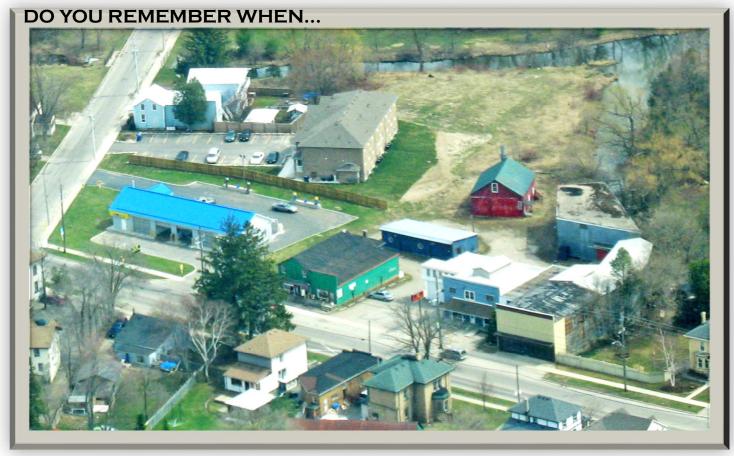


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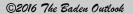

Talking with Ed

#### ~ Constant Transformation

It continues to fascinate me to realize how our world is in a constant state of transformation. Heating, cooling, shifting, and extinction seem to be the norm in this ever-changing world. I didn't quite realize the extent of the change until we visited our friends Brant and Rosi at their cottage on Lake Huron, north of Wiarton.

As we were walking to the lake, I noticed the odd craggy boulders and asked Brant, "What type of rocks are these?" The rocks were dark-coloured and looked like they were predrilled in preparation for blasting. Brant, who seems to be a wealth of information on many subjects, responded, "They are fossilized coral—evidence that most of North America was once a tropical sea over four hundred million years ago." Intrigued with the conversation, I decided to research the evolution of Southern Ontario and found many interesting facts. Here are some of them:

The world was once a super planet called "Rodina." When Rodina was formed, the early continents of South and North America were pushed together and the Grenville Mountain Range rose up 1.2 billion years ago. It is hard to imagine a mountain range running through our area! Around 600 million years ago, weathering and erosion had worn away the Grenville Mountains, which left swirling patterns in the rocks that are the deep roots of the mountains. The strange folds in the rocks in the Georgian Bay area, which are an inspiration for many artists including the Group of Seven, tell of rocks under great pressure. Temperatures of up to 1200 degrees F. and depths of up to 25 kilometres enabled the rocks to flow like toffee.

The Great Lakes were formed by extreme pressure, volcanic lava, and two tectonic plates that split apart. The weight of glaciers, up to two miles thick, compacted the ground to leave massive compressions on the earth's surface. As the glaciers retreated, flooding followed. The Great Lakes today are the largest freshwater system on earth. The average depths of the lakes are as follows: Superior-483 feet; Ontario-283; Michigan-279; Huron-195; and Erie-62.

A state-of-the-art mine in Goderich is the entrance to what was once a vast tropical sea, over four hundred million years ago during the Silurian period. As the continent shifted away from the equator, the sea disappeared, but the salty deposits on its bottom remained. More than five hundred metres underground, towering salt pillars gleam inside the mines walls. The same deposit is found deep below the city of Detroit. The salt mine in Goderich is the largest in the world, extending five kilometres under Lake Huron.

It may be hard to imagine, but about 20,000 years ago Canada was at the peak of its last glaciations, and 97% of Canada was entirely covered by ice! The animals which

lived on the planet at this time had to adjust, so many of them had thick coats of fur. Mastodons (6 to 10 feet tall), Stegodon (13 feet tall), Sabre Tooth Cat (8 feet tall/800 pounds), Cave Bears (similar size to today's bears), and Beavers that were 8 feet long and up to 220 pounds lived in our area. Those would be some massive beaver dams!

