itches from those eager mosquitoes...go away--we want birds and butterflies!



Ask Armand ~

Norm from Baden asks—I know that Foundry, Brewery, and Tannery Streets were



named due to the businesses that existed on those streets, but how did Snyder's Road get its

Armand says - Coinciding with the settlement of the German Block was the development of three horizontal roads that had been part of Christian Nafziger's land deal. Allowances for these roads were made in a survey of the Block undertaken by Deputy Surveyor John Goesman just prior to settlement in 1824.

Settlers undertook the development of the roads, completing them by the early 1830s. Running east to west, they were located between every two of the six concessions, passing through Wilmot Township into Waterloo Township where there was access to three mills. They included: the Upper Road which led to Abraham Erb's mill (subsequently called Erb's Road); the Middle Road which led to Joseph Schneider's mill (Snyder's Road); and the Lower Road which led to Philip Bliehm's mill (Bleam's Road).



Citizen Appointments to Municipal Elections Compliance Audit Committee

The municipalities of the Region of Waterloo, City of Cambridge, City of Kitchener, City of Waterloo, Township of North Dumfries, Township of Wellesley, Township of Wilmot and Township of Woolwich invite interested citizens to apply for appointment to the recently created joint Municipal Elections Compliance Audit Committee (MECAC).

The MECAC will operate within the provisions of the "Municipal Elections Act", as amended. The MECAC will consider an application for a compliance audit of a candidate's election campaign finances received under Section 81 of the "Municipal Elections Act" from an elector to determine if the application should be granted or rejected. If granted, the MECAC will appoint an auditor, receive and consider the auditor's report and decide whether legal proceedings should commence.

Up to seven (7) persons are required for a **four-year term** ending November 30, 2018. Individuals with professional and/or technical qualifications in accounting and audit; academic expertise in political science or local government administration; legal background; or knowledge of the campaign finance rules contained in the "Municipal Elections Act" are invited to apply. Members shall not include members of any municipal Council represented; employees or officers of the municipalities represented; or any persons who are candidates in the election for which the Committee is established.

THE EVOLUTION OF GEXR

The town of Baden was formed by Jacob Beck in 1852, primarily through the knowledge that the Grand Trunk Railroad (GTR) was building a rail line through town. Grand Trunk was incorporated in 1852 and established their first rail line between Toronto and Montreal. Over the next few years GTR went through a rapid expansion, which included tracks laid through Waterloo County between 1856 and 1859 – reaching Sarnia in 1859. Stratford became a major hub for GTR and had their official opening on October 8, 1856. By 1867, Grand Trunk was the largest Railway System in the world. Unfortunately, in 1919 Grand Trunk declared bankruptcy and on January 30, 1923, GTR became part of the Canadian National Railway which was still the largest railway system in the world.

CNR continued to operate that line until 1992, when the government allowed large railroads to sell smaller short rail lines to companies, which would allow the larger companies to become more profitable. The Goderich –Exeter Rail was created on April 3,1992 by its owner Rail Tex. The line consisted of 70 miles (110 km) of track between Goderich and Stratford. On November 15, 1998, the Goderich–Exeter Railway (GEXR) assumed operation of CN's Guelph Subdivision, consisting of over 99 miles (159 km) between Silver Junction (Georgetown) and London, Ontario. This gave the company 181 miles (291 km) of track, which they own today.

Rail America purchased GEXR from Rail Tex in 2000 and they in turn sold the line to Genesee and Wyoming (G&W) in late 2012. Genesee and Wyoming began their operation in the 1800s as a 14 mile rail line in upstate New York hauling salt from mines. This continued until 1977 when it was purchased by a holding company. In America, the Staggers Act deregulated railroads, which are then allowed to dispose of routes that they can not operate profitably, helping to restore their financial

health. From 1985 until present, G&W began acquiring short line railroads and G&W



currently has 111 rail lines in United States, Canada, Australia, the Netherlands and Belgium. They own 15,000 miles of track and lease another 1,500 miles.

With 181 miles of track through Ontario, the GEXR moves approximately 25,000 cars per year with commodities such as salt fertilizer, wheat, grains, soy meal, rice, and automotive. (Many industries in the area rely on rail shipments as spur lines exist to access industrial parks.) The Goderich Subdivision handles over 8,000 carloads of freight per year and much of the traffic on the Goderich Subdivision is salt from the Sifto salt mines. Metropolitan areas such as Guelph, Cambridge, Kitchener, Waterloo, Elmira, Stratford, St. Mary's, Goderich, Clinton and Exeter enjoy rail service from the GEXR.

