We all grumble about wait times in emergency wards and the amount of time it takes to see specialists, but the Conference Board of Canada maintains its "B" grade and 10th-place ranking among the 17 peer countries. Health care is still accessible for everyone, which is very comforting.

Forbes.com has ranked Canada as the fourth friendliest country in the world, which speaks volumes on what caring and gentle people we are. (We've been told while vacationing in other countries, that we are known for our manners...and I said "Thank you very much" to that). how the locals are giving of their time and wallets to get it together. We at the Baden Outlook typically do not publish a paper in July, but this year we are creating the program for the Corn



The Wilmot Aquatic Aces will host their first annual Aces Kids' Triathlon on Sunday, June 30th, 2013 at the Wilmot Recreation Complex in Baden.

No experience is necessary to come out and participate! Just give it a "tri"! Each participant will receive a triathlon t-shirt, swim cap, medal, food, and much more.

The event is open to 400 kids between the ages 3-14. Kids compete in their own age groups and the race starts in the pool. Life jackets are available to those wanting to use one. Once the swim finishes, kids run to the transition zone located in the parking lot to put on a helmet and grab their bikes. The bike route is on the access road to the side of the complex and will be closed to traffic for the event.

Once the distance on the bike is completed, kids will place their bike back in the transition zone and will head out to run around the perimeter of the soccer field. The race ends as each kid crosses the finish line to the cheers of the crowd.



For the youngest age group of 3-5 year olds, one parent is allowed to participate with them to assist with transition and in the pool. Volunteer swimmers will also be in the pool for ages 3-7.





Where to begin with the wonderful choices of fresh local produce coming our way?!





Below are two fruity toppings to treat yourself with, whether for breakfast on yoghurt or oatmeal, or for dessert—they are fresh, healthy, and so yummy!

### Stewed Rhubarb

Easy to make, this is a must-have for quick desserts. 6 cups (1.5 L) chopped rhubarb 1 cup (250 mL) granulated sugar

2 tbsp (30 mL) water

### Preparation:

In large saucepan, combine rhubarb, sugar and water; cook over medium heat, stirring until sugar has dissolved. Reduce heat to medium-low; simmer uncovered, and stirring occasionally for about 15 minutes or until slightly thickened and rhubarb is in threads. Let cool. (Rhubarb can be refrigerated in airtight container for up to 5 days.)

### Delicious All-Purpose Strawberry Topping



### Directions:

Wash strawberries and remove stems; cut large berries in half or roughly chop them. Combine strawberries, sugar, and vanilla in a saucepan. Cook over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally. The mixture will sizzle for a while, but then juice will begin to form. Continue stirring; mash a few strawberries with a wooden spoon or heat-proof spatula to help produce the syrup. Cook until sauce thickens, about 15 minutes.

Remove from heat. In a blender, puree about 1/3 of the sauce, then mix back into remaining topping.

## Baden Birding ~ Orioles

We have lived on a small farm on Wilmot Easthope Road for more than 30 years. For every one of those years, a pair of orioles has nested and raised a brood in one of the many tall trees that surround our house. Most often they hang their pouched nest from a branch near the outer edge of the Soft Maple. A few times they have nested in the

Weeping Willow along the laneway up to the barn. The nest is usually easy to spot, being near the outer edge of the tree as opposed to being hidden in the interior. In years gone by, the now scarce American Elm was the favoured nesting tree of orioles. Maybe they feel safe being up so high and out on a very flexible branch that would bend under the weight of most predators such as squirrels. Our neighbours across the road, Ernie and Jean Faulhafer, usually have a pair of orioles in their tree as well.

The male oriole arrives back around the first week of May, resplendent in his contrasting plumage of brilliant orange and jet black with white accents. I usually hear his familiar song before I see him, high up in the maple. We often put slices of orange on a tray for him but he seldom partakes. Other people tell us that their orioles relish the fruit since blossoms are scarce. We also have an oriole nectar feeder, similar to a hummingbird feeder, but he seldom bothers with that either.