Evidence of the ice age in our area is close at hand. The Baden Hills, which is a kame (a steep-sided mound of sand and gravel deposited by a melting ice sheet), and the kettle lakes such as Spongy Lake (which is owned by the University of Waterloo) to the north of the Baden Hill are evidence of the glacier retreat. Kettles are depressions left behind after partially buried ice blocks melt. Many are filled with water, and are then called "kettle lakes." Puslinch Lake in Cambridge is the largest kettle lake in North America.

My friend Brant has a concern that the Earth, which has been going through constant periods of overheating, may be followed by a cooling period (ice age). He hopes that we are not heading in that direction with global warming. It won't be something that we see in our lifetime, but it surely does make one wonder.

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# Achoo! Allergies Get Under Your Skin!

Dogs and cats, just like humans, can have allergies. Actually, more than 30% of all skin irritations in our pets can be attributed to allergies. These allergies can come from foods,

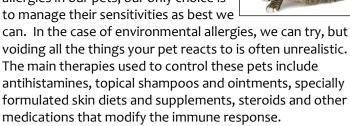
inhaled allergens like weed, tree, and grass pollens, fungi, even insects and dust mites.

These allergies cause a reaction in the skin which causes it to become inflamed. The inflamed skin gets itchy and tends to be more prone to secondary bacterial or yeast infections. What you might see if your pet has allergies is continual chewing at their feet, shaking their head, or scratching at their belly. The skin will often start to look red and raw.

Sensitivity to environmental allergens is called ATOPY. Atopy usually starts with seasonal itchiness, although over time the itchy periods usually get longer and eventually can be all year long. Seasonal itchiness because of atopy tends to begin when your pet is young, usually 1 to 3 years of age, in comparison to food allergies, which usually start later, often around 5 or 6 years of age. Keeping a log of the period of itching and the severity can really help. Sometimes the patterns that we see can help

narrow down the causes.

Since there is no known "cure" for allergies in our pets, our only choice is to manage their sensitivities as best we



Hyposensitization or allergy injections are also an option to help manage your pet's allergies. Antibiotics and antifungals may also be needed to control the secondary infections the are frequently seen in the patients.

If your pet is itchy, it is a good idea to make an appointment with your veterinarian. They can help make your pet more comfortable and help you better manage the condition.

For those of you that have pets with seasonal allergies, you can always hope for an early frost!

#### K.W. Khaki Club ~ A Diamond in the Rough

The K.W. Khaki Club was formed in 1969 by a group of militia members (Khaki being the colour of their uniform), looking for wide open spaces outside of the city for recreation and social fellowship. They purchased approximately 30 acres of Lot 18, Concession II, black B of Wilmot Township.

One of their first ventures was building a few primitive horseshoe courts. Then in 1978, they built sixteen professional courts, increasing it to 24 by 1983.

Since then they have hosted 4 Canadian horseshoe championships, at least ten provincials, 18 Michigan-Ontario friendship tournaments, plus the Elmer Hohl Ringer Classic. They were also instrumental in Kitchener getting the first world horseshoe tournament to be held in Canada in 1997.

They built a small hall (capacity of 40-50) in 1971, and in 1975 a larger hall (capacity of 175). They also have lots of open area and shaded areas for picnics.

The facilities are available for banquets, auction sales, picnics, wedding receptions, birthday parties, and family gatherings.

Since 1994, the K.W. Khaki Club has been well used for up to 20 plus auction sales per year.

One of the features people often comment on is the 1500 foot beautiful long and winding laneway through the woods.



## Ask Armand ~

Sue from Wilmot Centre asks – Our area must have been quite forested when settlers moved to our region. Were there any sawmills in the region to handle the wood from the clearing of land for farming?

Armand says - Great question, Sue. The first sawmill built in the German Block (the early name for Wilmot Township), was right here in Baden! Joseph Goldschmidt built a sawmill on Lot 14 NSR (North of Snyder's Road) in 1829, the current location of 9 Brubacher Street. The land that he purchased had the Spring Creek, which was earlier called Kropf Creek, running through it so he could power the sawmill. Goldschmidt ran the mill from 1829 until 1831 and then sold the mill to Jacob and David Kropf. They operated the mill from 1831 to 1862. In November of 1853 a fire destroyed the entire sawmill. The mill was rebuilt and the business continued. There were also sawmills on Smith's Creek (now the Nith River) near New Hamburg, on Alder Creek at Mannheim, Plum Creek west of Shingletown, and Bamberg Creek north east of Philipsburg.