As of 2005, the railway owns around a dozen locomotives, which were acquired used. Its first four locomotives, purchased between 1992 and 1994, were given names of Shakespearean characters, such as Titania, Paulina, Falstaff, and Portia. Three of those are no longer with the company.

As of January 2013, GEXR owned nine locomotives, all of them built by General Motors Electro-motive division. All of the locomotives are numbered, with eight of them (4001, 2211, 3821, 2210, 2236, 4095, 7362, and 7369) being built in 1959. There is one other locomotive, 9392 which was built in June 1975. GEXR does not own any rail cars.







Improving the Health of our Community

Teaching Our Youth That They Can Cope ~ By Melodie O'Connell MSW RSW

Depression and anxiety rates are on the rise among our teens and youth. Five percent of male youth and 12% of female youth have experienced a major depressive episode during their high school years. Depression may be the result of untreated anxiety. There are many reasons for anxiety among our teens including family history, trauma (single-episode or ongoing), or maybe it has been modelled or taught to them. If parents are worriers, they often teach their children to be worriers; or parents do things for children, as we do not want them to 'fail' or experience disappointment.

More teens are seeking help now than ever before. This can be viewed as a positive thing because it means that services are more readily available. However, teens are now seeking help for things that would have not caused a crisis in the life of a teen in a previous generation. So, why are our youth struggling to cope?

Youth are under a lot of pressure academically, socially, and sometimes athletically. We encourage our kids (or maybe expect our kids) to take courses that will put them on a path for University, or some other specific path. Maybe we go above and beyond in putting them in extra programs in order for them to excel at sports, so they don't have to go through the heartache of getting cut from a team. Sometimes parents will help their kids complete assignments, or drive their homework or lunch to school, so that they do not experience the natural consequences

of their actions or inactions. Although our intentions may be good, we may also be teaching them that they are not able to do things on their own, or that they are not able to cope with natural outcomes.



One of the most important life skills that we can teach our children is that they can cope when things do not go according to plan. The term resilience is defined as "becoming strong, healthy, or successful after going through a bad experience." In order to allow our children to grow into successful adults, they need to experience some heartache, loss, and difficult situations, so they can gain confidence that they can cope. As parents, it is **not** our job to prevent difficult situations, but it is up to us to provide a supportive, loving environment in which our youth learn that they can rise above challenges. For many of today's youth, a loving family environment may not be what they personally experience. As parents, we can take an interest in the youth that come into our homes, and offer encouraging, supportive words they may not otherwise hear. We are very fortunate to live in a community in which we know our youth and many of their friends. As a community, we can work together to encourage and support our youth, so their confidence and resilience can continue to grow even when they are going through more difficult situations.

ICE THERAPY FOR MUSCLE AND JOINT INJURIES

Ice therapy is an effective, self-care treatment strategy for muscle and joint injuries. It is commonly used for acute injuries (within the first 72 hours), but can also be very helpful in managing flare-ups of chronic problems, and as a preventative measure following activities or exercise.

Ice therapy reduces the amount of swelling and inflammation at the injury site and also acts as an anesthetic to provide pain relief. Icing as soon as possible after an injury will help with speeding up recovery time, and minimize the chances of secondary problems such as muscle spasm and joint irritation.


Below are some helpful tips that should be followed when using ice therapy:

- Crushed ice and ice cubes are ideal sources of ice because they easily mold around an injury site and can stay cold for long periods of time. Commercial ice/gel packs and frozen vegetable bags are good secondary choices when crushed ice or cubes are not available.
- Use compression when applying ice to an injury site.
 Compression is most easily achieved with an elastic tensor bandage to add support and slow swelling. The principles of elevating and resting the injured site should also be followed during initial injury management.
- Ideal ice application time is 10 to 20 minutes. There should also be a period of 10 to 20 minutes or more where there is no ice application before icing is done again so that skin temperature can return to normal. This cycle can be repeated as often as necessary within the first 24 to 72 hours after injury or activity.

