Rolling...take one!

I have been on one movie set in my life, here

in Baden in September 2010. The location was at the old

Wilmot Township offices on Beck Street and the movie was called Small Town Murder Songs, starring Peter Stormare and Jill Hennessey. I didn't witness any

filming but had a chance to hang around the set and talk to Peter, which was really cool. So I jumped at the chance when I was invited to Castle Kilbride to witness the actual production of the miniseries, Anne.

Dorigen Fode, the location manager for Northwood Productions, met me at the front door and walked me through all the duties that come with the filming. There were 120 members of the crew, which to me seemed to be a lot

of bodies buzzing around. "There are many departments and many of them bring their own trucks," explained Dorigen. "Some of the departments include sound, camera, visual effects, special effects, lighting, electrical, props, hair and makeup, grips, and of course the directors and producers. Many of those departments also include assistants," said Dorigen.

"The Director puts into play the creative elements from each department, while the Producer is responsible for the logistics of the show, and the Executive Producer handles the financial aspects of the show," Dorigen stated. The majority of the senior management in this production crew are women, which is somewhat rare in this industry. "Everyone works well together," said Dorigen.

After I was given an "Anne Crew" sticker for my jacket, Dorigen and I walked from the main entrance of the Castle to the hallway. The walls were barricaded with two foot pieces of cardboard to protect them, and much of the floor was covered with mats. The crew took special care to not damage anything.

There was filming going on upstairs in one of the bedrooms. Occasionally a person sporting a headset would walk down the hall and yell, "Quiet in the house please." Upstairs, a crew member would yell, "Rolling," followed by one minute of shooting and finishing with, "Cut." There were about a dozen of these moments where talking was forbidden and crew members stopped what they were doing. "Why so many takes?" I asked. "There are several angles that have to be shot and each angle has three to four takes," said Dorigen. Filming was done in one of the upstairs bedrooms, the downstairs hallway, the dining room, and outside the building.

The whole process is so elaborate! All of the smaller décor that was in the house belonging to Castle Kilbride was packed away the week before and replaced with period pieces brought by Northwood Productions. This included items such as tea sets, candle holders, bottles, place settings, lamps and bedding etc. Even when they were taking footage outside, they asked to have the historic shutters opened to be as authentic as possible. The production arrived and departed so quickly and quietly even the neighbours mentioned how courteous and efficient they were.

I saw many of the stars walk by during breaks, and had a chance to talk to Director, Amanda Tapping. Many would remember her from the 238 episodes of Stargate where she played Samantha Carter.

Of course, one of the questions I had to ask was, "Why Castle Kilbride?" Dorigen said "They took one look at the house and knew that this was the location they were looking for. The house is in such great shape, preserved in its original state, a private residence, and had the look they were looking for."

Seen here is 'Anne' who is holding a letter from the Castle archives that was given to Laura Louise and her father, inviting them to a talk given by Lucy Maud Montgomery. LMM signed the letter. Castle Kilbride also has a few first edition LMM books in the collection. Anne is holding the two items in Laura Louise's bedroom inside Castle Kilbride. Thanks to Tracy from Castle Kilbride who shared this photo with us.

Anne, the eight episode miniseries, will premiere with a two-hour show airing on CBC on March 19th. Netflix will also be airing the show in 2017. It will be exciting to see our town of Baden and our national historic site showcased on one of the episodes!


sparkle! Let's hope for nice weather to get a good crowd out. This year the Wilmot Eco Boosters will be on hand to help with the event this year and hand out literature.

KEEP YOUR PET WITH ARTHRITIS COMFORTABLE

Arthritis in our pets is a part of aging. The easy run becomes a stiff walk; the jump to a favourite chair is no longer possible; lying down is accompanied by a deep



groan. As our dogs age, things that were once second nature become an effort. This is a natural process that occurs as dogs get older. The cartilage surfaces of their joints begin to thin, and cartilage cells die. When the cells die, they release enzymes that cause inflammation of the joint capsule and release of excessive joint fluid. Extra bony growths (osteophytes) can develop. With severe cartilage thinning, the normal joint space narrows and the bone beneath the cartilage deteriorates. All of this causes further changes in the normal functioning of the dog's joint which causes discomfort, potential lameness or decreased mobility.