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# You Must Be Joking!!

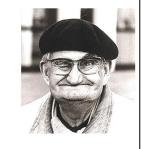

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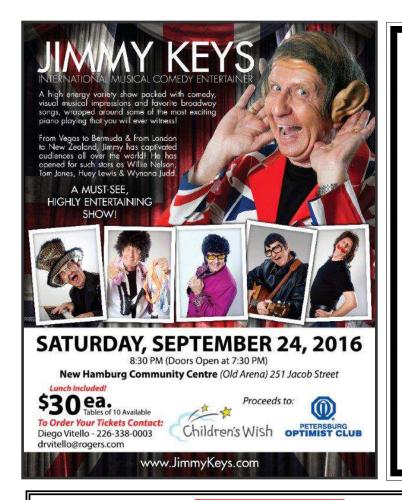
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#### TOWNSHIP OF WILMOT 2016 Water Main Flushing Program New Hamburg and Baden

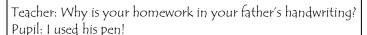

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#### Revealing the Treasures from the Wilmot Heritage Fire Brigades

#### Wilmot Fire Brigades **Badge and Crest Collection**

The first crest that the Fire Brigades received was from the Cambridge Fire Department. That crest was the start of an extensive collection that has been built up over the years.

Many communities around the world have found the Wilmot Fire Brigades website and have sent a crest to the group. Some have been sent from as far away as Russia and Australia.



Today they have over 1,000 crests and badges in their collection. One very unique badge is from Ainsworth-Deep River Fire Department from the states, showing Smokey the Bear peeing on a fire.

#### Baden Telephone Office:

Did you know that the first telephone lines through Baden were strung in 1911? That telephone company was a privately owned company until 1922, when it was sold to the township. The exchange was later moved to 25 Foundry Street.

Calls at that time could be made only between 8 am and 10 pm on weekdays, and 2 to 4 pm on Sundays. The exchange purchased the house, and in 1948, a separate phone exchange was built onto the side of the building. On March 15, 1964, a



new building located at Foundry Street equipped to handle the new dial system was built, which eliminated the need for the older crank system.

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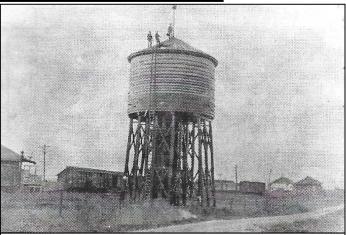

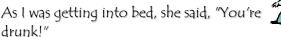

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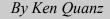
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## Baden Birding ~ Just Ducky

I have noticed that the Baden pond has a rapidly growing population of Mallards which seem quite at home with children playing nearby, people relaxing with a fishing pole in hand, or the weekly cruise night crowds. But why so many ducks?

In the turn of the century, Mallards were considered to be a rare migrant in the area. Even in the 1920s and 30s they were an uncommon sighting. American Black Ducks were the most common duck in southern Ontario in the mid 1930s, but usually were not seen in great numbers. Scientists tell us that Ontario was originally the breeding area for Black Ducks, while Mallards were mainly a western bird. Why did the Mallards move in and thrive?

Mallards were mainly a prairie bird, living in the sloughs and ponds while feeding on grass seeds and aquatic life. They like to nest near water where they can take the newly hatched ducklings to feed on water plants, algae, and the small attached snails, finger clams, insect larva and aquatic worms. However, they will nest almost anywhere, even without water nearby! One female made a nest in a school's inner courtyard for many years in a row. Between setting times she would fly out of the courtyard to feed, but always came back to look after her eggs. Since there was no way out for the ducklings, the staff and students daily fed them a commercial duckling mash and provided drinking



water as well as a swimming pool complete with duckling ramps.
Without any predators in the courtyard, the mother usually raised 7 to 12 young. After observing the family for three weeks, the students and staff would hold a duckling round-up and deliver the healthy family to the mother, which

was waiting at the local pond. She had a good plan and was sticking to it. Mallards seem to adapt to humans very well, or perhaps they adapt humans to their own uses.

