~ To the dump, to the dump, to the dump dump!

ng with Ed When I was younger, Levi Norrie used to drive around MacTier with his steak truck collecting trash. Once it was full, he would drive out to Tower Road and dispose of the garbage at the dump. In those days anyone could drive out to the dump and look for interesting items to pick up. Occasionally, we would drive out in the evening and watch the

bears pick through the trash. Our parents always made us stay in the car but in our teenage years we would get out, rebels that we were...yup, mischief at the dump. When I saw the advertisement for an Earth Day tour at the Waterloo Region Landfill site – something that I always wanted to do - I jumped at the opportunity. We met at the Glasgow street location and were loaded onto a school bus and shuttled around. I was pleasantly surprised to see some familiar faces on the

John, sporting a megaphone, was our tour guide as we made our way up to the landfill area. He gave us many facts along the way, some of which I will share with you here. The landfill site opened in 1972; ironically, Earth Day started one year later. This is the only landfill site in Waterloo Region, replacing McLennan Park on Ottawa Street in Kitchener. The life expectancy of the Erb Street location is 15 more years.

The landfill site tries to find a use for all garbage that is brought into the landfill. As an example, John commented that the roads throughout the landfill are made of crushed toilets. About 600 tonnes of garbage (or the equivalent of 85 school busses) are brought into the landfill each day. The garbage is crushed by a packer (a large tractor like vehicle with rollers on the front) and placed on a three-foot clay base. It is covered every night by compost or tarps to eliminate odors and animals. Since the composting and biweekly garbage pickup has started the garbage at the landfill has decreased by 20%!!

In the landfill, there are pipes and hoses coming out of the ground which are methane wells. These wells produce enough electricity for 4,000 homes. The landfill site has a land area encompassing 300 acres – 170 of those dedicated to the landfill site. Whatever garbage is dumped will be capped and will stay there forever. When the landfill site is done, it will become green space and hiking trails.

After our tour of the landfill site, the bus moved onto the recycling area. John prepared us for the smell of the recycling area due to people not rinsing out their recyclables. He also stressed the importance of pre-

sorting the recyclables, which makes it so much easier at the processing area. He then stressed the importance of the "Three R's" – Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle in that order. It is up to all of us to keep that in mind.

Waterloo Region was the first municipality in the world to begin recycling. In the first years it was only glass, cans, and newspapers. Newspapers and cardboard are now shipped to Niagara Falls for processing. Cans are baled into large skid-sized blocks, each of which contain 40,000 cans. There were piles of them all over the place (see picture of a few); the biggest customer for the cans is Anheuser – Busch. Plastics are divided into several groups by sorters. The number one plastics (water bottles, etc.) are



processed into polar fleece sweaters and insulation for sleeping bags. The number two plastics (laundry detergent and shampoo bottles) are converted into other containers and composite lumber. Juice and milk cartons are converted into toilet paper and re-wall. John noted that all green bin materials that are picked up are shipped to a facility in Guelph. Green bin material takes about eight weeks to break down.

There are other recycling efforts at the landfill. Leaf and yard waste are processed at the landfill; they take about one year to break down. Other recycling efforts include E-waste, Habitat for Humanity, bike recycling, compost and mulch, household / hazardous waste, and used oil depot. The region takes recycling and trash control very seriously and does an excellent job of it, but they have set a lofty goal of 90% diversion – which is all up to us.

I recall working at the Zehrs store in New Hamburg from 1974 to 1983. During that time we sold very little canned pop and bottled water was unheard of. (I never imagined back then that we would actually buy water...and in such quantities!) All glass bottled pop bottles and milk jugs were returned to the store for reuse, and all our plastics and cardboard were thrown in the garbage. In many ways, we have improved our efforts but in many ways we have regressed with all of our excess water bottles and tin cans.

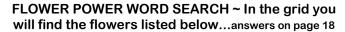

Norma and I enjoyed sharing a glass of wine and visiting on the porch. Cheers to you, my friend!