Even though this process is inevitable, there is hope. There are many therapies which can support and alleviate the symptoms of arthritis in our aging pets. They can take the form of simple lifestyle modifications, nutritional supplements, medications, and supportive therapies. A therapy that many may not be aware of is cold laser therapy.

Humans have long enjoyed the therapeutic benefits of laser therapy but it is now being used by veterinarians to treat animals. Cold laser therapy, sometimes called low-level or Class IV laser therapy, treats arthritis, tendon problems, and soft tissue injuries. Laser therapy also promotes wound healing to get pets back to health quickly. This therapy is a noninvasive procedure using light to improve blood circulation and stimulate cell regeneration. The benefits are due to its anti-inflammatory action by which it activates the lymphatic drainage system to reduce swelling. It acts to alleviate pain by having a beneficial effect on nerve cells and stimulating endorphin release which blocks pain. Laser therapy also improves vascular flow, metabolic activity, improves nerve function, and reduces scar tissue.

The process is actually quite simple. The laser probe is placed on your pet's body over the area where there is inflammation or pain, such as an arthritic joint. The laser penetrates beneath the skin and generates energy into the damaged tissues which relaxes the muscles and reduces the inflammation and swelling, and thus the pain caused by the body's natural response to injury.

The procedure is painless and no fur gets shaved over the treated areas. Your pet can just lie back and relax while they get the treatment.

Speak with your veterinarian if you think your aging pet is showing signs of arthritis. Together you can form a plan to put a skip back in your senior's step.





Leprechauns enjoy making and mending shoes. Their name may have derived from the Irish *leath bhrogan*, meaning shoemaker!



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
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Baden Birding ~ Sitelle/Sittelle

When I worked at Wrigley Corners Outdoor Education Centre, my resource person, Ted, told me that his baby daughter was named after his favourite bird. She is called Sitelle. Since Ted was an excellent birder with an extended knowledge of the world's birds, I imagined that Sitelle was named after an exotic tropical bird that he had seen on one of his many birding trips.



There are 17 species of true nuthatches in North America, Europe and Asia. The name itself is derived from their habit of placing nuts or hard shelled seeds in a bark crevice, where they peck at it until it yields the protein and fat rich store of energy concealed inside the shell. It has been suggested that "nuthatch" is a corruption of nut hack.

Of the 17 worldwide species, four are native to North America and we are lucky to have two of these species as residents of Wilmot. The more commonly seen White-breasted Nuthatch is usually found in deciduous trees (trees which lose their leaves in winter). Red-breasted Nuthatches are usually associated with conifer trees which are mostly evergreens. Both species are usually heard before they are spotted: their *yank-yank* call, while soft, travels well in a woodlot. The calls of the smaller Red-breasted Nuthatch are distinctly more nasal sounding. Both species often join foraging flocks of chickadees and goldfinch at the edges of woodlots, along fence rows, and at feeders. Their name and their presence at your feeder would lead you to believe that these birds are seed and nut eaters, but insects, insect eggs and larva, spiders, spider eggs, and countless other invertebrates make up a large portion of their diet, especially

when they are feeding hatchlings. If you have a suet feeder you will often catch a glimpse of a nuthatch satisfying its inner carnivore with high energy fat.



If you look closely, you will find that nuthatches have a greatly enlarged hind toe that allows them to grasp branches and bark so they can travel straight down a tree. This different perspective allows them to

find insects and other invertebrates that other birds would miss as they travel up the tree. It also allows nuthatches to hide extra food, such as seeds, where others can't find it. Just to be sure of the safety of their food stores, nuthatches often cover the cache with pieces of bark or moss.