Will "our" pond Mallards follow their instincts and migrate? Maybe. It seems that more and more are spending the winter with us. They have one of the best down coats available. They also have some open water in local rivers. Food is plentiful and easy to glean in harvested fields. This is one bird species (along with Canada Geese) that has benefited from the switch from mixed farming, with its necessary pasture land, to cash cropping. Warmer winters also seem to be helping the ducks decide to stay: global warming is changing many wildlife patterns.

If weather patterns continue the way they have been going, will this help our farmers grow bigger and better crops? We don't know yet, but the Mallards are finding it "just ducky."

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#### Be Well ~ Obesity, Sugar & Back to School

I look forward to teaching "Good Fuel for My Body, My Brain and My Planet" to over 200 grade four children at the New Hamburg Fall Fair each September. Reactions are varied and insightful. One student said all vegetables were "yuck." Another came to me at the end of a presentation and asked, "Mrs. G., what do you do when you want to eat healthy foods but your mom only buys unhealthy foods?" Concerned parents comment on how *infrequent* sweet treats were when they were youngsters, but often conclude with, "Healthy food takes too much time to make." I am constantly reminded that it is an uphill battle to change our ways.

StatsCan says that Canadians consume an average of 26 teaspoons of sugar a day. This is almost 273 cups per year! In fact, 25% of our daily caloric intake is currently derived from processed sugar. Obvious sources of white sugar include: cake, candy, cookies, soda, and ice-cream. Many people, however, underestimate the amounts concealed in every-day items such as bread, bagels, pasta sauce, condiments, salad dressing, fruit juice, and canned foods.

I believe white sugar should be totally eliminated from our diet because it's a triple threat:

- Empty calories White sugar deposits absolutely no healing nutrients into your body
- Nutrients are leached White sugar steals nutrients, mostly from the skeletal system, contributing to our growing deficiency problems
- Displaces healthy foods Sugary foods push out healthy foods that could otherwise nourish and heal

Sugar entering the blood stream is registered by the pancreas, which produces insulin. Too much insulin increases internal inflammation and leads to:

- Increased blood cholesterol levels
- Buildup of unhealthy plaque in our arteries leading to cardiovascular disease
- Increased body fat
- Decreased ability to access this body fat as fuel
- Sluggish feelings, lack of energy
- Inability to concentrate, retain and recall information

Drinking one soda a month led to an 83% greater risk of diabetes in women · Headaches, migraines

- Bloating
- Stiffness, aching joints
- Hormonal imbalances
- Weight gain
- · Diabetes, cancer
- Advanced puberty in children

One soda each day will add an extra 15 pounds of weight per year



This increased lack of optimal nutrition also impacts our I.Q.s. The February 21, 2011 edition of *Time Magazine* tells of a British study on nutrition and children that found those eating healthy diets at three years of age (described as lots of fruits, vegetables, and little to no sugary food) had higher IQs by the age of eight than those who ate high sugar and fat diets. I believe we give our children an extra edge in life by establishing healthy eating habits, and when we lead by example by slowing down and preparing high quality foods!

The April 2010 issue of Reader's Digest quoted Dr. Arya Sharma, the scientific director of the Canadian Obesity Network, saying that 25 000 Canadians die each year because of obesity. The article went on to note that two thirds of Canadian children live close enough to walk to school but less than half do, while in 1971 over 80% walked! We must be the generation of adults who will motivate our children by getting outside to walk and play. We must purchase and prepare healthier food for our children. We must care more about the future health of our children – and our nation – than the quick conveniences we too frequently grab.

