves is familiar with the aching, urgent feeling of needing to go right now and then

only dribbling out a tiny bit of urine. You can call your doctor and describe your symptoms. It's not so easy with dogs, so it's important to know what to watch for.

When a dog gets a UTI, they may strain or have difficulty urinating, it may be painful for them to urinate, and they may have blood in their urine. Urinating inappropriately in the house is another important sign of a bladder problem. Other signs include: more frequent urination, a break in housetraining, blood in the urine, dribbling urine, crying out while urinating, straining to urinate, frequently or obsessively licking the genital area.

present these signs, but it is the most common one. Bladder stones, sterile cystitis, or kidney infections are other things that can cause your dog to show these symptoms. An appointment with your veterinarian can help to determine the underlying issue.


> To get a diagnosis, your vet will need to analyze a urine sample. The fresher the sample the better! The sample you collect should ideally be midstream into a sterile or clean container. A urinalysis is a start, but culturing the urine — taking a sample and letting bacteria grow — allows us

to know for sure if there's an infection and identify the bacteria causing it. It usually takes a few days to get the results of a urine culture.

Once we have a diagnosis, a specific antibiotic can be prescribed in the case of an infection.

If you have any concerns in regards to the urinary habits of your pet, speaking to your veterinarian earlier rather than later is an important first step. And remember, any red snow definitely warrants a visit to your veterinarian.



SNOWFLAKE FACTS

Snowflakes and snow crystals are basically the same; a crystal is one tiny bit of ice, snowflakes are many snow crystals stuck together. Check out the facts about snowflakes below.

Snowflakes are not frozen raindrops. Frozen raindrops are known as sleet. Snow crystals are formed when water vapour freezes, which happens up in the clouds.

Snowflakes are also formed in the clouds. This happens when water droplets freeze and become ice particles. Water vapour in the cloud assembles on the ice particle, causing it to stretch into a basic hexagonal prism and then to shoot out branches to create a more difficult and complex shape. Once this has happened, snowflakes then change even more to make them unique. The temperature and dampness of the cloud constantly changes, which affects the shape of each snowflake. Although snowflakes can change shape quickly, the hexagonal symmetry is kept.

"Snowflakes can be categorized into six main types; plate (flat), column, stars, dendrite, lacy, needle, and capped column. When it is extremely cold, the snow is very fine and powdery and snowflakes become quite simple in design, usually needle or rod shaped. When the temperature is near to freezing point (0 degrees Celsius), snowflakes become much larger and a lot more complex in design." There are 35 main snowflake designs which you can recognise by just looking closely.

"It is indeed extremely unlikely that two complex snowflakes will look exactly alike. It's so extremely unlikely in fact, that even if you looked at every one ever made you would not find any exact duplicates."

According to the Guinness Book of World Records, the largest snowflake in the world was 15 inches wide and 8 inches thick. This was recorded in January 1887 by somebody called Matt Coleman at Fort Keogh, Montana. He said that the snowflake was "larger than milk pans".





Notes From The Attic - The History of 162 Snyder's Road East

In the November issue we mentioned that we would feature a historical article on Seasons Grande/ Egli's property after the fire left the site vacant. It took a considerable amount of research, as we dug back as far as 1831. Our friend Larry, who works in the research field, collected the records of all the home owners of lot 14 NSR (North of Snyder's Road) in Baden, which also includes the Livingston property. As many are aware, the properties today are considerably different from Lot 14 NSR that Joseph Goldsmidt purchased on May 7th, 1831. After constant subdividing and changing of ownership and who owned what property, we have come up with this article about the site. Ironically, this information also involves the home of the Baden Outlook!

Early Ownership of the Property – The large property changed hands several times, including owners such as Christian Kropf and Heinrich M. Brubacher. Brubacher was listed in the 1881 census as living in Wilmot Township and having an occupation as an operator of a woollen mill. The woollen mill was located on the northeast corner of Brubacher Street and Snyder's Road. Heinrich is also listed as owner of the business in 1891; he purchased the property on June 18, 1904. His son, Elias, purchased the property (17 acres) from him on March 18, 1907, and more property from the estate of Louisa Schmidt on June 10, 1913. The woollen mill burned to the ground in 1916. Elias is listed as a Wellesley farmer in the 1921




census. The property was then sold to Moses O. Jantzi and Thomas G. Walker in May of 1921.

Sam Roth Garage - Samuel M. Roth and Albert A. Diebel purchased the property from Jantzi and Walker on July 24, 1930 and developed a garage. It might be possible that Samuel Roth built the original building, but it cannot be confirmed. Sam Roth started out selling McColl Frontenac fuel then switched to Texaco in 1941 when Texaco bought out McColl Frontenac.