The more olive-coloured females arrive a week or two later. There is often a lot of scolding and chattering as the males chase each other through the foliage, defending their territory and their mate.

The nests are skillfully woven with fibers of pliable plant material, string or twine and horse-hair if it is available. The nests are strong and resilient, often hanging in place for several years. We have never known one to be blown down during breeding season. In the book *Birds of the Eastern Forest:2*, with text by John A. Livingston and paintings by J.F. Landsdown, Livingston writes: "In Bent's "*Life Histories*", Winsor Marret Tyler described this species as 'perhaps the most skillful artisan of any North American bird'." When the

nests did eventually fall to the ground, I puzzled for many years about the smooth, flat, silvery material was that was used in the construction of the nest. Then just this past year, while reading Bernd Heinrich's book, *The Summer Season*, he said that it was

fiber from dead milkweed stems, a plant material that grows in abundance around here.

According to Livingston, the Baltimore Oriole, the one this article is about, is named after the orange and black colours "of the Calvert Family, the Barons Baltimore, whose territorial grant north of the Potomac eventually became Maryland." The other oriole species also found in Eastern North America, including Waterloo Region, is the brown and black Orchard Oriole. On occasion I have seen Orchard Orioles in the field just east of us. Bullock's Oriole is a western species, residing west of the Rockies.

Like the American Robin, which was incorrectly named as a relative of the European Robin when it is actually a thrush, the name oriole is a misnomer. According to Livingston, orioles are birds of the Old World. There are none in this hemisphere. Our orioles are members of the American Blackbird family along with the Red-winged Blackbird, Grackle, and Cowbird.

On a summer day, it is such a pleasure to listen to the male singing, declaring his territory to all other males within earshot, and announcing his presence and availability to any oriole females that may still be searching for a mate. Later, as the summer progresses, we can hear the chattering of the parents as they approach the pouched nest, announcing their arrival to the 5 babies inside. Or later still, when the fledglings are bigger, we can hear their chattering requests for more insects to provide the protein needed for their rapidly growing bodies. When, at the beginning of autumn, they depart for their wintering grounds in Central and South America, we are grateful for the time they have spent with us and for how much they have enriched our lives and we look forward to their return next May.

## Shape-Up Your Shopping Cart!

It all starts here. What you buy and take home to stock your kitchen and prepare your meals will determine your health. Stocking your kitchen and pantry with whole, raw foods will ensure every meal and snack will feed your body in a positive manner. Shopping the perimeter of the grocery store for 90% of your cart is the best way to ensure healthy foods are entering your home for consumption. Grocery stores are laid out so that the freshest options are towards the walls: items such as produce, meat, deli, dairy, and frozen foods. I recommend loading up on these items but be

aware of some of the hidden processed foods even within these aisles. Think about purchasing as close to whole, raw foods as you can. Foods like



bologna, salami, cheese strings and frozen dinners usually contain additives and preservatives. Real cheese cannot be stringed! When purchasing yogurt, watch for hidden sources of aspartame, nutra-sweet, sucralose, Equal, or any other artificial sweeteners that may be used in low-calorie foods. Healthier alternatives to artificial sweeteners would be stevia, raw honey, maple syrup or organic cane sugar. Frozen fruits and vegetables are great to stock up on and usually contain higher nutrients than fresh produce depending how far the produce has travelled by truck to get to your store. Frozen foods are frozen within hours of picking and that locks in all the nutrition and freshness for you. Frozen produce is great during the winter months when we do not have access to fresh produce. As the season begins now with local lettuces becoming available, we can start to turn our attention to local markets and fresh produce vendors. Even consider planting a garden for the freshest crop ever with a taste that will make you wonder why you waited.

Now that Spring has Sprung and we are starting to warm up, I thought it would be a good time to re-publish the Dirty Dozen list for you. This is a listing of the twelve most heavily sprayed fruits and vegetables. We don't want to put herbicides, pesticides or other toxins into our bodies. There are already enough environmental toxins that our bodies need to deal with on a day to day basis; therefore, providing clean food is important for optimal health. You do not need to purchase all certified organic foods; however, this list of twelve should always be purchased organic.