Other members of the family *Sittidae* have equally interesting methods of survival. The USA resident Brown-headed Nuthatch is a tool user: it actually uses a piece of bark as a lever to pry up sections of bark under which invertebrates hide. The western North American Pygmy Nuthatch roost communally during the harsh winter months, often cramming more than 100 individuals into a hole in a tree where they keep each other warm enough to survive

So, is this little bird one of your favourite feeder visitors? Is it a true joy to hear its call while walking through a woodlot, or while you sit in your backyard under the shade of a big tree which the nuthatch is gleaning for food? Is your pear tree producing more and better pears because the pesty *pear psylla* are being held in check by nuthatches and chickadees? Could this be one of your favourite birds as it now is mine? And Ted? He is now the leader of Nature Canada's domestic and international bird conservation initiatives as well as the Nature Caretakers Programme. He sits on the Canadian Migration Monitoring Network. His little nuthatch, Sitelle, is a researcher at the University of Ottawa in Race, Ethnicity and Politics, International Relations, and Human Rights.



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

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


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Be Well ~ Dangers of Teflon!

I am not a fan of non-stick cookware. Not just because I've researched the subject, but also because of two simple experiments we did at home. I encourage you to try the following:

Experiment #1: Take a non-stick pan and put a centimeter of water in the bottom of the pan. Add 2 teaspoons of baking soda. Bring this to a hard boil. Taste the water after it has cooled. A simple chemical reaction occurs which leaches dangerous chemicals into the water (or cooking food). The taste was so horribly toxic that I quickly ran to spit out the "water." I immediately threw my one non-stick pan in the garbage.

Experiment #2: Years later, our daughter brought water to a hard boil in a Teflon pan. She allowed it to cool and then watered a healthy plant and some bean seeds with it. Initially the plant seemed to thrive and the seeds germinated and began to grow, but after several weeks both plants began to slowly die. I was unsettled with these results so I did more research.

A few basic facts about Teflon:

- Teflon was accidentally invented in 1938 from a chemical called polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE) and is considered a dangerous chemical.
- The Environmental Protection Agency's scientific advisory

board found that perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA), a chemical compound used to make Teflon, is a "likely carcinogen."

• Although only trace amounts of PFOA remain after the curing process, it does cause significant harm to our environment, directly and indirectly impacting our health.

Once called, "the housewife's best friend," Teflon is a multi-billion-a-year business. It's used on most bake and cookware; it's applied to carpeting and household/vehicle upholstery; it's used in non-stick food packaging; and it now sits next to our skin via stain-resistant clothing. Our exposure continues to escalate. Studies show that 95% of all men, women and children in North America have traces of PFOA in their blood due to exposure of this nonstick chemical. PFOA is also being found in the environment and in wildlife. "It would be hard to imagine a chemical that is more widespread in our environment," said Kenneth Cook, president and founder of the watchdog organization Environmental Working Group. "It's found everywhere from babies in the womb to whales in the ocean. Beyond that, it's indestructible...It lasts forever."

The International Agency for Research on Cancer also calls it a "likely carcinogen," and there are approximately 3500 cases before the US courts against DuPont for illnesses resulting from exposure to PFOA. Internal documents released during one trial revealed that DuPont has known of a link to cancer since 1997.

Most people aren't aware that highly toxic fumes are emitted into the air when Teflon is being heated, killing house birds within minutes of inhalation. If it can kill a small animal, what is it doing to your body? And we all know that even the most durable surface breaks down with time. Why are we putting our food directly on a surface covered in suspected carcinogenic chemicals? My health concerns with Teflon are many. Sadly, we've bought into the lie that butter is bad for us, and somehow cooking with toxic, chemically-coated, non-stick pans is superior. I encourage you to be informed consumers!

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

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Heads Up ~ Learning about Text Neck

Do you have a smart phone? Then beware, you may be the next victim of "text neck"! Recent articles in The Record, CBC News, RCI, Metroland Media and of course the Ontario Chiropractic Association, are warning people of the detrimental effects of using your cell phone, smart phone, or tablet too often. Most people don't even realize that they are doing it; it comes naturally to glance down at your device. Now if I were to tell you not to use your device most people would either laugh at me or stare at me like I had 10 heads. And that would be a lot of people! It was estimated



that in 2014, nearly 29 million Canadians had a smart phone. According to a recent study, an average person between the ages of 16 to 30 spends 3.2 hours a day on a mobile device, which is almost a full day a week, or 49 days a year. People are also experiencing thumb and hand pain, because our hands were not built for texting or swiping on small screens. It's quite common for Chiropractors to see patients come in with burning, pain, numbness, tingling and even weakness in their hands, thumb, and wrist. These symptoms can come and go, but can be quite detrimental to daily activities. Eliminating the use of the device is not a reality for most people, so what can you do?