The retail location at the front was a lunch bar where they sold sandwiches, hot lunches, breakfasts, and soft drinks. The rear of the building was used for car repairs and maintenance. Sam had two full time mechanics to help him with repairs. R and D Motors occupied the west side of the building. Sam Roth also sold Chrysler and Dodge vehicles. The photo above, taken in 1935,

shows a garage door on the westerly side of the building which was not there during Egli's ownership. At that time, a vehicle could drive through the entire building; once inside, it had enough width for two vehicles. At the east end of the building there was a pit where mechanics could work under the vehicles. Sam Roth had a sense of humour about him. Apparently at one time he had a set of stairs at the front of the building inviting people to see the North American monkey. At the top of the stairs he had placed a mirror.

Petznick Garage – William and Gertrude Petznick purchased the property from Sam Roth around 1945. William closed the lunch bar and created a waiting room area. He sold Hillman Minx vehicles, operated the Texaco gas station, and continued doing repairs and maintenance on vehicles in the rear of the shop. William also had several mechanics helping with repairs. He was a founding member of the Baden Chamber of Commerce and the Wilmot Rod and Gun Club.

<u>Herner Wood Products</u> – Harley and Ruth Herner purchased 162 Snyder's Road East from the estate of William, Harold, and Gertrude Petznick on March 15, 1974. The back of the building was used to build wooden lawn furniture, and the front of the building was a retail location to sell the



Egli's Meat Market – Hans and Bruno Egli purchased 162 Snyder's Road East on September 22, 1977. The business was started in Philipsburg by Hans Senior in 1962 and then transferred to the Baden location. The Eglis had their own cattle truck and originally purchased much of their beef from local farmers. They became famous for their quality meats, including their summer sausage, smoked and garlic sausages, along with a wonderful selection of other fresh meats. Many of their products were shipped out of our area, to Toronto for instance. The brothers had to invest significant funds to renovate the shop over time to keep up with provincial health regulations. The Eglis would have had to spend thousands of dollars on continued renovations to accommodate the inspectors—yet the regulations would continue to change and the demands to meet the standards become unmanageable. The Eglis were communityminded and generously helped many local organizations through donations and discounts of their products. They were sadly missed when they closed their business.

Seasons Grande - Pete and Vicki Wilhelm, the current owners, purchased 162 Snyder's Road East on August 16, 2012. The Wilhelms continued on with the meat business early that September, adding fresh bread, produce, and other local products to their shop. After a year or so, the decision was made to discontinue selling food items and focus on landscape supplies. This business model remained until November 8, 2016 when it was destroyed by the fire.

Baden Birding ~

The Canada Jay aka The Whiskey Jack ~ CGS nomination for Canada's National Bird

The following information was gleaned from an article that appeared online in The London Free Press on November 18, 2016, as well as Hinterland Who's Who.

Around the middle of November 2016, The Canadian Geographic Society (CGS) announced that, after 2 years of information gathering, they had nominated a bird to be the national bird for Canada. They did this because, unlike many other countries, Canada had no national bird and 2017 is Canada's 150th anniversary of confederation. For example, the U.S. has the Bald Eagle as its national bird, Australia the Emu, New Zealand the Kiwi.

The top 10 vote-getters in the CGS's online survey seeking nominations for Canada's national bird were:

Common loon — 13,995 votes Snowy owl — 8,948 Grey jay or whiskey jack — 7,918 Canada goose — 3,616 Black-capped chickadee — 3,324 Common raven — 1,680 Blue Jay — 1,037 Atlantic puffin — 764 Great blue heron — 617

From the list of birds above, the Loon is Ontario's provincial bird, the Snowy Owl is Quebec's provincial bird, and the Chickadee is New Brunswick's provincial bird.

To most Canadians who know the bird, The Grey Jay is affectionately known as the Whiskey Jack; the name comes from its First Nations name, "Wisakedjak." The American Ornithological Society changed the bird's name in 1957. (Don't you just hate the way we toss aside the names First Nation people already had for places and things and replace them with our own?) The


reason some readers may never have seen a Whiskey Jack is that they inhabit the Boreal Forest region of Canada. Visitors to Algonquin Park have almost certainly encountered this bird. The Canada Jay inhabits almost all of the regions of Canada outside of S. Ontario.

The CGS found this bird to be an excellent choice for Canada's national bird for a host of reasons. The Whiskey Jack is a relative of the crow and raven, who are among the most intelligent members of the bird world. Ornithologists say the Whiskey Jack is the most intelligent bird on the planet. It is found in every province and territory across the boreal region of Canada.