Obesity now surpasses smoking as the greatest health-threat of our time. It's time to take this threat seriously. It's time to take a look at how these consequences impact you and me personally. Do you have an extra 10 or 20 pounds to shed? How are your lifestyle choices positively influencing your children or grandchildren? It's time to take action in our homes and communities. We can do it, one choice at a time. What are you going to change today to make that change happen?

"One potato, two potato, three potato, four...!"

That was a childhood ditty we chanted, but today it could tell of the many ways we can serve potatoes! They are abundant and fresh and local —now is the time to hoard potatoes. Sadly, the potato has gotten a bad rap from dieters, but they are super healthy and filled with fibre, Vitamin C, and antioxidants, and are

gluten free! Healthy. That's right, potatoes can be part of a healthy diet. It's the toppings that typically put spuds over the top in calories and fat. One medium potato has no fat, sodium or cholesterol. You can choose from Russets, reds, yellows, purples/blues, whites, fingerlings and

petites. There's a different type for every day of the week. Try them all! I usually cook them mashed or scalloped in the cooler months, but here are a few ways to enjoy potatoes during the barbecue season.

#### Pat's Potato Salad

Boil and dice potatoes.

Mix together in a bowl: 1 beaten egg,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of vinegar, 1 cup sour cream,  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp mustard, 1 tbsp. of flour, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup sugar.

Melt a tbsp. of butter in a pot on the stove, then stir in the mixed ingredients and boil until thickened.

Pour sauce over diced potatoes and toss in a handful of chopped chives and 2 hard boiled eggs, salt and pepper to taste. Enjoy!

\* (I've substituted plain yogurt when I was out of sour cream and it tastes the same)

I'm going to share my favourite potato salad recipe; sadly I don't remember who gave it to me over 30 years ago. It's in my handwriting in my Grandma's old collectibles cookbook, so if one of my friends recognizes this as theirs, thank you very much—it's a family favourite and a hit at every summertime social gathering!

Another quick and easy way to cook potatoes on the barbecue is to put a bit of olive oil in a tin pie plate and toss in some minced garlic and other herbs of your choice (oregano, chives, rosemary, parsley), then add cubed potatoes. Toss potatoes in the oil mixture—don't forget some salt and pepper. Cover the tin plate with foil and put it on the barbecue, tossing occasionally so they cook evenly and don't stick. You can cook them until soft or until browned a bit with a crusty edge.

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#### **Understanding Back Pain**

Back Pain is one of the most debilitating conditions that many of us will face at some point in our lives. In a period of six months of work, five in every ten Canadians will suffer from low back pain. Up to 85 % of working citizens in Canada will experience back pain in their careers. Low back pain appears to be increasing annually.

Low back pain is usually attributed to three main sources:

- Soft tissues Soft tissue injuries refer to pain coming from muscles, tendons, nerves, or ligaments. In the majority of cases, the pain will diminish with time; however, management during the inflammation phase can reduce pain and return function quickly and with less time off work. Sometimes the pain can change how your body wants to move. This mechanical change may be attributed to fear-avoidance behaviors, where one changes the way they perform specific movements in fear of further aggravation. This phenomenon could potentially lead to the person putting pressure on other structures, leading to chronic pain. Carefully selected rehabilitation exercises should be performed after pain has been reduced to help decrease the risk of reoccurrence. These should always be individualized based on patients' work demands, home demands, body type, and fitness level.
- Joints The sacroiliac (SI) joint is located at the bottom
  of the low back where the spine attaches to the pelvis. SI
  pain can present as a band-like pain across the low back,
  which can refer into the hip and the front of the groin,
  making it an easily misdiagnosed problem.

The low back (or lumbar spine) consists of 5 vertebrae; all of these vertebrae have 4 joints. The joints of the lumbar spine allow for motion in the lower back. They are easily inflamed or aggravated by sudden movements, such as getting up too quickly, rotation, or lifting. These joints are often overloaded in individuals with a big arch in their low back. The pain is often sharp and can lead to muscle spasms. Range of motion is usually decreased with daily activities for this condition. A chiropractic adjustment as well as specific exercises and stretches are the gold standard in dealing with these conditions.

