

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


and compete. They are all experienced and successful racers, each having run 24-hour races or longer.

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Interesting People : Steerage Sails Into St. Agatha

Rob Leonard of Baden recalls the "Kitchen Parties" that were held in North Waterloo in the early 2000's. Several musicians would get together to play, sing and have a good time, usually around St. Patrick's Day. The founding nucleus included Rob drummer, Ben Kemple – bassist – from the K-W area; James Bickle – fiddler – originally from Tavistock now a Stratford resident; Sharon Foran – step dancer and vocalist from Cambridge: Dave Kelly – guitarist and vocalist from Dublin (Ontario); and Scott Hanselman – vocalist and guitarist originally from Powassan.

The Celtic rock group was searching for a name the same year that *Titanic* came out. A scene - in which the lead couple left the stuffy upper-class party, ventured down to the lower deck, called the Steerage, and joined the "Kitchen Party" - was the



Kitchen party-goers found the group extremely good and encouraged them to look for a gig at a bar. Steerage mulled the idea over and in 2001 decided to contact *Molly Bloom's* on Fairway Road in Kitchener. The gig was so successful that patrons where lined up out the door and *Molly Bloom's* couldn't handle the influx of people. That night was a catalyst for the six musicians to book more gigs. That year they played thirty engagements. One was an after hours party for *Blue Rodeo* in Stratford. Other notable engagements over the years have included "Lobsterfest" in Dauphin, Manitoba (all expenses paid), opening band for Ashley MacIsaac in Stratford, the Highland Games in Fergus, the Guelph Muticultural Festival and Paddyfest in Listowel. The band has also released its C.D. entitled *Overboard*.

They are now in their seventh year of performing. The financial aspect of performing is secondary to the entertainment value. And high in entertainment value, according to Rob, is vocalist and step dancer Sharon Foran. "She brings our music to life by adding the energetic visual aspect and interacting with the crowd, which always creates a full dance floor," says Rob.

The group continues to play when they can. But they are limited to fewer performances each year by growing families and distances. Scott, for one, now lives in North Bay with many miles of travel to venues. *Steerage* gathers to play at Bentley's in Stratford on September 19 and Kennedy's Tavern in St. Agatha on September 20th. Step out, step up, step dance with *Steerage* – a good time to be had!

What's Happening at the Wilmot Heritage Fire Brigades: September - October 2008

The Wilmot Heritage Fire Brigades has had a full and productive summer. Events, plans for the new building, and restoring our horse-drawn hand pumper have kept WHFB members busy.

This summer, antique fire trucks from the WHFB's collection have appeared at Landings Campground, Moparfest and New Hamburg Cruise Night, the St. Agatha Strawberry Festival, Expressway Cruise Night and New Hamburg's Canada Day celebrations. **Many thanks to Ray Cook and Bert Currie** for their time and skill in driving the 1935 Bickle pumper and the 1939 GMC Bickle pumper to so many events -- these trucks continue to be very popular with the crowds!

A special appearance was at **Moparfest**, where the **1940 Fargo/ Bickle pumper** was once again a hit. This truck was used for twenty years as a fire department vehicle until it was refitted as a Baden hydro truck, used to change streetlight bulbs. The pump was left intact on the truck, enabling it to be used as a fire truck also. The WHFB is hoping to restore this unique part of Wilmot's history; please contact Teresa if you're interested in helping out.

This fall, WHFB continues to showcase its trucks at public events:

And remember -- if you're interested in an appearance by our

trucks at your event, don't delay in contacting us well ahead. We have seven antique trucks but very few drivers and our schedule is busy!

Speaking of keeping busy, members of the WHFB have been hard at work this spring and summer, working to restore a **horse-drawn hand pumper** that is estimated to be at least 150 years old. The hand pumper was located in Creemore, Ontario, one year ago and has since received much TLC from Blain Bechthold, Bruce Gerber, Peter



Gingerich, and many other WHFB members. However, even after the new parts, paint, and hours of labour were applied, one question remained: will it still pump water?

On August 27, we gave it a try. Several WHFB members arrived at our museum behind the Baden fire station, filled the hand pumper with water, and started applying muscle-power. By pumping the handles on either side (it's designed for four people but even two can do it), water is pumped from the reservoir out the hose -- and onto any fires in the vicinity! WHFB is proud of its achievement in restoring this old pumper to working condition -- hopefully fires we fight with it will be very small.