They stay in Canada year round, including winter, living

in part off of food they have cached during the summer along with food they find. One would suppose they would eat conifer seeds in the boreal forest but one would be wrong. They catch insects and spiders, berries, the occasional small mammal or amphibian, carrion, bird eggs and nestlings, and fungi, finding them by slowly moving through the forest as a pair or family group. They are extraordinarily friendly, often perching on fingers and eating out of proffered hands without training.

Whiskey Jacks are just a little smaller than Blue Jays, but the grey, black, and white markings make them easy to distinguish from other similar-sized birds. Its back and tail are medium grey while its underparts are a lighter grey. The head has a striking pattern of black and white with large black eyes and a short black bill. Although it is not a colourful bird, it has so many characteristics that make it a worthy candidate for Canada's national bird.

The husband said meekly, "Your Honour, she also stole two cans of peas."







Do you feel there just aren't enough hours in the day to get everything done?

Do you feel as if no one is thankful for everything that you do for them?

Do you feel exhausted at the end of the day and then cannot turn off your brain, keeping you from falling asleep?

If you have answered yes to any of these questions, you could be experiencing a higher than normal level of stress. If so, how are you managing it? And what has this got to do with gut health and digestion?

Stress begins in the brain. The brain and the gut (gastrointestinal tract) are created of the same type of cells. The brain is connected to the gut by the Vagus Nerve, also consisting of these same cells. Whatever your brain thinks, your gut feels, whether positive or negative. For example, if you feel happy, your gut will be relaxed and supplied with enough blood to take the nutrients to the rest of your body. However, if you have negative thoughts, such as relationship issues or fearing a situation, your gut will contract with tension (the gut is lined with "smooth muscles"), and cortisol levels and other stress hormones will rise, causing the "fight or flight" response which can impair nutrient absorption. Stress will also increase blood sugar levels that promote weight gain.

Depending on the emotion, the severity of the emotion, and the duration of stress it causes, other organs can also be affected, such as the liver, the gallbladder and the pancreas, which are all involved with digestion.

You may also have physical symptoms such as gas, bloating, stomach pain, constipation, headaches,



migraines, lower back pain, eczema, and psoriasis. These symptoms can be a result of bacteria overgrowth anywhere along the gut, muscle tension and/or permeable membranes of the intestinal tract lining.

To improve digestion, it will be necessary to assess your nutrient intake, absorption of nutrients, your daily exercise, and life stresses. Once you have made an assessment on your own or with the help of a Nutritionist, you can implement a lifestyle to decrease stress that will ultimately improve mental and physical health.

Here are a few suggestions:

- Take care of yourself. Doing for everyone all of the time only exhausts you so you won't be any good to anyone in the future. Delegate and then trust others to get the job done.
- Don't worry about the future. Today has enough trouble of its own. Worrying about the future doesn't do a bit of help. Trust the Creator with your future.
- Take time to relax. Choose ways to get a laugh or two in the day. Eat well, drink plenty of water, and eat more vegetables than meat.
- Forgive others and put on love. Unforgiveness causes resentment and anger. Take care of it as soon as possible to stop the poison.
- ♦ *Pursue a hobby* you have been putting off.
- Walk daily/gardening. They are both stress relieving.
- Hot Epsom salts bath. Add 1-2 cups of Epsom salts with a few drops of Lavender essential oil to a warm bath.
- Identify and share feelings openly and honestly with someone you trust. It is healing.

What to Expect When Seeing a Chiropractor

People often wonder when it is appropriate to see a Chiropractor. A majority of our patients are surprised when they find out how much we can help people and, probably more importantly, what we can help with. Every Chiropractor is different and not all provide the same services, so doing your homework with finding someone who can help you will often pay off. Here are a few examples of services that can help you!

Acute Pain - If someone presents with severe pain and hands on treatments are too painful, this is a good time to refer to the chiropractors. There are ways of reducing and managing the pain including Interferential current and electro-acupuncture. Once the severity of the pain has decreased, we are able to look more closely at what structures are generating that pain and continue to decrease the pain and normalize function.

Extremities - Our training allows us to treat much more than just back and neck pain. We can apply a number of various modalities and treatments to allow us to effectively fix a number of different injuries, for example:


- Shoulders rotator cuff strains and impingement syndromes react very well to soft tissue treatment but require supervised rehab exercises to correct the scapular dysfunction.
- ♦ Knees a lot of knee pain can be a result of poor hip function. Chiropractic care can successfully treat IT band syndrome, patellofemoral pain, and may help decrease pain associated with arthritis. We can diagnose (and often treat) ligament injuries of the knee.
- ♦ Ankles sprained ankles are rarely treated, but are very important to properly rehab. After a sprain, people may experience decreased strength and function in the hip muscles which could predispose them to a re-occurrence of ankle injuries. Ankle range of motion is essential to maintain to a minimum standard.
- Hips react very well to active release treatment and proper strengthening and motor control education. A proper squat assessment can reveal problems in people's hips that are easily fixed so that they can move with ease.