3. Vertebral disc injuries — Disc degeneration is a common cause of low back pain for many Canadians. Degeneration and disc herniations are not the same. Disc degeneration is a tear in the outer fibers of the vertebral disc, often due to

improper forces going through the spine as the result of bad posture or poor lifting mechanics. These tears become weak, predisposing the person to disc herniations, degenerative disc disease, and facet arthritis. Proper lifting mechanics are crucial to helping decrease the rate in which they degenerate. Proper lifting requires good core strength as well as flexible hips.

The question I am most often asked is, how do I fix these problems and help to alleviate the pain?

The truth is that there is no easy answer or quick fix. The first step is determining the source of the problem and addressing it individually. A physical exam from one of our Chiropractors will help direct your care and allow us to recommend what therapy would be appropriate for you. A series of adjustments and other therapies may assist in the pain management, but the issues may persist. Exercises and stretches that can easily be performed at home may help decrease the chance of reoccurrence. Again, these stretches and exercises should be individualized to the specific person. See your health care provider to determine where your pain is coming from so you can get an individualized treatment plan that would be best suited for your specific problem.

Children can experience low back pain as well. A consideration with back to school should include backpack use. Here are some helpful tips recommended by the Ontario Chiropractic Association:

- \* Pack it light. Generally the backpack should not weigh more than 10-15% of your child's body weight.
- \* The heaviest items should be located closest to the body.
- \* Shoulder straps should be padded and adjustable.
- \* Wear both shoulder straps and ensure the hip and shoulder belt are done up.
- Purchase children's backpacks, as they are made from lighter materials than those for adults.
- \* The length of the backpack should be the length of the torso.

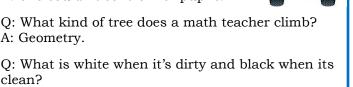

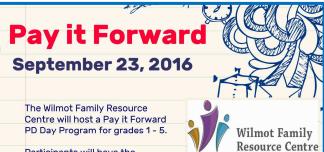

So thankful that the rains have finally fallen, but it is too late for some of the farmer's crops. Even with the rains, we are still in a Level 2 water condition as more rain is needed to get to normal water levels. This means that all water users should voluntarily reduce consumption by 20 percent, in particular by eliminating non-essential water use like lawn watering and car washing. It is important to keep these limited water supplies available for essential human health, agricultural, and ecological needs (Grand River Conservation Authority).

#### Shoulda, Coulda or Might-Get-To- List - September to October



- Prepare & seed new lawns.
- ✓ Plant shrubs & evergreens.
- Renovate perennial border.
- √ Take cuttings from geraniums & coleus.
- ✓ Plant tough, reliable blooming plants like sedum and butterfly bush so you can enjoy them in the spring.
- ✓ Dig gladioli, cannas, and dahlias and cut off stalks after the first hard frost. Dry the tubers and store indoors in a cool, dry place.
- ✓ Plant spring-flowering bulbs and garlic. Home Hardware is selling the CANADA 150 tulip to celebrate Canada's 150 birthday.
- ✓ For open ground, plant annual ryegrass as green manure to improve the soil and protect it from erosion; then till it under in the spring.
- ✓ Pruning: repair storm damage or remove dead branches at any time. DO NOT use pruning paints to do this; modern research shows they often cause more harm than good.
- ✓ Bury pots in the garden soil if plants grow in our zone 5, or move plants into the garden. Pots left above ground will be down to zone 3 because of exposure.
- ✓ Plant winter-hardy pansies and fall annuals (calendula, dianthus, ornamental cabbage, and kale).
- ✓ Plant tag teams of perennials and spring-blooming bulbs that will complement each other or bloom in sequence next season.
- ✓ Water trees and shrubs when rainfall is scarce to "winterize" them before freeze-up.
- ✓ Dehead chrysanthemum plants to keep flower buds forming through the fall.
- ✓ Clean out rose beds; leave hips for winter color and bird food.
- ✓ Move tender houseplants, etc., indoors after rinsing (removes insects) and repotting, and set up a grow light to supplement natural light or place in a bright area.