Our next fundraising event is **Refundable Bottle Collection**, taking place throughout Baden on **Saturday October 4**. If you have beer, wine, or liquor bottles collecting dust in your basement or garage, just leave them on your curb by 8:00 a.m. on October 4. We'll pick them up in one of our antique fire trucks. It's a great way to get rid of those bottles before winter, and a great way to support a worthy cause. All money will go to the WHFB's Building Fund as it continues working toward our new museum facility. Call Teresa to arrange a pickup or to volunteer.

In the meantime, of course, our current museum remains open to welcome visitors into the winter months. Until spring, our hours will be **Wednesdays from 6:30 - 9:00 p.m., or call to arrange a visit at another time.** Don't hesitate to drop by -- we love to meet new people and show off the fantastic collection of trucks, photos, uniforms, and so much more. 
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News from the New Hamburg Thrift Centre

School Kits for Iraq

At this time of year consumers are constantly bombarded with "back to school" marketing messages. Whether it is for the latest style, a new laptop, or stationery supplies, traditional retailers want your money.

Given all the hype, can we take a moment to remember children who will not feel the buzz of the back to school season? Education is such a privilege and is often taken for granted in North America. Many children around the world dream of attending school some day. Many will never have the opportunity.

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) is committed to programs supporting education. One of the most requested items for refugee and displaced children is the **MCC School Kits**. Every year more than 100,000 school aged children, whose lives have been interrupted by war, disaster and poverty, receive a draw-string bag filled with new school supplies. **Each kit contains (new items only): four notebooks, four unsharpened pencils, a package of 12 coloured pencils, a ruler, and a large eraser**. These fabric draw-string bags (often sewn by volunteers of the thrift centre) are then distributed to refugee camps, schools and orphanages.

Over the past five years, 2.8 million people have fled their homes for safer locations within Iraq. MCC is undertaking a \$2 million humanitarian crisis response by sending 20,000 relief kits, 62,000 blankets, 62,000 school kits, 12,000 newborn kits and 5,500 sewing kits to be distributed in 11 of the 18 governates in Iraq. MCC Ontario has set a provincial goal of collecting 1,000 school kits by November 8.

If you are interested in providing the contents of a school kit, please bring your newly purchased items to the New Hamburg Thrift Centre where the cloth draw sting bags are provided.





Gardening with Verda - Tears of Pleasure

Among my personal "treasures" lies a small child's necklace of tiny pink glass beads interspersed with gray tear-shaped seeds. This necklace was given to me when I was hospitalized with rheumatic fever at the age of three. The relative who gave the necklace to me, grew the tear shaped seeds in her garden. Throughout my childhood my mother

told me the story of the necklace. No one in our village grew that type of seed so we knew little about the plant on which they grew. Later, about twenty years ago, an Aunt, living in Toronto, discovered these seeds in a market and purchased some. As the recipient of the seeds, I did some intensive research and this is what I discovered.

The common name for this plant is *Job's Tears*. Its Botanical name is *Coix lachryma - jobi*. Lachryma refers to the tear producing lacrimal glands located near the eyes and jobi is Latin for Job. The name *Job's Tears* refers to the shape of the seed which is that of a tear drop. Legend has it that no one shed more tears than the Biblical prophet Job. There is unanimous agreement that the seeds resemble tears but there is disagreement as to *whose* tears they resemble. Depending on where in the world you encounter them, the plant may go by various names including *David's Tears*, *Saint Mary's Tears*, or *Christ's Tears*. Use of *Job's Tears*

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seeds dates to at least 2,000 B.C. The plant is native to the East Indies and parts of Asia. A soft-shelled variety is cultivated as a cereal plant where the seeds are used in soups, drinks and pastries. In the Nagas region of India the grain is used for brewing a beer. The leaves are used as fodder, which is especially relished by

elephants. A Japanese variety is brewed into a tea and roasted seeds are made into a coffee-like drink. In the Americas, the seeds are used in crafts. The seeds are varied in colour - gray to black and some may be striped. These are used as 'beads' and can be painted. It is the oldest bead known. It has a wire-like straw extending from its tip and when that straw is removed the bead has a natural hole through which a needle and thread can pass to string the beads. These have long been used in the making of Rosaries and Mother Theresa insisted on using only Rosaries made from *Job's Tears*. In the 14th century every cloistered garden in a Monastery contained a row of these plants. Stems with seeds in place make an interesting additions to dried winter arrangements. Seeds can also be used in making bead curtains. Although the practice is questionable, strings of Job's Tears have been used as "teethers" by babies.