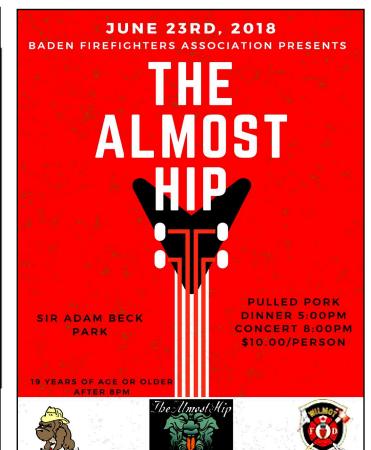

Fleas... It's that Time of Year

Spring is here!! After a long, cold winter, we are all excited to get outside in the sunshine – our furry friends included! As things warm up, we start to be more concerned



about what else is enjoying the spring sunshine. Fleas and mosquitoes are at the top of my list of worries! Fleas are a bothersome little parasite that, although not deadly, can wreak havoc on your pet's skin and your home.

Important Flea Facts:

- A female flea can lay 50 eggs every day as many as 2000 eggs in her 2 to 3 month life span.
- Female fleas consume 15 times their weight in blood every day.
- Eggs fall off your pet wherever your pet goes.
- Eggs hatch into a maggot-like larvae in 2 to 4 days (under optimal conditions).
- The cat flea is the most common flea found on both cats and dogs.
- The flea is one of the best known jumpers. If your pet has fleas, they can jump onto other pets in your home, your furniture and onto you.

The best plan regarding fleas, is to prevent them. Prevention is easy, fighting an infestation is not! Your veterinarian can provide you with the flea control option that best suits your pet and your family.

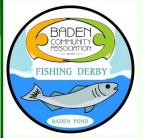

Fishing Derby Saturday, June 2

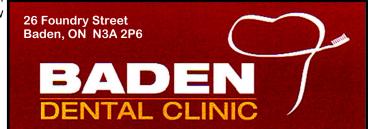

Baden Birding ~ Spring Behaviours

It is finally here, we hope. Spring has been a long time coming, but we knew it would come, and so did the wildlife. If salamanders had not found their vernal ponds in which to breed at least two weeks ago, they would be out of luck this year. Ruled by instinct and sunshine, migrating birds have been steadily pressing northwards. Even our local birds could feel the coming of spring. Their feathers have been falling out and being replaced with, in some cases, new brighter breeding plumage feathers which are almost guaranteed to attract a special mate.

But what I find most interesting is the changing behaviour of the birds. The male Downy woodpecker in our neighbourhood spends much of his time hammering away on a dead and hollow branch. He rapidly hammers about ten times, then pauses to listen, then repeats the same procedure over and over. No food is produced by this behaviour, but it does have certain advantages for the continuation of the species.

The chickadees which displayed great flock behaviour over the winter have now disbanded into pairs which protect their territory from their former friends. Soon the nests will be filled with eggs and the chickadees will be uncharacteristically silent, not wanting to attract any attention. Gone are the spring days when the males would loudly sing their well-known, cheery mating call. They will be too busy gathering the emerging insects which are

sources of protein for the nestlings. Unlike the winter when nights were spent huddled in a hole in a tree with the other members of their flock, mum and dad will be the only nest warmers for the new brood.



Watch out for the Canada geese! They have changed from the slightly shy pond waterfowl to the most aggressive, protective parents imaginable. If you start to move away



from them, they will chase you. I guess parenting does that to geese as well as humans! The geese now know that they own the lawns, ponds, and even the roads!

Have you noticed that the neighbourhood crows are quieter now that they are nesting in the local trees? Have you watched the newly arrived female Cowbirds sit motionlessly waiting to see where other birds are nesting, ready to quickly fly to those nests when the parent leaves to find food? She quickly lays an "extra" egg in the nest for the other mum to look after. Have you seen owls hunting extra hard during the dawn and dusk hours so they have enough food for their newly fledged young which are almost ready to fly and start to hunt for themselves?

Why does this happen?

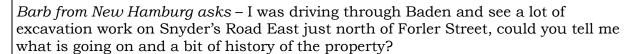

The survey also told us that our residents have a strong desire to support local farmers and businesses and would love to see more fruit and vegetable vendors.