Chronic Back or Neck pain - Soft tissue management is key for chronic issues; it is recommended that most of those patients get regular massages as well. One of the key missing components with treating long term issues is corrective exercises and proper motor patterns. Lower back and core exercises can permanently get rid of long term issues. These exercises must be tailored to the individual's needs and abilities (difficulty of exercise and repetitions is dependent on the person).

Sharp Pain - Sharp pain is characteristic of joint related pain or sometimes nerve pain. Joint related pain reacts well to spinal manipulation or mobilization.

Numbness or Tingling- This can indicate nerve or vascular involvement. Electro acupuncture and active release can be quite effective for this and can compliment massage treatments to quickly decrease symptoms after a thorough evaluation and diagnosis.

Pain that does not resolve within 2-3 massage treatments - It is important to get rid of pain as soon as possible. The longer someone is in pain, the longer it may take to get them out of it.



People seeking help early on in an injury typically respond very well and tend to heal faster. If massage (or chiropractic) is not helping, it is important to investigate things further and possibly refer out. We often refer people to a sports medicine physician

for advanced imaging or enhanced pain relief. We can also refer out for radiographs if we find it clinically

relevant to the situation.

Sports Injuries - Our background and education give us the ability to diagnose and help acute (and chronic) sports injuries. When needed, we have the contacts to get people directly to a sports specialist for ultrasound imagining or MRI.



Mary Poppins has already attracted bookings of 344 students from local schools for two lower cost student matinees. TCP is expecting this show title to have tremendous general audience interest.

Their spring productions are ready to fly again in the newly renovated Jacob Street arena. And Mary Poppins herself? Oh yes, she will fly as well. It will be magic.

NithValley Club's portion of trails were open for three days and then, with warm weather conditions forecasted, it was decided that we had to close them again to protect the trails.

The Shack is open 24/7. Thanks to the landowner, we were able to build a park-like setting. If you drop in, please feel free to put a log in the woodstove.



Happy New Year! Wilmot Horticultural has updated our logo to keep in step, selecting a daylily which is our very own: *Wilmot Summer Sunset*. We are growing them to be prepared for our 50th anniversary, which is next year. We kick off our celebrations in September.

With winter here, "us gardeners" have time to reflect on what was successful in last year's garden and what we would like to modify this coming year. Winter is a great time for planning, and there are many resources (I listed many last year at http://www.badenoutlook.com/ pastissues.html p.13). If you are planning big changes, design your hardscapes first, such as patios, walkways, ponds; the planting comes later. For rainwater management on our properties, rain gardens are a more recent design element to consider. To avoid the rapid runoff of water into our waterways, the focus now is slowing down the runoff so that it is absorbed by the ground, preventing pollutants from entering our waterways and drinking water. www.cmhc-schl.gc.ca/en/co/grho/grho 007.cfm



We have snow which is great for winter sports and a great blanket for the garden. However, some wildlife such as rabbits may have a tough time finding food, so keep an eye on your shrubs and young trees for damage and protect them if necessary.



This year is Canada's 150th birthday!!! In celebration this column will focus on our native trees and plants and how gardens have changed over the years.

The **maple tree** was finally recognized as Canada's arboreal emblem in 1996. The maple (Acer) is a genus of trees and shrubs of the maple family (Aceraceae). Of the 125 species found worldwide, over two-thirds grow in China; **10 are native to Canada**. Maples grow in various soils and at varying altitudes but prefer deep, moist, fertile soils. They are a major constituent of eastern deciduous forests. Sugar, black, silver, red, and striped maples (A. saccharum, A.

nigrum, A. saccharinum, A. rubrum and A. pennsylvanicum respectively) are found in the East; mountain maple (A. spicatum) occurs eastwards from Manitoba; Manitoba maple (A. negundo) in Saskatchewan and Manitoba; bigleaf, Douglas and vine maples (A. macrophyllum, A. glabrum and A. circinatum respectively) in BC. http://www.thecanadianencyclopedia.ca/en/article/maple/

The oldest tree in Waterloo County was the "Merlau Maple" that grew from about 1610 to 1990. The oldest living maple in Ontario, and possibly Canada, is the 500+ year "Comfort Maple" near Fenwick.

Plant a Canadian maple!! Avoid the European Norway maples (Acer platanoides) as they are becoming an invasive species in many areas.
