



with Ed ~ What's the Deal? I am amazed that a deck of cards is a household item -- I'd be surprised to find someone who doesn't own playing cards. When I was a kid, every Saturday night my parents would have the same couple over to our house to watch the Maple Leafs and then play several hands of Euchre. When we would play as a family, my father

was impatient and would get upset if I made a bad play, so I learned quite quickly. We kids would play card games including Cribbage, Rummy, and Chase the Ace.

I married into more cards, since Pat's family too was a household of games and card players. Starting with Fish, Crazy Eights, War, Cheat, we moved on to Crib, Solo, Black Ball (we called it Bugger Your Neighbour), Double Solitaire, Hearts, and Euchre. Recently, our good friends Tim and Kim taught us two new games, Sevens and Golf, which we are currently playing a lot of with our friends. Cards is a great way to bring friends together and pass the time while stuck indoors over the cold winter months... or while on vacation in Mexico!!

Doing what I do, researching everything, I found that the earliest mention of playing cards in the world was in 868; a Chinese writer, Su E, describes Princess Tong Cheng playing the "leaf game" with her husband's family, the Wei Clan. The 1300s brought playing cards to Europe. An official ordinance in Bern, Switzerland mentions them being banned. In 1377, a Paris ordinance on playing cards was created to make rules to keep players in check.

In the 1400s, familiar suits started appearing on cards across the world: hearts, bells, leaves, acorns, swords, batons, cups, and coins made up the card design options (see chart to the right of assorted cards and their countries). In the 1480s, France brought out the plan of the deck that is closest to today's design. The deck consisted of spades, hearts, diamonds, and clubs. The clubs are probably a modified acorn design. The late 1400s European court cards changed from current royalty to historical or classical design.

The 1790s brought about the "Ace" which replaced the King as the highest card in the deck. In 1867, Russel Morgan and Company of Cincinnati, Ohio began printing playing cards. In the 1870s, the Joker made its first appearance as the third and highest trump (the best bower) in the game of Euchre. Some believe that the name "Joker" is derived from "Juker", which is another name for Euchre. In 1885, the first Bicycle brand cards were produced by Russel Morgan and Company.

I will be the first person to say I am not much of a casino gambler. I

remember going to Las Vegas with my in-laws. The girls went to bed early, so my brother-in-law and I hit the poker tables. I decided that \$50 was my limit and when it was gone, I was done (looking back, that was not a lot of money). Ten minutes later I was out of cash but remained as a spectator. "What are those four multicoloured chips that a player just put on the table?" I asked the dealer. "They are the \$500 chips," the dealer responded. I was certainly out of my league, so I went back to the nickel slot machines. My brotherin-law lasted about another half hour and then we cashed in our chips (what was left of them).

That experience got me wondering how much money casinos make. The University of Las Vegas found that the 23 Las Vegas casinos bringing in over 72 million each in the 2013 fiscal year ended up with over 5 billion of their visitor's money altogether. That's an average of over \$630,000 a day per casino. Ontario Lottery and Gaming says its net profit for the province was 2.49 billion in the 2017 - 2018fiscal year (all gambling operations). Big money.

So, what is the most widely played card game in the world today? According to best choice reviews Bridge followed by Poker (see the chart to the right). Whose deal?



As the weather warms up, everyone is ready to get outside and explore – even the ticks . Here is a refresher on these little parasites to help get into the prevention and protection mood.



#### WHAT ARE TICKS?

- Ticks are arachnids, relatives of spiders, mites and scorpions.
- They survive by feeding on the blood of animals and humans.
- Ticks crawl—they don't jump, fly, or drop from trees.

### WHICH SPECIES ARE ESTABLISHED IN CANADA?


- There are over 40 species of ticks in Canada.
- The most common established ticks in Canada that dogs and cats may encounter are the American dog tick (Dermacentor variabilis) and the Blacklegged or Deer tick (Ixodes scapularis).