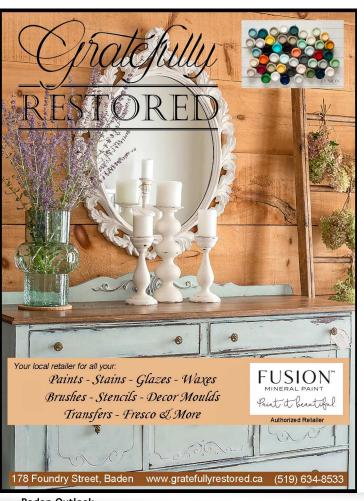
"This location has lots of vendor areas and parking

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With the Spring comes a breath of fresh air. The act of bringing your awareness to the breath does the same thing. As soon as you bring synchronization of movement and breath into being, the mind finds that same focus. A relaxed, healthy body and mind are the sum of what we receive from the energy of deep breathing. We need the energy of food, but we can live for a LONG time without it. We need the energy of water, but we can live

for days without it. Without the energy of the breath we can only live minutes. We need the breath to survive. We need the practice of controlling the energy of the breath to THRIVE!!!

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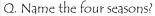

Daffodil: Regard, Unrequited love, Respect

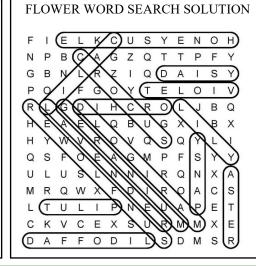

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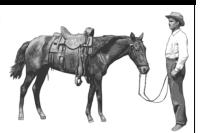

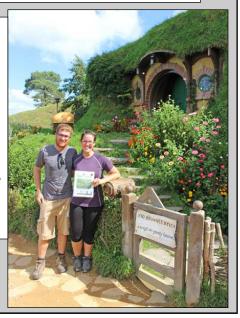

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Love Your Liver!

Now is the time of year to think about your liver and plan to give it some LOVE!

With a few leaves of unsprayed dandelions and 1 cup of spinach that are the first local fresh vegetables of the season, you can make up a yummy smoothie adding ½ cup of last year's antioxidant-rich frozen berries,1/4 cup of fibre-rich and healthy fat filled avocado, and 1 cup of your favourite nut milk. The bitterness of dandelion is beneficial for the liver and gallbladder to produce bile, improving the digestion

of fats. You may also want to add 2 tsp. of a wholesome sweetener such as honey or maple syrup. Think of the good you are doing to improve the function of your liver.

Carrot and Cauliflower Soup

This is a soup that can easily be a meal. It has several good liver foods such as carrots, cauliflower, and onions. Cannellini beans help stabilize blood sugar, and there are plenty of foods for the health of the gut bacteria as well. Topping (do not cook) with either hemp seeds or canned salmon adds some valuable essential fatty acids. Serves 2—Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 4 tbsp white onions
- 3 cups bone broth or veggie broth
- 2 medium carrots, sliced
- 2 small Yukon gold potatoes, cut into one-inch pieces but not peeled
- 1 1/2 tsp dried oregano or 1 1/2 tbsp fresh
- 3 cups cauliflower, chopped
- 1 cup cooked, rinsed cannellini beans

Juice of 1 lime

Sea salt and pepper to taste

1/4 cup sauerkraut, yogurt or coconut yogurt

Optional: 1 small can salmon, drained and rinsed, or 2 tbsp hemp seeds

Instructions: Place the olive oil and onions in a saucepan over medium-high heat and lightly sauté. Add the broth, potatoes, and carrots. Bring to a boil and lower to simmer. Cover and let it simmer for 10 minutes. Add the cauliflower and simmer for another 7 minutes. Add the cannellini beans and heat through. Add the lime juice and season with sea salt and pepper. Serve with sauerkraut or yogurt.

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Building Secure Attachments ~ Written by Matthew Isert Bender, Clinical Director, ICC



In a recent Ted talk, titled "Everything You Think You Know About Addiction is Wrong" the speaker Johann Hari, suggests that the opposite of addiction is not sobriety, its connection. This is a profound statement which echoes a theme that various addiction specialists in the 21st century have espoused for years — that addiction is not about the pleasurable effects of substances; it's about the user's inability to connect in healthy ways with other human beings. In other words, addiction is not a substance disorder, it's a social disorder.