- ⇒ Take frequent breaks from the device.
- ⇒ Don't stay in the same position for too long.
- \Rightarrow Let your body rest between use.
- \Rightarrow Bring the device up to eye level.
- \Rightarrow Go for short walks to break up the use.
- ⇒ Some simple neck stretches can work wonders for those with constant use.
- ⇒ Follow the 20-20-20 rule (stop using your phone every 20 minutes, look up for 20 seconds from your desk or phone, and look 20 feet away).

Helping Children Learn Through Music; Becoming a Musical Family

We've all seen even the youngest children respond positively to music. As soon as they hear the first few notes, they're bouncing up and down, rocking side-to-side, with smiles taking over their little faces.

This is the power of music. It's a universal language that all of us are born ready to enjoy.

Whether we realize it or not, music is the background soundtrack to all of our lives. Songs can trigger memories, elicit emotions, even help decrease feelings of loneliness and depression in the elderly. That's why it's important for every child to have the opportunity to find - and develop - his or her musical voice.

Every one of us is musical — we're born that way! All children can grow to love music and be active music-makers if they're exposed to music at a young age, are given opportunities to play with music, and have a grown-up they love to do that with. Through singing, movement, rhymes and instrument play, children grow and learn, creating new neural pathways and forging the way for even more learning.

How do you grow a child's natural music abilities? It's easier than you might think!

- * SING. Changing the words to a few simple songs can make stressful times of day, like transitions, easier for your family. Maybe your child doesn't want to get dressed, get in the car, or take a bath. Singing songs with your own words that narrate the action can shift the tension and stress wrapped up in these moments in a way language cannot. You'll see the power of song the minute you sing, "Scrub, scrub, scrub your ears..." instead of yelling, "hold still!" Music can have a magical effect.
- * DANCE. Your child loves to dance with you. Connect their body to the beat by swinging, bouncing or rocking them. Make a dancing game of Follow the Leader; this kind of positive reinforcement encourages your child to

- do more, which is great for creativity and their self-confidence. Close the blinds, put on your favourite tunes, and dance away!
- * **DO.** With the world of music at our fingertips, you can introduce good quality music to your child anytime. Instead of simply putting music on as background noise though, get active! Sing, drum, groove. Active music-making engages many parts of the brain, versus just listening.
- * PLAY. Explore some simple, child-safe instruments such as drums, triangles, shakers, and finger cymbals, and don't forget all those wonderful "kitchen" instruments as well. Put on some music with a driving beat and play along!
- * **READ.** There are lots of picture books that feature children's songs, i.e. *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star*, or *Down By the Bay*. If you sing them, you'll find your child will begin to sing them too.
- * CREATE. Children love to record themselves! Let your children create their own recordings and videos singing their favourite songs and playing their favourite instruments. There are also some great apps out there that allow you to create a karaoke moment right on your tablet or phone. Consider downloading the free "Hello Everybody" app from Music Together that gives you eight free songs to get started.
- * LEARN. Take a music and movement class with your child. The opportunity to nurture your child's natural musical ability is greatest before age 6. Discover new songs you and your child can share together while making new friends, and build your musical connection.

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What Does a Canadian Look Like?

What does a Canadian look like? Globe and Mail journalist Janet Wong was on assignment in China and went to the Canadian embassy to interview the ambassador. The Chinese guard at the front gate would not let her in, insisting she was Chinese so could not be Canadian. They had a heated exchange and a Canadian diplomat, expecting Wong's arrival, came outside to investigate the commotion. The guard triumphantly explained, "She's pretending to be a Canadian." The diplomat cupped Wong's face, pointed to her, and yelled at the guard, "This is what a Canadian looks like!"