### WHERE CAN THEY BE FOUND?

- Ticks can be found in many areas across Canada but they prefer to live in wooded areas, in tall grasses and under leaf litter. They can also be found in urban areas, like city parks and green spaces.
- Avoiding tick habitats helps reduce the risk of exposure.
- Ixodes species (such as the Deer tick) prefer moist environments like leaf litter.
- Dermacentor species (such as the American dog or wood tick), a hardier tick, can live in drier environments like tall grasses.

Did you ever notice that when you blow in a dog's face, he gets mad at you, but when you take him for a car ride, he sticks his head out the window? (Hmmm...maybe it's your breath.)





#### WHEN ARE TICKS ACTIVE?

- At 4°C, ticks start looking for an animal or a person to feed on for a blood meal and will continue until the temperature consistently remains below 4°C. Deer ticks can be active any time temperatures are 4°C and above, including mild days during the winter months.
- Ticks can survive the winter hiding under snow, leaf litter and brush.
- WHAT DISEASES CAN THEY TRANSMIT?
- The main tick-borne disease of concern in Canada is Lyme disease.
- Ticks are expanding their range in parts of Canada at a rate of 46 km per year. The risk of pets and people being exposed to ticks and the diseases they can carry—like Lyme disease—is growing.

If you have any concerns regarding tick prevention and your pet, please contact your veterinarian for information on tick prevention and awareness. They can also help set up a tick control program specifically for your pet.



Self-care is a buzz word that can be seen everywhere recently. It's great that people are seeing the value in taking time for themselves as self-care builds off of important ideas such as self-compassion and investing in your mental health. However, self-care can seem abstract and vague. How do you know if you are doing it right? When can you tell that it's working? With so many people using the word loosely, the meaning of the practice is starting to get lost.

I have found it helpful to view self-care as taking care of your whole self. When talking about health, there is a tendency to separate different aspects of the self or the body and talk about taking care of them individually. We have physical health, mental health, emotional health. We talk about gut health, heart health, and on and on. Perhaps this is an attempt to make a healthy lifestyle sound more feasible. Separating a big goal into smaller, more attainable goals does have value. However, this has led to the insinuation that mental health is separate from the other aspects of our wellbeing. I believe it is incredibly important to remember all parts of the self are interconnected.

The Indigenous peoples have a way of looking at a person that emphasizes the wholistic self. The way it's been explained to me is that there are four parts of a person: physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual. The physical aspect

refers to our bodies and our environment around us. This includes the weather, our housing situation, and the food we eat. The

emotional part would be what is commonly referred to as mental health. This means looking at our stress levels and our ability to cope with emotions. The mental aspect refers to the way we are learning and the cognitive engagement we have with the world around us. Lastly, the spiritual part of self doesn't necessarily have to be connected to a formal religion, but more so recognizes our connection to all people and nature. Looking at the wholistic self may seem different at first but when you think about it, you can see it's a natural way of approaching self-care.

How many times do we end up fixating on only one part of ourselves, desperately trying to improve it and wondering why nothing is changing? Mental health is an important part of our well-being, but it does not exist in isolation to the rest of our self. If you are finding self-care ineffective in your life, I would encourage you to look at the different aspects of the self. Are you investing time in all four parts? Or are you only focusing on the physical, or the emotional? Take time to reflect on how you are taking care of yourself and make it a challenge to spend time nurturing parts of yourself that may have been forgotten.

# Baden Birding ~ Birds and Bees

I usually write about birds, but most of us are also interested in "the birds AND the bees", so I thought I'd write about the bees. The information in this column came from an article (used with permission) by Jennifer Marshman, a PhD candidate at Wilfred Laurier who also sits on the Bee City Kitchener working group that appeared in The Waterloo Record in September 2019.

Of the flowering plants on Earth 90% depend on insect pollination. Bees are an important part of our environment. Think of how many of the foods we eat that come from plants or from animals that eat plants.

When we hear the word bees, most people think of the European honeybee that was brought to North America over 400 years ago and is the most widely managed pollinator species in the world, with an estimated 7,000 beekeepers in Canada alone. There are 20,000 species of bees worldwide, 4,000 of which are found in Canada. Southern Ontario is estimated to be home to 400 species of native bees.