At the core we are social creatures who long to be in connection with each other. We need stimulation, company, play, drama, intimacy, and interaction to stay happy. Fundamentally, we need to be able to trust and to emotionally attach.

This human need for trust and attachment was initially studied and developed as a psychological construct in the 1950s, by John Bowlby. In a nutshell, he found that infants, toddlers, and young children have an extensive need for safe and reliable caregivers. If children have that, they tend to be happy in childhood and well-adjusted (emotionally healthy) later in life. If children don't have that, it's a very different story. In other words, it is clear from Bowlby's work and the work of later researchers that the level and caliber of trust and connection experienced in early childhood carries forth into adulthood. Those who experience secure attachment as infants, toddlers, and small children nearly always carry that with them into adulthood, which helps them to trust and connect in healthy ways. Meanwhile, those

who don't experience secure early-life attachment tend to struggle with trust and connection later in life.

It is important to note that people with insecure attachment styles are not locked into this approach for life. With proper guidance and a fair amount of conscious effort the individuals who were not graced with secure attachment in childhood (and therefore the ability to easily connect in adulthood) can learn to securely attach—usually through therapy, support groups, and various other healthy and healing relationships—creating over time what is known as "earned security.

For those who are parents (all adults for that matter, uncles, aunts, coaches, teachers, etc), it is essential to lean into the joyful responsibility to attach to your children. This can feel like a daunting responsibility. It is important and yet it does not need to be overwhelming. Intentional commitment to a few good and simple habits of connecting throughout a child's growing years can make a big difference in his/her ability to emotionally attach, to form connection with self and others. The good news is you are likely already engaging with your child in activities that promote a strong parent-child relationship. Activities to connect together as parentchild: reading, art, music, being in nature, physical touch, cooking and eating together, board games, writing, and on and on. The importance is that we discipline ourselves to intentionally be with our children, to laugh, play, and share life together.

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EVERYDAY ACTIVITIES THAT MAY BE HURTING YOUR BACK

80% of all Canadians will suffer at least one significant episode of back pain in their lives. Back pain prevention can go a long way in reducing the risk of injury. Below are some tips on how to overcome some of the common everyday activities that can contribute to back pain.

1. Improper lifting is a risk factor associated with back pain. There are several strategies that should be employed during lifting activities. Maintaining the natural curve/hollow (lordosis) of your low back is important, as this is its strongest and most secure position. Avoid awkward postures such as bending, reaching, and twisting/turning. Whenever possible, you should square your body toward the object being lifted, turn your whole body by moving your feet, and keep the object close to your body. Contracting your abdominal muscles during lifting, lowering, and moving activities improves spinal stability, referred to as bracing. You should also bend at the legs and not the waist, lifting slowly and smoothly, not jerking.

Minimizing lift load and exposure, taking mini-breaks, and job rotations can be helpful. The use of assistive devices such as dollies, handgrips, and pull carts is also recommended.



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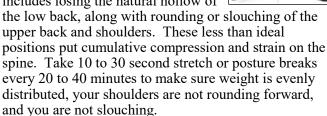

3. Working in stooped positions. When we keep our backs in a neutral/straight position, the mechanical load on the spine is considerably lower than when your back is bent forward.





Many activities around the home and workplace cause you to bend forward and stoop. The longer you work in these forward bent positions, the more likely you are to experience back problems. In order to minimize the risk of injury, you should interrupt the stooped position at regular intervals before pain starts. Trying to find alternative ways of completing tasks without stooping is ideal.

- 4. Smoking contributes to an increase in spinal problems. Smoking has been shown to decrease bone mineral density and increase the risk of osteoporosis and future fractures. The reduced blood circulation found in smokers deprives spinal tissues of vital nutrients which can lead to premature degeneration. Smoking may also provoke disc herniation through coughing. Exposure to secondhand smoke during childhood may also increase the risk of developing back problems later in life.
- 5. Lack of physical activity de-conditions the body. This makes us more susceptible to cumulative spinal strain and injury. Regular exercise increases our functional capacity to withstand occupational, recreational, and everyday stresses on our back more efficiently, thereby minimizing the risk of injury.