Canada is one of the most intentionally multicultural nations in the world. Before the 1960s, however, immigration was mostly limited to Europeans. Diversity existed in the differences between minority Catholics (whom many Canadians did not want coming to this country) and majority Protestants; French and English; and Eastern and Western European immigrants. This did not mean that all Canadians had European backgrounds, however. There were African Canadians, many of whom came from the United States while others were descendants of Canadian slaves; Asian Canadians, including Chinese Canadians who were recruited to do the dangerous work of building the

Monday to Friday 9 am - 5:30 pm Saturday 9-4:30 / Sunday - Closed railroad and thereby uniting the nation; and South Asians from India and the surrounding region. Jewish people were the first religious minority in Canada, arriving with British Conquest in the late 1700s. Muslims arrived shortly after, mostly



as slaves, but also as merchants. And of course long before Europeans arrived there was (and remain) a vast array of Indigenous tribes with distinct cultures and customs.

Even groups that many would now consider essentially "the same," such as the British and Scottish or the Italians and Greeks, thought of each other as irreconcilably different. When famine and economic crises resulted in boat loads of Irish and Eastern Europeans (in addition to others) arriving around the turn of the 20th century, they were met with hostility and prejudice from the "old stock" Canadians. These people, with mostly British and German backgrounds, considered the new arrivals backward and dirty with strange customs. Even members of the same religious groups were not immune. The Jewish Canadian community was mostly made of merchants with British roots. The new Jewish Canadians were poor Eastern Europeans. The older group was embarrassed by the new arrivals and actively worked to distance themselves from them. Irish Catholics were particularly singled out for derision. Newspapers of the day declared common sentiments that they treated their women poorly, would never assimilate, and would always be more loyal to the Pope than to Canada. Even Southern Europeans were legally classified as "off-white."

The idea that Canada is only now grappling with the realities of multiculturalism is simply not true. Time and again new groups have enriched our culture. As Canada turns 150 it is worth remembering that diversity is older than our nation itself.

Ask Armand ~

Joan from New Hamburg asks: When I was young I stayed in Baden with my grandparents and they told me Baden was once a hub for train travel. Can you tell me more about that?





Armand says: Great question, Joan. The Baden Train station was once a busy place with postal deliveries each morning and night. Albert Everts, the Baden Post Master then, would come each

morning to pick up the mail for sorting and delivery. This station was the main hub for the rural areas such as Wellesley and Wilmot Centre.

The station stood about 18 feet wide by about 30-40 feet long. The building consisted of two areas. The south side was a waiting room that had benches and could hold up to 50 people (standing room). It was also used as a holding area for deliveries. The other side of the wall was the ticket agents area and telegraph



office. The ticket agent would also be in charge of the train signals which were located on the eave of the building. There were two sets of tracks going through Baden. The northern set was used for the CN passenger train traffic. Beyond the train station was the water tower that was used to fill the steam engines. The water was pumped from the mill pond.

The southern set of the tracks were used for the freight trains. Beside the tracks, Ed Reick had his coal yards and further along there was a scale that was used for weighing turnips, coal, and other items.

The passenger trains were used heavily in the olden days and the Baden Train station was an important part of Baden's history!

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SIX ARTISTS SELECTED FOR COMMISSIONS FOR THE PRIME MINISTERS EDUCATIONAL RESOURCE AND STATUE PROJECT

The Prime Ministers Educational Resource and Statue Project dedicated more than a year and a half to researching and exploring the works of Canadian sculptors adept in presenting exceptional human likenesses cast in bronze. In September, 2016, the coordinating committee selected and contacted twenty-five of these artists across the country.

Each sculptor was invited to submit a proposal depicting a Canadian Prime Minister. All submissions were considered for inclusion in the ongoing project being developed in Baden, Ontario. The quality of the work received was admirable.

After intense review, the committee selected six artists to complete the Prime Ministers' commissions. The Statue Project is pleased to announce that the following artists will create all works in the collection of twenty-three life-size bronze works of Canada's Prime Ministers to date:

- Ruth Abernethy (Ontario);
- Darren Byers and Fred Harrison (New Brunswick);
- Alan Henderson (Alberta);
- Morgan Macdonald (Newfoundland);
- Nathan Scott (British Columbia)

Their works will join a Sir John A Macdonald sculpture, "A Canadian Conversation" by Ruth Abernethy, unveiled in June, 2016. All completed sculptures will be installed on The Prime



Ministers Walk on the municipal grounds at Castle Kilbride, a National Historic Site in Waterloo Region.