Scientists think that our native or wild bees are more efficient pollinators than our non-native domestic honeybees because of the relationships wild bees have evolved with the flowers they pollinate over thousands of years.

Many wild bees are solitary; that is, they do not live in large groups like the honey and bumble bees, and they rear their offspring by themselves.

A honeybee hive can contain 80,000 individuals. Wild bees frequently have their hives in the ground, making them more susceptible to loss of habitat and contamination from chemicals and pesticides.

Honeybees have also been adversely affected by some of the chemicals that are used on plants such as neonics, but their hives can be moved. Tests for these

chemicals often test only the effect on honeybees and do not test the effects on native bee populations, which creates gaps in our understanding of how wild bees are affected by human activity. The effect climate change is having on wild bee populations is not fully understood at this time.

Urban areas such as those found in Wilmot can provide refuge for these wild bees due to the large number of flower gardens found in built up areas. Typically, these garden areas have fewer pesticides than the surrounding rural agricultural areas. Homeowners can plant a variety of untreated flowering plants including native species that will provide a succession of blooms throughout the summer and fall. Be sure to check when you purchase plants to see if they contain neonics. Some greenhouses use neonics in their soil mixes so that any insects, including bees, are killed if they ingest any part of the plant.

Our native asters and goldenrods bloom in late summer and fall and provide not only brilliant colour, but a rich

source of nectar and pollen for foraging bees. And don't believe that fable about goldenrod causing hay fever! The pollen on goldenrods is too heavy to blow away in the wind but is designed to stick to the bodies of bees to be transported from flower to flower, thus ensuring pollination. Bee City Kitchener has a website with a list of native plants along with blooming time, colour, height, and light requirements.







### Four More PMs Coming To Baden

Believe it or not, some people think Baden is "small town". In at least one category however, it will surpass the city of Ottawa. Baden will soon become home to more sculptures of Canada's Prime Ministers than even our nation's capital.

Wilmot Township's Prime Ministers Path, located beside Castle Kilbride, already has five life-sized sculptures of Canada's PMs created by artists from across the country. Bronze likenesses of Sir John A Macdonald, Sir Robert Borden, William Lyon Mackenzie King, Lester Pearson, and Kim Campbell have found a comfortable and welcoming home on Baden's PM Path.

On Saturday, June 20, 2020, four additional Prime Ministers' sculptures will be unveiled. This event will bring the number of likenesses in the Baden collection to nine. There are only

eight statues of Canada's Prime Ministers on Parliament Hill in

Ottawa.

Sir John Abbott

British Columbia artist, Nathan Scott, who created the collection's bronze statue of Sir Robert Borden, is currently casting a sculptural grouping of Sir John Abbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Sir Charles Tupper. Between 1891 and 1896, these four oft-forgotten men each had a term of office as our Prime Minister. They are Canada's leadership link between two more iconic personalities, Sir John A Macdonald and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

This new sculptural grouping will also incorporate "Easter eggs" that are characteristic of all the works already on the PM Path. Easter eggs are subtle, small pictographs or symbols modelled onto the surface of each sculpture. They each represent a significant event in that Prime Minister's life, career or in the contemporary history of Canada. Viewers will be able to explore and discover...



### Tech/Text Neck

### What is Tech/Text Neck?

Some signs that you may be experiencing Tech Neck include:

- Instant or delayed-onset upper back or neck pain when using a handheld device
- Nagging or sharp **pain** in the **neck** or shoulders at the end of the day or postural fatigue
- General shoulder pain and tightness, head forward neck posture

### Who May be Affected?

Researchers at Harvard Medical Health (2016 harvard.health.edu) predict that 7 out of 10 people will experience neck aches at some point in their lives.

### What to Do? Visit a registered Massage Therapist!

Massage Therapists assess and treat physical dysfunction and pain of the soft tissue and joints of the body, mostly by hands--on manipulation.