Below are some precautions that should be followed with ice therapy:

- Ice should never be applied directly over the skin for a
 prolonged period of time as this can damage skin tissue.
 A wet towel can safely be used as a barrier between the
 ice and skin and acts as an excellent conductor of cold.
- Ice should never be applied on blisters, open cuts or sores.





- Ice therapy should not exceed the treatment time recommended as prolonged exposure can reverse the positive effects of ice and can lead to possible frostbite.
- Special care must be taken when icing the elbow, wrist, knee, or foot as superficial nerves in these areas can become irritated or damaged with prolonged icing.
- People hypersensitive or allergic to cold and those who have a circulation problem should avoid ice.

If you have a muscle and joint injury that is not resolving, a qualified health professional can determine the cause of your pain and prescribe appropriate therapy and rehabilitation strategies specifically for your circumstance. Nithview Long Term Care facility in New Hamburg has a Family Council. We are a group of family and friends living the Family Council mission statement which is "to be advocates for the residents of Nithview Long Term Care and a support group for their families and friends."

The Family Council meets in the home's auditorium at 6:45 PM on the 3rd Monday of the month (except July/Aug/Sept.). Meeting topics vary from discussing care concerns with leadership to education presentations on topics such as: Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, Osteoporosis, Grieving, Quality Visiting and most recently "Gentle Persuasion". Gentle Persuasion is a new approach technique that the Nithview care team and family are learning to use. It involves understanding each resident, their likes and dislikes, and what might trigger fear or upset when approaching them or spending time with them. Knowing how to approach and respond to each individual makes all the difference to that resident and the people around them.

Family Council has an open relationship with staff and management. Our home is no different from any others in regard to limited financial support from our government, which results in staff that are kept hopping from the moment they report for duty. LTC staff do not have the time they once did to socialize with residents, as people are entering LTC with greater care needs after having been able to stay in their own homes longer with Home Care supports. We as family and friends are visitors, so we sometimes see areas for care enhancement that our staff does not have time to sit back and look for. As advocates, we share concerns that arise from our observation.

Family Council is also focused on increasing the "fun factor" at Nithview. We organize Family Nights with music and a time of visiting for all generations. Family Hymn Sing Nights are enjoyed by all who attend. We run an annual Indoor Yard Sale and these funds allow us to purchase bird feeders and feed for the patios. We are purchasing some additional seating for the patio and a large screen TV and stand for one of the floor's lounge areas. We buy supplies for Ice Cream Cafes that we host on all three floors of long term care on the holidays of holiday weekends. Family Council has sponsored special family focused activities on Family Day Weekends including filling the auditorium with antiques one time. Lots of good reminiscing took place that day! Many of the Family Council group are also involved in the Volunteer Program at Nithview. More volunteers mean a better social life for the residents.

If you have family or friends living in long term care at Nithview, please attend some meetings and/or volunteer to help at one of the holiday Ice Cream Cafes. The front cover of the Point Pelee National Park Warblers of Ontario (by Chris G. Earley) has a photo of the Prothonotary Warbler. If you're birding in Ontario, that may be the closest you ever come to seeing one of these uncommon little birds. There is only a dozen or so nesting spots in Ontario since we are at the northern edge of the Prothonotary's summer nesting range. In winter these little birds hang out in Panama, Colombia and Venezuela, along the Caribbean and Pacific coasts. Little is the operative word – they are just 14 cm/5.5 inches long and weigh 14grams/.5 oz.

One of their nesting spots is at Rondeau Provincial Park on Lake Erie, near Ridgetown. There behind the interpretive centre is a series of trails with many boardwalks. Rondeau, like most of the peninsulas reaching out into Lake Erie, is a series of ridges with swamps and sloughs between them. The Prothonotary is the only cavity nesting warbler in Ontario, and likes building its nests just above the surface of still water. I've been going to Rondeau as one of my spring birding trips for a number of years, in particular to see the Prothonotary, but also for the many other birds which use it as a stopover in their spring migration. But I've never seen a Prothonotary at Rondeau over the many years – until this year.

look at the rump. And there he was, a male Prothonotary in all his golden glory, with a white rump and grey, almost blue wings. He was only about 5 metres from us and we watched him for a long time