For some, back pain can be dramatically minimized or avoided; while for others it needs to be managed so that its negative effects on activities of daily living can be reduced. If you are suffering from back pain, a qualified health professional can determine the cause of your pain and prescribe appropriate therapy, exercises, and back sparing strategies specifically for your circumstance. 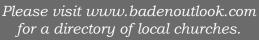

This month I wanted to give you an insiders look at the April Real Estate Market. There is a really interesting dynamic going on in our local market right now, the gap between the higher priced homes and lower priced homes is closing.

Let me explain what this means using some numbers. In the last 30 days there were 91 lower priced homes sold in our area. 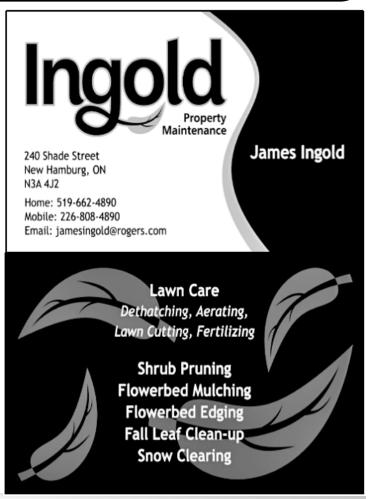

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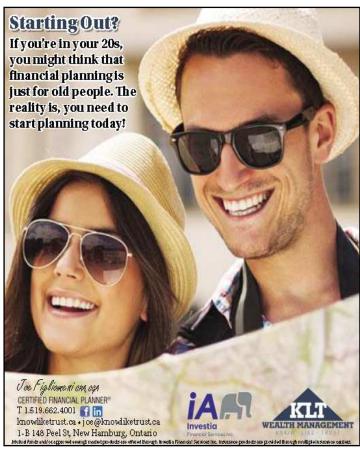

Planting season is here!!! It seemed like that day would never come. Here are some things to keep in mind this spring.

In our enthusiasm, we often start too many plants of one type. Consider your family's needs. Are you always giving away zucchini? Cut back. Take time to harden off the plants that have been in your house or greenhouse before bringing outside full time. Start with a couple of hours and add an hour or so per day so that plants adjust to temperature and especially to sun. Warm weather plants such as peppers, beans, melons, cucumber, tomatoes and eggplants need 16 to 20 C soil temperatures. If they're planted in cold soil, growth will be stunted.

Mix it up in the flower beds. Add herbs and some vegetables, many of which look lovely. Some of the cold weather veggies such as lettuce can fill a bare spot which may be covered later by your perennials once the lettuce is harvested. All those lovely blooms at the garden centre are so tempting, so go with a list!! If you want a continuous show of flowers, go to the garden centre throughout the growing

season so that you have something blooming all year, and try to add native plants. Read the labels of the plants and plant in the right soil type. For success, location, location, and location are important!! That means the plant is going in the preferred soil type, correct growing zone (we are 5b), and the right amount of sunlight.



Watering is also critical for new plantings. Even if it is drought tolerant, the root system needs to be mature for this to happen. For trees, this can mean at least 2 summers of watering. Water in the morning, at the root level, and preferably use tepid water. Watering at night promotes fungal diseases, slugs and snails. Keep plants dry at night. And don't forget to invest in rain barrels.

To provide monarch butterfly food in your garden, there are several types of **milkweeds** that can be grown depending on your site (soil type, moisture and light). Asclepias syriaca is the common milkweed we are most familiar with that grows in fields and ditches. This is a great one to grow and the blooms are very fragrant, but the roots like to go everywhere, so beware. Asclepias incarnate (swamp milkweed) needs moist soil, is native, and is well-behaved. The easiest to grow and

best behaved is Asclepias tuberosa, a native species of milkweed. It is a perennial plant growing to 0.3–1 metre tall in a bush shape, with clusters of orange or yellow flowers from early summer to early autumn. It is very drought tolerant; I really enjoy this milkweed in my flower border.