Assessment and treatment can include orthopaedic and neurological testing, soft tissue manipulation (Swedish massage is the most commonly used technique), hydrotherapy, remedial exercise programs and client education programs.

BUT FIRST.... Step away from the computer...put down the phone... yes, put it down...it will be ok. Then...

# Some gentle exercises that may help manage tech neck are:

Please note: always check with your primary health care provider to make sure these exercises fit in with your current fitness level.

### **Exaggerated Nod**

Sitting at your desk or standing comfortably with your shoulders relaxed. Mouth closed — teeth touching but not clenching — look up to the ceiling. Pause here and let your jaw relax and open your mouth. Keep your head still here and bring your lower jaw to your upper jaw, closing your mouth. You should feel a stretch in the front of your neck. Hold for a few moments then return to neutral neck.

#### Cat Cow

Start on all fours with your shoulders stacked over your wrists, your hips stacked over your knees, and the tops of your feet pressed into the ground. Look down a few inches in front of your fingers and lengthen from your head down to your tailbone.

- 1. To begin the 'cat' phase, use your abs to curl your spine toward the ceiling while tucking in your tailbone (making the shape of a Halloween cat) as you exhale. Lengthen your neck and allow your chin to reach down and in, toward your chest, so your ears come down by your biceps.
- 2. To begin the 'cow' phase, swoop and scoop your pelvis so your belly drops down to the floor as you inhale. Broaden across your shoulder blades, drawing your shoulders away from your ears, and lift your chin and chest to gaze up toward the ceiling. Move through steps 1 and two a few times, building up to 8 or so.

Along with getting away from your desk or device, being mindful of your breathing through the day will help oxygenate your upper body therefore helping your muscles relax and almost automatically improving your posture.

### NOTES FROM THE ATTIC - LIFE AND TIMES OF BADEN BUSINESS CORE

With reference to the front page photo we give a brief history of each building by the colour of them in the picture. We will begin with the main westerly building.





**N.M. Steinman Grocery Store** – Noah Steinman purchased the store located at 43 Snyder's Road East in 1904 from Christian Honderich. The general store sold groceries, Purina stock feed, lime, cement and even Maxwell cars, and sewing



machines. Shortly after the purchase, Steinman saw a need for an undertaker and opened a funeral parlour in the same building. In 1956 he sold the *good will* of the funeral business to the K-W firm *Ratz-Bechtel* (owned in part by Gideon Bechtel, another Baden Resident). Around the same time, Steinman closed the grocery store and opened Steinman Furniture. The store was known for high quality furniture, including *Roxton* 

maple furnishings. This business was sold to Noah's son Delton, then sold to his son Carl, and eventually closed in 1994.



It was then that Greg and Adrienne Shinnie and PAB Holdings purchased the property (including all of the out-buildings) and opened the *Baden Emporium* on November 17, 1995. This became a popular spot, creating some great energy in the core of town with a gift store and 183 vendors, a





bakery and café where Teddy's Bakery was born, and where Rose Coloured Glasses housed their business. Rose and Larry Stevenson held several fundraising events in the courtyard entitled *Memories of Mom* in honour of his mom who died from cancer. The Baden Emporium closed in February of 2006. It sat empty for some time until Musien Musa purchased all five buildings in December 2008 and soon opened the Baden Market, which had a small amount of vendors. Over several years, Musien demolished three of the out-buildings. He then sold the property to West Hills Church who had a vision of housing a community space and church, but found the project not feasible and it sat empty for many years. The building was demolished the last week of February 2020.

Walter Bechthold Motors (Light Blue Front) – Walter Bechthold started working at Conrad Berg's Chevrolet dealership on the east side of the Steinman building in 1929. Berg, in 1931, wanted to open a car dealership in New Hamburg so he sold the business to Bechthold, who was 26 years old. It was a simple service centre capable of holding two vehicles. In the late 30s, he changed from a Chevrolet to a Pontiac Dealership and continued to sell White Rose gasoline. In 1964, it became an American Motors dealership and (since Shell purchased White Rose) they changed to Shell gasoline. At that time, Bechthold Motors could squeeze up to 12 vehicles into the building. The business closed in 1977, then became part of Steinman's Furniture, and on November 17, 1995 it became the Baden Emporium.