Two new works will be unveiled by Canada Day, 2017. A third sculpture will be installed in November, 2017. The three Prime Ministers selected for these commissions will be announced in mid-June, 2017.

The collection of sculptures of Canada's Prime Ministers will continue to grow as funds are available. Donations to the project can be made at www.createscape.org

Ruth Abernethy- Ruth's sculptures have been placed municipally, regionally, and nationally and she has been awarded numerous private commissions. Ruth encompasses studied regard for playful thought and timeless paradoxes in the creation of her work.

Daren Byers And Fred Harrison - For the past six years Fred Harrison & Darren Byers have been working together to create large scale bronze sculptures in a studio near Sussex, New Brunswick. An outstanding example of their combined talents is a bronze likeness of Canadian literary critic and theorist Northrop Frye. A version of this work has been installed in Moncton and another at Victoria College at the University of Toronto.

Alan Henderson - One of Alan's most recent public commissions is "9 Figures in Motion with a Puck", a 30 X 30 foot mixed media wall sculpture at the Rogers Place Arena in Edmonton.

Morgan Macdonald - Newfoundland and Labrador's nationally acclaimed sculptor and visual artist, Morgan MacDonald is best known for large monumental bronze works and sculptural interpretations of Newfoundland's history and culture.

Nathan Scott - Nathan's most recognizable work is likely his sculpture of Terry Fox at Mile o of the Trans-Canada Highway in Victoria, BC. Another hugely appreciated work, 'The Homecoming', a multi-figure sculpture which commemorates the 100th Anniversary for the Canadian Navy graces the inner harbour in Victoria.

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"It's spring fever. That is what the name of it is. And when you've got it, you want—oh, you don't quite know what it is you do want, but it just fairly makes your heart ache, you want it so!" — Mark Twain

We had April in February! Lovely for us, but tough on trees and shrubs! They may have started to bud thinking spring arrived. If we get a major deep freeze, the buds on many plants can be damaged or killed resulting in a decrease in spring blooms. Early spring flowering shrubs and trees may have little or no fruit this year. It is a waiting game! For many perennials and small shrubs, mulch acts as a protective blanket for your soil. Two to three inches (5-8 cm) of natural mulch protects plants from extreme cold and heat, like insulation. When planning your garden, select spring flowering species with late season bloom time to avoid the late spring cold snaps. Voles have been having a wonderful time under the snow. When the snow melted, there were all kinds of sculpted

designs on our lawns and gardens. There is lots of information online how to control them. Not so easy.





To continue celebrating Canada's Sesquicentennial, I continue to celebrate our native trees. Do you know how many native oak species we have? They include: Black Oak (Quercus velutina), Bur Oak (Quercus macrocarpa), Chinquapin Oak (Quercus muehlenbergii), Dwarf Chinquapin Oak (Quercus prinoides), Hill's Oak (Quercus ellipsoidalis), Pin Oak (Quercus palustris), Red Oak (Quercus rubra), Shumard Oak (Quercus shumardii), Swamp White Oak (Quercus bicolor), and White Oak (Quercus alba). Whew!!! Most oaks become large trees but the Dwarf Chinquapin Oak is shrub size, so it will



suit small gardens with some shade.

Made in Canada!! The McIntosh apple is probably the most famous introduction – in 1811! John McIntosh (1777-1845) found a seedling while clearing overgrown bush near Morrisburg, Ontario.

Consider Doing:



Speaking of spring, it is time to start your tomatoes indoors. You can also order summer-flowering bulbs. Cut down ornamental grasses as low as possible and prune summer-flowering shrubs (eg. Hydrangea). Prune fruit trees & grape vines. Also prune any winter damage on your shrubs and trees. Start summer flower bulbs and tender perennials (tuberous begonias, cannas, callas and caladiums) in pots. Apply dormant spray to fruit trees before buds open (follow package instructions). Loosen packed mulch and press back frost heaved perennials. Check and repair garden tools. Cut some spring flowering shrub branches for forcing inside. When the ground frost is gone and the soil has dried up enough not to be compacted by walking on it, you can plant dormant, hardy container, and balled and burlapped plants.