During the past ten years, *Job's Tears* have grown in our garden. Growing four to five feet in height, it resembles a planting of corn. The beads are harvested each fall and sorted according to size and colour. A local manufacturing company purchases them.

While this is a tropical plant, it will grow in our climate provided the plants are given an early start in peat pots indoors. In the tropics, *Job's Tears* is a perennial plant. Here in the north it is an annual, but I find that seeds can overwinter and sprout in the garden in spring, although not reliably.

The person who has an expertise in crafts would find these homegrown beads an asset. *Job's Tears* are now offered by several seed companies in their catalogues.

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

Local Energy Co-op Erects Wind Test Tower

Petersburg, ON, August 1, 2008 -- Local Initiative for Future Energy Cooperative Inc. (L.I.F.E.), an energy co-op with nearly 80 members based in Wilmot Township, has completed the installation of a 60 meter wind test tower. The tower, located near St. Agatha, will be used to monitor and record wind conditions with the long-term plan of installing a wind park in the area.

Wind data from the research site will be used to calculate how much energy from local wind power generators can be contributed to the power mix. The Ontario government's goal is that ten percent of power is to come from renewable sources by 2015. It is estimated that in our area, that one wind turbine could supply up to 600 homes.

Linda Laepple, president of L.I.F.E., observed that the co-op is "locally pioneering a sustainable energy concept that is already firmly established in Europe and other parts of the world." The co-op is working toward partnerships with like-minded groups and individuals, as well as municipalities, electricity distributors, researchers and other stakeholders.

L.I.F.E. Co-op's membership is open to all individuals and corporations sharing their vision to work together to reduce the environmental footprint we leave on the earth in an economically sustainable co-operative framework. L.I.F.E. Co-op welcomes new members and has information packages available.



Start up support for the purchase of the test tower and equipment was received from WWCFDC (Wellington-Waterloo Community Futures Development Corp.). 

Rising Up to the Fall

Whether we like it or not, September is a time of change. Students are returning to school and adults are finishing up holidays and returning to routine. Most everyone finds themselves in a new schedule once the cool weather sets in. Activity registrations begin along with sports seasons, new ambitions, and usually a new diet.

In fact, September is a little like January 1st when goals are set, a clean slate is presented and we give new things a crack. We say things such as "I'm going to walk every morning," or "I'm going to eat much healthier," because we took the whole summer off to relax, let go, and not worry about health, routines, or self discipline. But the tricky part is coming back to safe ground quickly and easily, back to feeling good about ourselves again. At this point we crave a health routine. Here is some simple advice I have to offer:

- Don't set goals that are too difficult or unrealistic. If you can't complete them, you will have a sense of failure and reinforce that idea! Start with little goals that are easy for you, like a bowler's perfect strike, and then set up new goals that you can easily knock down. This reinforces that you can do it! Eat one more vegetable than normal, rather than forcing yourself all vegetables then crashing into bad foods. Another example is eating snack foods out of a small bowl rather than the bag - instead of cutting yourself off completely. This ensures you eat smaller quantities.

- Be prepared with "safety" or backup foods that you know you can go to when feeling vulnerable. People sometimes stray from a good diet because they don't have good foods to turn to in times of stress, where most people turn to junky foods.

- Don't be extreme. Following strict diets and making radical changes can result in extreme behaviours in other areas of your life. Doing a little more of the positive, or a little less of the negative usually creates the best, most enduring results. Changing our habits is like steering


a cruise-liner, just give a little nudge at the wheel, and with time you'll be going in a whole new direction! Live consciously.

 Don't feel alarmed if you crave new foods. The fall presents different foods and body needs.
 The body may start naturally being turned off of salads, and craving meat and potatoes.
 Embrace these cravings and properly satiate them by introducing seasonal foods. Eating too much salad in cool weather could leave you turning to heavy carbs in attempt to keep warm!

-Don't give up on your new habit. Whatever it is, don't stop after the first hurdle or slip. Follow through for at least thirty days. Only thirty days is required to change a habit, you just have to persist. Don't give up on a new habit because you skipped it for one day - continue on with the next!

Whatever it is you are trying to change or improve upon, try to view it from a third person perspective. Coach yourself as you'd coach another! Probably your best evaluation would be "you're doing great!" Chances are - you are doing great! We are often our own worst critic, but be your own best promoter and appreciate every effort you give. Whatever presents itself in a life lived consciously, is the perfect medicine for that moment. So embrace each seeming setbacks with gratitude and appreciation, and you'll see that you're doing just fine, and always have been! Just enjoy the ride!