### Book Review: Merlin's Immortals Series by Sigmund Brouwer

Canadian author Sigmund Brouwer caught my attention with his *Timberwolf* hockey series for ages 6 - 10. My children giggled at the antics of boys on teams from places out West that we have visited. His next two books I read in the suspense fiction category vividly depicted futuristic scenes that had me checking present realities.

As I searched through our Young Adult section, I found *The Orphan King* and *Fortress of Mist*. In this *Merlin's Immortals* series readers travel back in time and are introduced to Thomas, a young man who has been entrusted with great gifts. He seeks to use his knowledge to attain seemingly impossible ends. He continually needs to evaluate whether the people around him are friends or foes. The realms of superstition, scientific fact, and faith are explored as Thomas succeeds in his unusual strategies to wield power, yet he is threatened by dark plans laid years before by enemies using him as a pawn for their own purposes. Two young women also cause him to guess at what is real and what is false in testing character and emotion. Book three, *Martyr's Fire*, is due to be released in October, 2013 and I look forward to more surprises and secrets revealed.







The average person's body is composed of approximately 70% water. The body's water supply is responsible for and involved in nearly every biological process. Human beings can survive without food for thirty to forty days, but without water, we would not be able to live beyond three to five days!

Below are some interesting facts about the role of water in the human body and the health benefits of adequate water intake.

- **1. Regulation of body functions.** Water is essential for respiration, digestion, nutrient absorption, and elimination of waste products and toxins from the body. Water is also responsible for healthy circulation, and controlling body temperature through perspiration.
- 2. Signs of dehydration. If not enough water is consumed, toxins can build up in the body resulting in many negative side effects. The consequences of inadequate water intake/dehydration may include: muscle and joint pain, cramping, headaches, fatigue, digestive problems, inflammation, and poor functioning of many organs.
- **3. Helpful for weight loss.** Water is a great fluid replacement for high calorie drinks such as alcohol and sodas/carbonated drinks. Drinking water before meals can also help kickstart metabolism and act as an appetite suppressant.
- **4. Support for the Musculoskeletal (MSK) system.** Water brings *for consultationer.* wital nutrients to muscle tissue to support performance and decrease the risks of cramps and strains. Water also helps to protect our joints by providing lubrication and cushioning.
- **5. Better productivity at work.** Your brain consists of 90% water. Therefore, proper hydration helps you think better, be more alert and focused, and feel more energized.
- 6. Look younger with healthier skin. Your skin is the largest organ in the body. Water helps to replenish skin tissues by improving circulation to skin cells, maintaining elasticity, and moisturizing from the inside out.
- **7. Feel healthier**. Consuming plenty of water can help maintain proper immune functioning, and can prevent or improve symptoms of the common cold, flu, arthritis, kidney stones, constipation, and many other conditions.

How much water is enough? This is not an easy question to answer and can be dependent on many factors. A general rule of thumb to follow is to consume 0.5-1 litre of water daily for every 50 pounds of body weight. Special consideration for greater water consumption must be taken into account for those who are engaged in vigorous activity

considerations must be taken into account for  $\bigvee$  those who consume caffeine, alcoholic beverages, and certain medications, as these substances can act as diuretics and actually drain your body of water.

Additional

Looking at the colour of your urine is an easy way to determine whether or not you are consuming enough water. As long as you are not taking riboflavin (vitamin B2), which fluoresces and turns your urine bright yellow (it is also in most multi-vitamins), then your urine should be a very light-coloured yellow. If it is a deep yellow then you are likely not drinking enough water.

Armand says - Yes Herb, in fact there was. The hamlet was once known in 1837 as "Weissenburg."


Years later it was known as "Middle Road" and "Gas". In 1854, Jacob Beck, a native of Baden Germany, named the town Baden.