There were three out buildings surrounding the back of the property. The red building was the property of Walter Bechthold and was used for storage for his automotive repair business.

The large two-story light blue steel building was built in 1967 by Harley Herner and was used as storage for the Steinman Furniture Company. The darker blue building was owned by Fred Sehl and was used for storage of supplies and a delivery truck for many years. That building was home to Northern Barn Furniture, which made furniture for Harvest Home, from September 1997 to 2001. In the spring of 2002 Baden Creek Pottery opened their business in that location. They closed in November 2005. Baden Firefighters were called out to a fire at that building on March 17, 2009 at 3:30 am and the building sustained \$8,000 damage. It was slated to be demolished and was torn down a week later.




Fred Sehl Tin Shop (Green Building) – Located at 57 Snyder's Road E. Fred Sehl (Senior), who died in 1936, opened the original tin shop in 1883. Fred Junior began working in the store in 1909 and continued the business until 1971. The business began as a tinsmith shop with hardware as a secondary line. They created such items as milk cans, wash boilers, sap

containers and wash tubs. Fred lived in a home beside the Tin Shop until selling the business and house to Steinman



building was sold to the Baden Emporium in November 1995. During the ownership of the Emporium it had been rented to Pfennings Organic Store (now in St. Agatha), Pfeiffer Gallery (now in Wellesley), and finally to The Olde Tin Shoppe, antique collectible store. The upstairs was also home to the Baden Model Railway Club; the photo shows their group and railway layout.



Because native plants are an important part of the garden, remember all the guidelines for planting apply to them. Robert Pavlis wrote this article:

### Native plants are more drought-tolerant

The use of native plants has received a lot of press, and lots of information makes it sound as if they are a better choice for your garden. Much of this publicity is creating myths. One of the common beliefs is that native plants are easier to take care of and require less watering.

Let's think about this. Almost any location on Earth has a variety of growing conditions. Some areas are wetter and others are drier. Even in the desert, you will find some areas along a river that grow lush plants that need substantial water to do their best.





Pick the right native plant, and it will be drought-tolerant. Pick the wrong one, and it won't be.

The red cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis) is a local native perennial, but for some reason I just can't get it to overwinter in my garden. It is certainly not drought-tolerant, but even in a boggy spot it just will not grow for me.

The same goes for non-natives. If you pick drought-tolerant plants, they will be drought-tolerant. The country in which they grow naturally has nothing to do with it. ~ by Robert Pavlis, author of three books, Garden Myths Book 1 and 2 and Building Natural Ponds.

# GOING AWAY?

Before you go away on vacation, take the time to prep your home for the week you will be away. Don't just lock the door and drive off; you might be sorry. First and most important,

turn off the main water to your home. Anything could break and the water will run until it's turned off. Nothing worse than a great holiday wrecked by coming home to a disaster. Main valves are located usually in the basement before the water meter. If it leaks or won't turn, call a plumber to have it replaced. It's the most important valve in your home and has to work. Turn it off and drain the water at a laundry faucet or kitchen. Next, the water heater— if you have a gas heater there is a control on most that controls temperature. It also has a vacation setting; just turn it to vacation, or you can turn the gas valve to "pilot". Again, it will just sit and rest until you get back. If you have a "power venter type," just unplug it. If you have an electric tank, you can flip the breaker at your electric panel if you choose to, or just let it be. It will not use much energy while you're gone as you are not using the water. Set your furnace back to a safe temperature so the house won't get too cold; 60-65f is what I have done in the past with no problems. Set up a couple of timers on lights and arrange for the neighbour to park a car in your driveway and maybe clear the snow for you. It is also important that you have someone enter your home and do a walk about to be sure things are as they should be. Now relax, go and enjoy your vacation.


The relocation of Town Pantry into our new space will