We were wandering the trails on May 26 – kind of late for the migration and the trees had leafed out quite a bit already, but it has been a busy spring. What can I say?! As we wandered, we were seeing quite a few birds, mostly those which were nesting in the area already. There were many yellow warblers (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/American Yellow Warbler) singing their hearts out, flitting from tree to tree. Then we spotted a different yellowish warbler. We watched her carefully, perhaps this was the Prothonotary? But alas, no. No white rump, the wings weren't dark enough, and she was nesting in a lovely nest in the crook of a small tree. We figured out that she was a

I had seen a Prothonotary once before – in my backyard in Waterloo. Waterloo is not a nesting spot for the Prothonotary, so though I was pretty sure I had seen one I put a question mark behind it in my record keeping book. It wasn't until the fall when I looked up what folk in the area had been seeing that I noted someone else had also seen a Prothonotary in Waterloo – on the same day I had. This is important – often we think we've seen something exotic or out of place but such sightings are rare. Until another person verifies it, the sighting is questionable.

Well, it was a great day of birding, even if what we were seeing was the very tail end of the spring migration and mostly nesting birds. We saw many thrushes and woodpeckers, as well as other warblers. As one birder we met that day said, "A day birding, even if there aren't many birds, beats most other things."



Inflammation and Your Health

You may think of inflammation as being related to a specific injury, like when you bump your knee and swelling ensues. However, inflammation can be going on in many areas of your body right now and you may not even know it.

Why is this important and why should you care? Because inflammation is at the root of many chronic and degenerative diseases. Inflammation within the body is sometimes expressed by an outward sign such as a headache, muscle soreness, or tension, but not always.

Your doctor can do a blood test for an inflammatory marker in your blood known as C-Reactive Protein. This blood test may be the only indication you have of systemic inflammation and is an important statistic to know. Rest assured that if you have already been diagnosed by your doctor as having high blood pressure, type 2 diabetes, metabolic syndrome, dementia, Alzheimer's or cancer, you have inflammation in your body right now.

There is help and there is hope. No diagnosis, in my opinion, is a life sentence. I have seen countless examples

New Hamburg Fall Fair Celebrates 160 Years!

ello again from the Wilmot Agricultural Society; you know, the folks who present the New Hamburg Fall Fair? OK so maybe you don't know WAS, but you do know the Fair, don't you? Well for those few who do not know the New Hamburg Fall Fair, you should be thankful for Pat & Barry (and I certainly hope you know who they are!), as they have

graciously allowed WAS to post a monthly article in the Outlook regarding the 2014 New Hamburg Fall Fair. For this we are truly thankful, as it is individuals such as Pat & Barry and their generosity of both time and resources that continue to help the Fall Fair succeed and grow every year. Thanks Pat, thanks Barry!

Now to the Fair: this year's celebration is quite a Milestone as it is the 160th, making it one of the oldest


continuous Fall Fairs in Ontario. For 140 years it has been held in the same place, Norm S. Hill park (in New Hamburg of course!). In 1874, the Village of New Hamburg purchased the 17 acres at the last bend in the river in New Hamburg, to give the Fair some permanency, and 140 years later, I guess their plan worked. To further develop the location and to accommodate the growing community's social demands, a horse race track was added 12 years later, with the first annual Fall Fair Race being held in 1886. Although horse racing continued in New Hamburg for many years to come, it was only part of the Fall Fair until 1894, the year the first Grandstand was built; then horse racing became its own identity in New Hamburg with its big race day moving to the middle of August and continuing at this wellknown venue for many, many years to come. Although horse racing left New Hamburg many years ago, the Fair and its traditions held on.

The Fair and its 160 years have been through thick and thin. World Wars and Depressions, Good Seasons and Bad, regardless of times, every September the Fair arrived just as the last breaths of summer were being drawn. The bright colours of the Fair signaled the bright colours of the fall foliage soon to arrive. The abundance of preserves and quilts also tell of the

coming winter where they would be enjoyed for more than just a show. Soon the winter months would settle in, but for now, in the last days of summer, the thoughts of a howling winter wind would be drowned out by the howling laughter of children on the newest amusement ride.

The September weekend tradition in New Hamburg

was and is as much about community as it is about competition. The same two teams competing in a plowing match would be the same two teams working side-by-side in a field with more hands making the work lighter. And although the bragging rights were prestigious as to whose Mama makes "the best apple pie", these same competitors would come together both before and after and share about their summer days, to reconnect after the busy harvest, and to catch up,

Saturday, May 24th was sunny and warm: perfect weather for our Baden Ball Bottle Drive!




